FINAL RITES HELD FOR ANN MCKINNEY

TURNER, Feb. 15. — Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon for Miss Ann Eliza McKinney, who died at her home four miles southeast of Turner, February 10, after a long illness. She was born at McKinney's mill near Marion, Ore., November 9, 1851, was the third of 11 children born to William and Matilda McKinney, pioneers of 1847.

Miss McKinney graduated from Willamette university in 1873 and taught for 14 years, giving up the profession to care for eight motherless children. She joined the Methodist church when a young woman. During her sickness she showed a rare spirit of patience and fortitude. She leaves two brothers and four sisters, Mrs. Martha E. Adams, Portland, J. W. McKinney, Mrs. Frances O. Ball, Mrs. Alice N. Tracy, Mayro M. McKinney of Turner, Mrs. Onie Longworth, Portland, and other relatives and many friends. Rev. W. C. Kanter of Salem conducted the service. Interment was in Twin Oak cemetery. Pall bearers were nephews of the deceased, Clark Longworth of Portland, William McKinney and Milton McKinney of Salem, Corman Tracy, L. C. and E. E. Ball of Turner.

Wilson and Hill Are Bound Over

Thomas H. Wilson and Ross R. Hill Thursday were bound to the grand jury to answer to a charge of taking about 75 pounds of wool from the R. C. Hunsaker smokehouse near Turner. The state called five witnesses, including Hunsaker who recounted finding wool which he believed to be his in an Albany warehouse. Defense made no showing in the justice court hearing. Others called were Charles Bell, employed by Hunsaker, State Officers A. L. Niles and Walter Winters and E. P. Anthony of Albany.

COURTHOUSE PLANS BEFORE CWA HEADS

Blueprint copies of 23 drawings made for the Marion county courthouse remodeling project were to be laid before Burton Palmer, deputy CWA administrator for Oregon, some time today by W. C. Knighton representing the county. Blueprints were made Wednesday in Portland.

Decision of the county court on whether to proceed with the project depends on whether or not May 1 is to be the final date for CWA. The revised figures for the job call for a total outlay of \$160,000, of which about \$60,000 will be materials and \$100,000 labor. CWA would be asked to pay for the labor and 25 per cent of the materials, the county court putting up the balance of the materials cost.

Certain detailed drawings will be held up until it is finally determined whether or not the work will be undertaken.

If the project is started, all the floors inside the courthouse will be torn out. A steel frame will then be erected inside the present walls. When the present walls are anchored, the portion of the walls on the recessions on the north and south side of the courthouse will be torn out. New walls will be built, eliminating the present "wells", a portion of the salvaged material being used.

The estimated time for the remodeling project is six months. The bulk of the labor needed would be skilled.
