Entertainment Ideas Abound in February

FEBRUARY is one of the most delightful months in all the year for hostesses. Ideas are simply endless for decorations, games and delicacies. St. Valentine's day is one of the most picturesque and certainly the most romantic red-letter day of the month.

It is such fun to entertain on Valentine's day because spring flowers, abundant, dainty cakes and desserts can easily be concocted in the home kitchen and then there is that undeniable heart interest that surrounds all celebrations on February 14.

The legend of Valentine is fairly well known. He was a Roman lad condemned to die because of his religious faith. On the eve of his execution he fell in love with the jailor's daughter and penned her a love note, signing it "From Your Valentine." So from that day to this February 14 is a date for remembrance of loved ones.

But to return to entertaining. Shall we consider the kiddies first, because they might grow weary of waiting their turn? A charming custom that will endear you to any child's heart is to send him a cuddly little handmade dog or doll as a Valentine.

It can be dressed in red or have heart-shaped designs in its clothing. Getting on to grade school age, a good game for a party is "Shoot the Heart." If the party is large two targets may be used, shaped like hearts, and scored with lines from the center to the outside. The "bull's eye" counts ten, the next ring five, the next two in the outer, one. Darts are thrown at the target and the scores recorded for each player. The group is divided into sides and the winners hand the losers a suitcase of old clothes.

The losing side must stage a mock elopement, either in pantomime or with improvised lines and in costumes from the suitcase.

Costume Parties
And now for the grown-ups. A costume party is always festive and for Valentine's day the hostess may request each guest to come dressed as a famous lover. For example an invitation to a couple will ask them to appear as Romeo and Juliet or as Anthony and Cleopatra. If the hostess takes the initiative it avoids duplication of costumes.

A Valentine story would not be complete without some rhyme, so here is a selected verse by Dorothy Ames Carter:
Saint Valentine reveals the news
That tells us all whose heart is whose.
But most of those who pick and choose
No reason have (like mine).
Let schoolboys act like teacher's pet:
Let sister choose the beau she'll get;
Let giddy girls for actors fret:
And kys for Garbo pine.
For me, one gal alone appeals—
Three times a day my heart she steals—
I choose the one who cooks my meals
To be my Valentine!

Now that we've reached the food problem we might as well conclude with a recipe for delectable strawberry mousse:
Whip 1 1/2 quarts fresh cream.
Add yolks of 6 eggs, mixed one by one with wooden spoon into 1/2 dessert spoonful of powdered sugar.
Add 1/2 lb. fresh crushed strawberries and 2 or 3 drops coloring if a deeper pink is desired.
Freeze in fancy mould.
Decorate with whipped cream buds and whole berries. Serves 16.
