

# Salem High Rallies Second Half to Beat Chemawa 37-23

## INDIANS AHEAD IN FIRST HALF

### But Are Held to Two Field Goals Thereafter as Defense Tightens

The war dance—excuse it please, the fast breaking offense—of the Chemawa Indians threw a scare into the paleface camp at Salem high Tuesday night as the battle progressed, and the Redskins added to their lead, but after both sides withdrew for a council of war the white men came back boldly and routed the attackers with some high class marksmanship of their own all up at Salem in the first quarter, largely by outtracing the red and black on the fast break; during the second period the spectacular shooting of Zundie and Sam Shoulderblade kept the Indians ahead until the end of the first half, when there was another tie at 17-all and after Roth had put Salem ahead once more, Shoulderblade engulfed in a spectacular shot to tie it up at 19 as the half ended.

Throughout the first half the absence of Mitchell from the Salem high lineup, occasioned by his impending graduation, showed up clearly in the defense, the Indians frequently breaking down the floor with nobody in their path; this condition was rectified after Coach Huntington spoke his piece between halves and the Chemawa offense was brought to a standstill, the Indians getting just one long range basket and one crumple after the rest period.

Salem's attack was smoother, especially in the second half, than it was in the game with the Rocks last week; in the first half the boys were upset by the lightning-fast intercepting of the Indians. The red and black offense was better balanced in this game, Peters, Roth and DeJardin doing almost as much scoring as Wintermute.

Salem high will go to Silverton Friday night to meet the undefeated Silverton high team, which on the basis of comparative scores is favored to win.

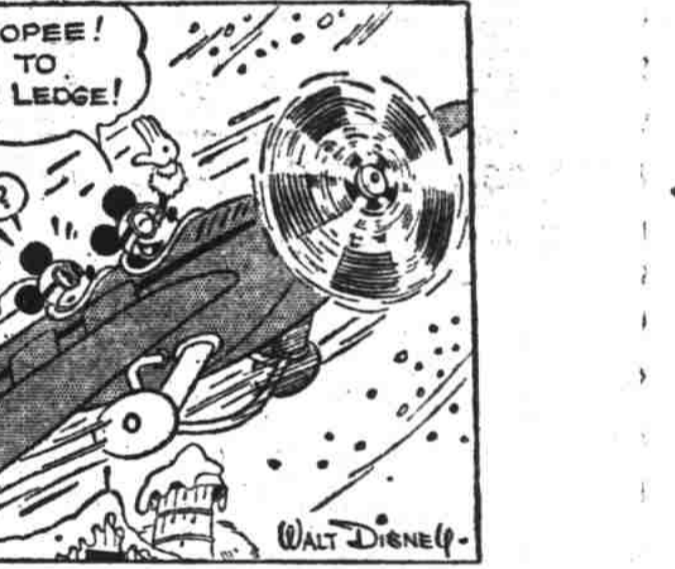
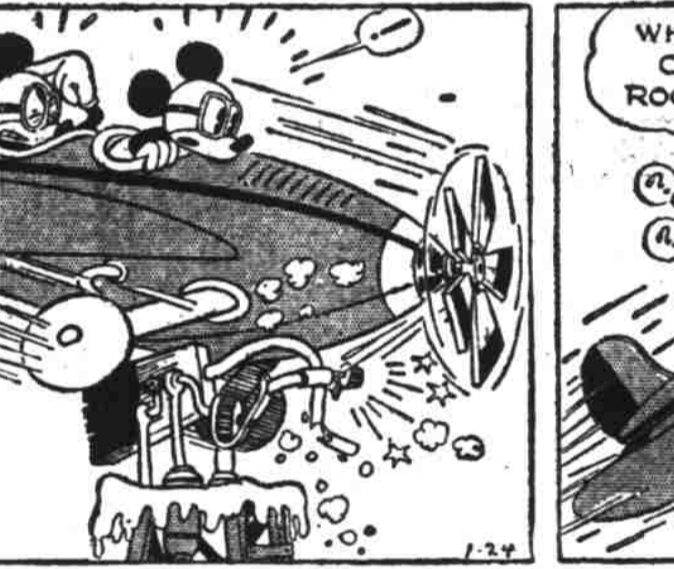
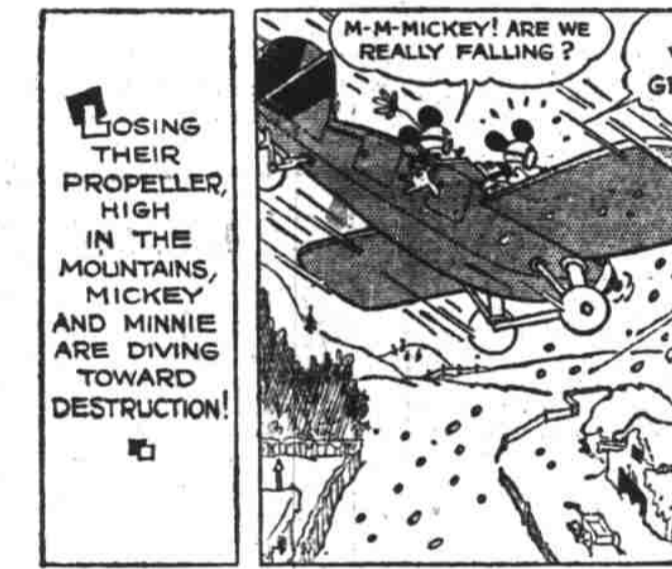

**City Hall Nears Fire Proof State**  
When improvements now under way are completed, the city hall will be rendered more nearly fire-proof. So the basement section housing the furnace and boiler may be entirely inclosed by concrete, wooden stairs leading down from central fire station are being replaced with concrete ones. The old wooden flooring in the hose tower also is being cemented. The new fire station concrete floor, samples of which will be tested for strength Saturday, completes the heating room enclosure.
