End of Veteran Plane Recalls Ace Career



The destruction by fire of the single-motored Bellanca monoplane, Columbia, at New Castle, Del., recalls the career of the gallant old sky wagon that wrote a brilliant chapter of American aviation. In 1927, two years after she was built, the Columbia set one of the early endurance records, manned by Clarence Chamberlin and Bert Acosta. A few months later, Chamberlin took her off from Roosevelt Field with her owner, Charles Levine as passenger, and set her down 3,911 miles away in Eilshaven, Germany, to create a new non-stop, long-distance record. In 1930 Mabel Boll, so-called "Queen of Diamonds" groomed the ship for trans-Atlantic flight, but Amelia Earhart beat her to it. However, Captain J. Errol Boyd and Lt. Harry Connor flew the old ship from Harbor Grace to the Scilly Islands, and thence to London, making the Columbia the only plane to fly the Atlantic twice. Last June the gallant old ship made a round-trip flight to Haiti.

COUNTY AGENT JOB IS UNDER QUESTION

Two Legal Technicalities Arise Over Situation in This County

District Attorney William H. Trindle yesterday was considering the legal technicalities in the appointment of Harry Riches, as county agent for Marion county.

Two phases of the proposition are understood to be before the district attorney for opinion. The first is whether or not the holding of the post of captain in the national guard would prove a technical barrier to the appointment and the second was the guaranteeing of federal funds, providing the county underwrites the \$2,500 project.

Riches, who has held the post of captain in the national guard for some time, receives compensation for services during the annual encampment of the organization, but it is not believed that this can be construed as a lucrative position. The question was raised as one which might prove embarrassing if a legal opinion was not obtained.

The constitution provision states: "No person holding a lucrative office or appointment under the United States, or under this state, shall be eligible to a seat in the legislative assembly; nor shall any person hold more than one lucrative office at the same time, except as in the constitution expressly permitted."

The second question facing the district attorney is the definite guarantee by the government that federal funds will be available for the post if the county underwrites the program. It was reported that the county was to be reimbursed by payments of \$1,000 each from the wheat control and the hog and corn control organizations and \$500 from the dairy control committee, when these groups are finally fully organized.

The new county agent conferred yesterday with officials at Oregon State college. Meetings with the hog and corn growers are expected to be conducted early next week, Riches reported.
