Philharmonic Concert is March 8

PRESENTING Emery Stuart Hobson, talented young pianist, as soloist, the Salem Philharmonic orchestra will appear Thursday, March 8, at the army in the second of its series of these concerts. It was announced this week by Jacques Gerszkovitch, conductor.

Hobson will play with the orchestra the first movement of Beethoven's Concerto No. 3. Included in the program will be the first movement of the Beethoven Symphony No. 1, Egyptian Ballet by Luigini, the Beethoven Egmont overture, two numbers for strings only, and L'Arlésienne by Bizet.

Hobson, only 20 years old, has attracted much attention from critics since he made his first public appearance at the age of 15. His work is characterized by an unusual precision of technical performance, and much color and warmth. He was selected to play the Beethoven Concerto in competition with several other pianists December 10.

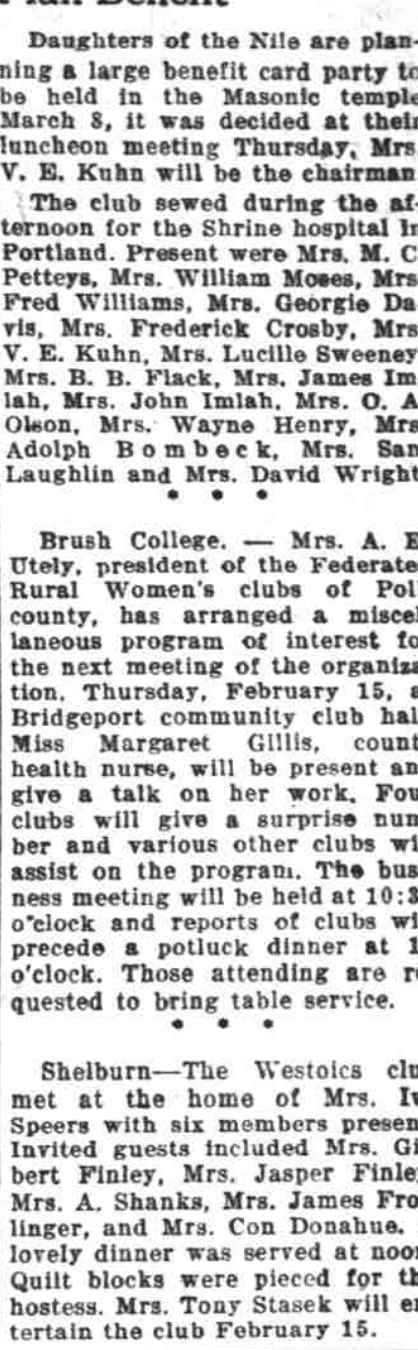
The costume ball planned by the Subscription club for February 17 has been postponed until February 24 because of conflict with the Fraternis club dance. It will be given at the Marion.

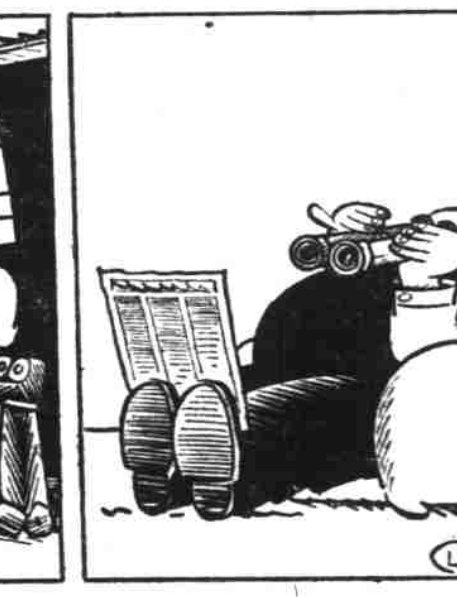

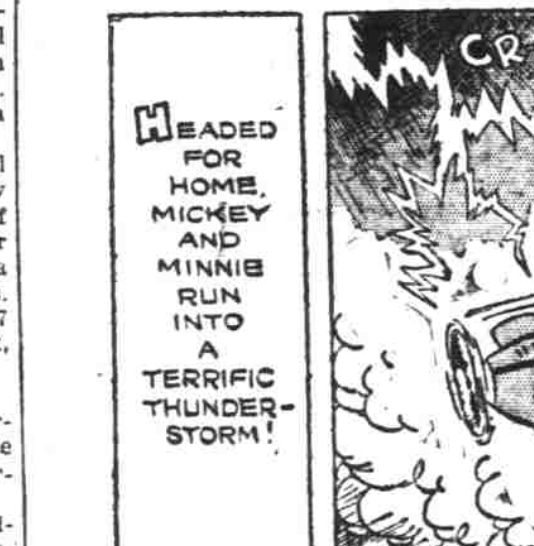

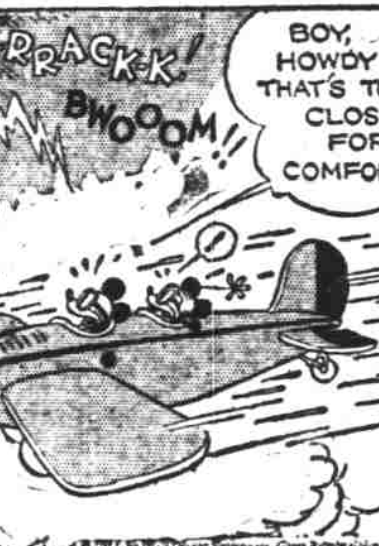
