Tuberculin Results are Given-Teachers in Salem public schools | Charles M. Thomas, state utility who have been given tuberculin commissioner, Monday was cited tests by the county health staff to appear in the United States have shown positive reactions in district court in Portland Wedapproximately one out of every hree cases, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, annonnced yesterday. A positive reaction, he said, did not mean that the person necessarily was suffer-ing from tuberculosis but that he or she had at some time been in contact with the disease. Those reacting positively will be fluoroscoped and ones showing signs of tuberculosis after that test will be asked to have x-ray pictures taken. Dr. Douglas said the program would be continued until all local school teachers had received the tuberculin test. As a result of a two-year intensive program, virtually all public school pupils here have undergone the test.

Dr. Douglas advised parents to keep their children home from school at the first sign of sore throat. Scarlet fever, he said, is most centagious in its earliest stages. It often results in complications involving the kidney, ear and heart.
