One of the world's most unique jobs—that of tracing missing seamen—is the self-appointed task of Mrs. Janet ("Mother") Roper, matron of the Seaman's Institute, New York. For 40 years, Mrs. Roper has traced wanderers before the mast over the seven seas and into every corner of the world where ships sail. On her "Missing List" at the institute are hundreds of names and photos of men whom she seeks and of whom, sooner or later, she will hear. For she has friends in every port in the world who aid her in her work. Since 1920 Mrs. Roper has traced no less than 5,000 seamen who had been given up for lost. She has also been the means of restoring many a farm to the family he left over some little difficulty, for she is "Mother Comptess" to the great army of seafarers who visit New York every year.
