

# Local News Briefs

**Tuberculin Results are Given**—Teachers in Salem public schools who have been given tuberculin tests by the county health staff have shown positive reactions in approximately one out of every three cases. Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, announced yesterday. A positive reaction, he said, did not mean that the person necessarily was suffering from tuberculosis but that he or she had at some time been in contact with the disease. Those reacting positively will be fluoroscoped and ones showing signs of tuberculosis after the test will be asked to have x-ray pictures taken. Dr. Douglas said the program would be continued until all local school teachers had received the tuberculin test. As a result of a two-year intensive program, virtually all public school pupils here have undergone the test.

**Clinic, Mill City**—A clinic for pre-school children will be held all day today at Mill City by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, assisted by Nova Lyndes, health nurse. Other clinics this week will be: Wednesday afternoon, school and chest, at Salem health center; Thursday morning, health clinic in charge of Dr. J. R. Backstrand at Salem health center; Thursday afternoon, milkmaid's clinic in charge of Dr. Douglas at health center; Friday morning, completion of immunization treatments at Grant school; Saturday morning, immunizations, health center.

**Scarlet Fever Reported**—Three cases of scarlet fever have been reported in Marion county north of Salem. Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, health officer, announced yesterday. Two of the patients are at the boys' training school near Woodburn, and one each at Brooks and Keizer. Dr. Douglas advised parents to keep their children home from school at the first sign of sore throat. Scarlet fever, he said, is most contagious in its earliest stages. It often results in complications involving the kidney, ear and heart.

**Problem Clinic Planned**—A clinic for study of problem children will be held at Washington school here next Monday with Dr. Henry Dixon, University of Oregon medical school psychiatrist, in charge and the Marion county health department assisting, according to Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, health officer. He expects around 30 children having speech defects and behavior irregularities will be examined at this time. Details are being arranged by the health department here.

**Rate Hearing Set**—Hearing involving the rates, charges and practices of the California-Oregon Power company tentatively has been set for February 20 at Klamath Falls. Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, announced Monday. The date of the hearing was announced by Thomas following a conference with Mayor Willis E. Mahoney of Klamath Falls. Mahoney requested that the investigation be resumed as soon as possible.

## ENROLLMENT DROPS, SALEM HIGH SCHOOL

**Junior Highs Gain, Grades Decrease; 1317 Pupils Registered, S.H.S.**

A decided increase in enrollment in grade and junior high schools of the city and a notable decrease in the enrollment in the senior high school over figures recorded last year were noted at the beginning of the second term yesterday. Last year's grade school enrollment totaled 2162 the first day of the spring semester; yesterday's grade school registration numbered 2209. Leslie junior high school's enrollment was 424 as compared with 406 last year. At Parrish junior high school enrollment jumped from the 228 of last year to 920.

Shifting of population centers may account for the slight decreases noted at two grade schools. A drop of 135 at the senior high school was checked up with a total of 1317 attending yesterday while 1452 were recorded the first day of last year's second semester.

The usual number of beginners were noted with 98 in the 1B class.

## Memorial Tablet For Baucum Grave Is Received Here

A memorial tablet to mark the grave of Burrell M. Baucum, state police officer, who was shot and killed while in the performance of his duties on Sexton mountain, north of Grants Pass, on July 1, 1933, was received Monday by Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police. Pray said the monument already had been completed at the grave and that the memorial tablet probably would be placed early in February. The tablet was purchased by members of the state police department and the Oregon National Guard. The two men who shot and killed Baucum are now serving long terms in the Oregon state penitentiary.

## GRANGERS PROTEST OILED ADVERTISING

SILVERTON, Jan. 29.—The Silverton grange, at its Friday night meeting, voted to write a letter of protest to a local store against its advertising of oleomargarine.

Farmers and particularly the dairymen were advised against using coconut meal for dairy feed as this, it was said, put more money into the hands of the oleomargarine men and thus worked against the farmer's interests.

A petition was circulated among the members asking for signers against the sales tax. Mrs. Maude King was installed as Flora by J. L. Stalker, Mrs. King was unable to be present at the regular installation held jointly with Silverton Hills in late December.

The group also voted to pay a fraternal visit to Surprise grange at Turner on February 10. Members of the local grange were urged to attend the Marion county grange council to meet at Macley on February 21.

## BRIDGE AGREEMENT IS EXPECTED SOON

The bond purchase agreement to be included in the contracts involving federal loans and grants for the five bridges which it is proposed to construct on the Oregon Coast highway, will be expedited and should arrive in Salem early next week, J. M. Devers, attorney for the state, advised by the federal public works administration last night.

Devers said a meeting of the state highway commission would be called within 24 hours after the contracts are received here and that actual construction operations should begin not later than June 15.

Members of the highway commission will meet at Milwaukie tomorrow to hold a hearing on selection of a site for the super highway through that community. Three proposed locations will be considered at the hearing.

## Ranch Ownership Case Up Before Judge Pro Tem

Ownership of the Sod hop ranch and the question of an accounting for several years figure in the trial of two cases now in progress in circuit court before John H. Carson, first judge pro tempore named in the state under a new statute. Carson was agreed upon by counsel for all sides in the case and holds office during the present trial, being paid \$10 a day. Press of other court work kept the duly elected judges from presiding.

One case being heard involves the suit of Ladd & Bush against C. B. O'Neill. The other suit is one of C. B. O'Neill against Robin D. Day. The accounting questions will follow determination of ownership of the property. The ranch is in the Clearlake district.

Six attorneys are appearing in the case which involves a profitable hop acreage.
