QUOTATIONS HIGHER FOR STORAGE EGGS

Better Prices For Celery in Sight; Demand For Seed Potatoes Increasing

PORTLAND, Feb. 19.—(AP)—The higher price named by the Pacific Co-ops for storage back eggs aided the situation here.

Trading in the butter market failed to impress holders with any remarkable strength.

So scarce were chicken supplies that killers who formerly "gave away" their dressed stock are now scrambling for their needs with only limited stocks in sight.

While thus far prices were unchanged, market for country calves suggested that demand was somewhat curtailed by reason of recent high values.

Quality of dressed turkeys was losing rapidly and little No. 1 grade is now being received here.

56s and Finer Quality Wools Firm at Boston

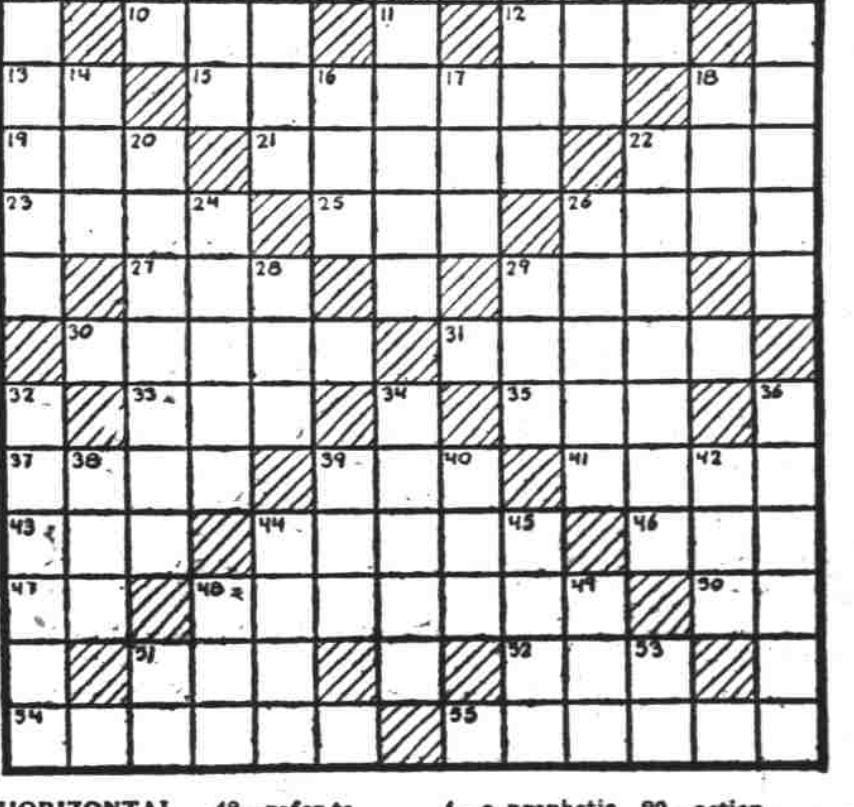
BOSTON, Feb. 19.—(AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Domestic wool quotations in the Boston market were firm on 56s, and finer qualities and steady on lower grades.

Some lots of strictly combing 48s, 50s, 1/4 blood Ohio fleeces at any price. Sales on similar wools last week were 41 cents in the grease.

Estimated receipts of domestic wool at Boston, reported to the Boston Grain and Flour exchange during the week ending February 17, amounted to 60,700 pounds compared with 110,800 during the previous week.

Cross-Word Puzzle

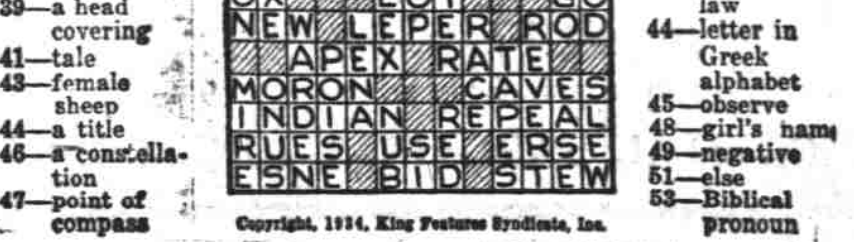
