## FIRST GIFT TAXES PAID UNDER '33 LAW

The first payments of gift taxes levied under the gift law enacted at the last regular legislative session, was received at the state treasury department Friday. Oregon was the first state in the Union to adopt this form of taxation.

The tax applies to all gifts made on or after June 9, 1933, the effective date of the law, for the calendar year 1933, and each year thereafter is due and payable on or before February 1, following the close of each calendar year.

A specific exemption of \$10,000 to the donor is allowed on the aggregate gifts made by him but this exemption can be claimed only once. Donees are allowed a \$1000 exemption on their respective gifts but are also required to file a return with the state treasurer if gifts to them exceed \$1000 in value. The donor and donee are both personally liable for the tax which is also a lien upon the property comprising the gifts.

Severe penalties are provided in the law for negligence or fraud ranging from substantial additions to the tax itself to a \$10,000 fine and five years in prison.

All fixed terminal freight motor carriers operating between Portland and Willamina and intermediate points via Forest Grove and Newberg, have been cited to appear here February 15 in connection with an investigation of their rates and charges. Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, announced Friday.

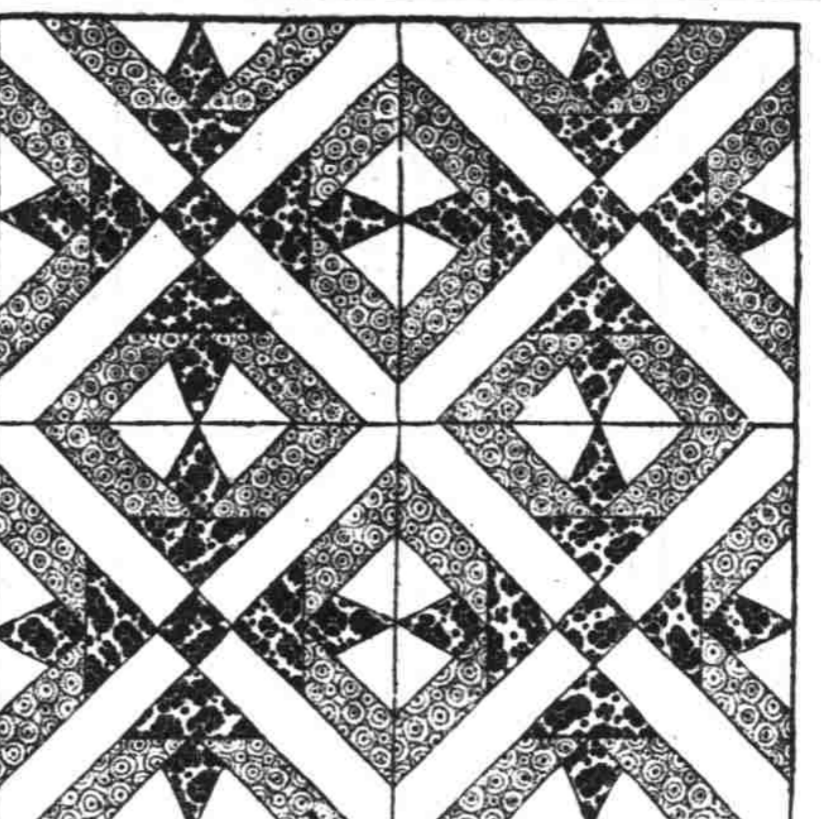
Two hearings involving applicants who desire to operate as anywhere for hire freight motor carriers under the state transportation act, have been set for February 3 at Klamath Falls.
