Oregon Bridges Subject For Address Before A. A. U. W.

TRACING the development, deterioration and new growth of the arch-in-bridge construction from the Etruscan civilization, conquered and harnessed by its southern neighbor, Rome, through the middle ages, linking it in turn with religion and robbery, C. B. McCullough, bridge engineer with the state highway department, yesterday afternoon addressed the regular luncheon meeting of the Salem Branch A. A. U. W. at the Masonic temple. At the common request of his audience, the speaker culminated his address with reference to the five coast bridges, topic of much current conversation.

"Oregon has two outstanding characteristics to sell," said he, "her people whose open-hearted welcome has won friends all over the country and her wonderful scenic resources." The five bridges will bring more dollars per dollar spent in Oregon than any other expenditure which could be considered at this time, is McCullough's opinion.
