

### JOINT GATHERING OF CLUBS IS HELD

#### Stayton Women Hostesses To Groups From Union Hill and Howell

STAYTON, Jan. 20.—Women's community club was host to the Union Hill and Howell Bee Hive clubs at their meeting Thursday with a good representation of the three clubs present. Dr. Vernon A. Douglas gave the address on "What the Depression Has Taught Us."

He stated that more than ever the public is beginning to realize that "we are our brother's keeper," that more than ever we as a whole are beginning to look out for the other fellow. Especially is this true in health work, one phase of which is the tuberculosis test that during the last year has been carried on by the Marion county health department. The savings in taxes by finding those so afflicted in its early stages means that additional hospitals, asylums and even prisons will not need to be built. He also stated that during the depression there had been more demand upon the Marion county health department than ever before, and although handicapped by a small staff, with the help of local women the work has been carried on.

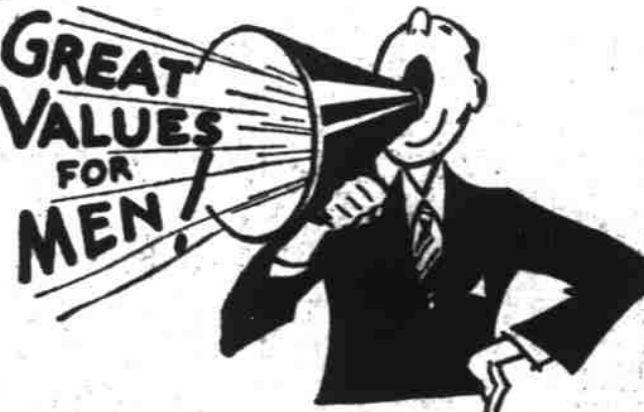

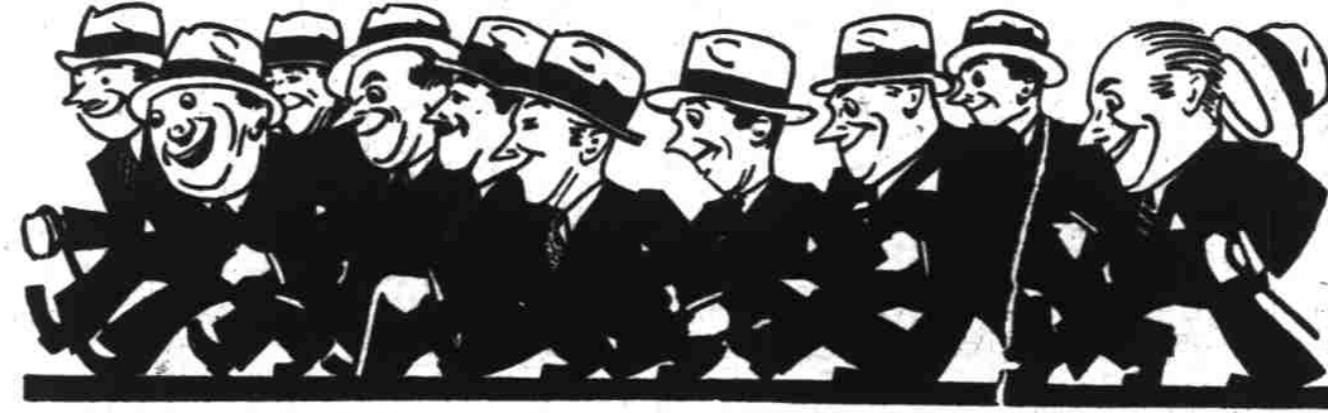
