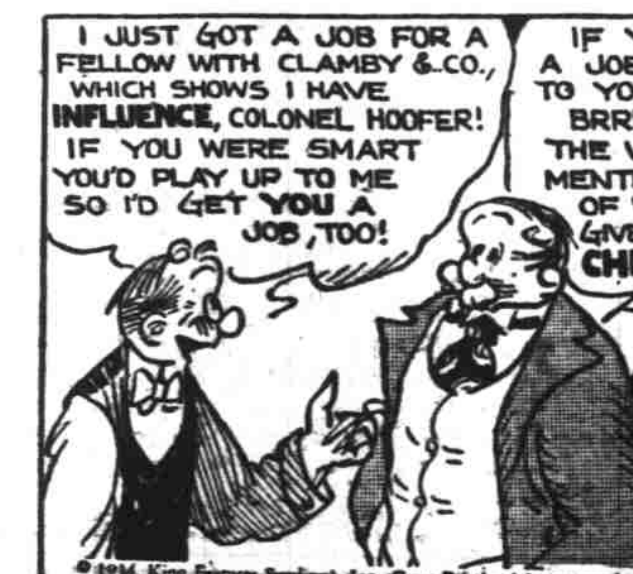

### Friday at Silverton and Continues Through All Day Saturday

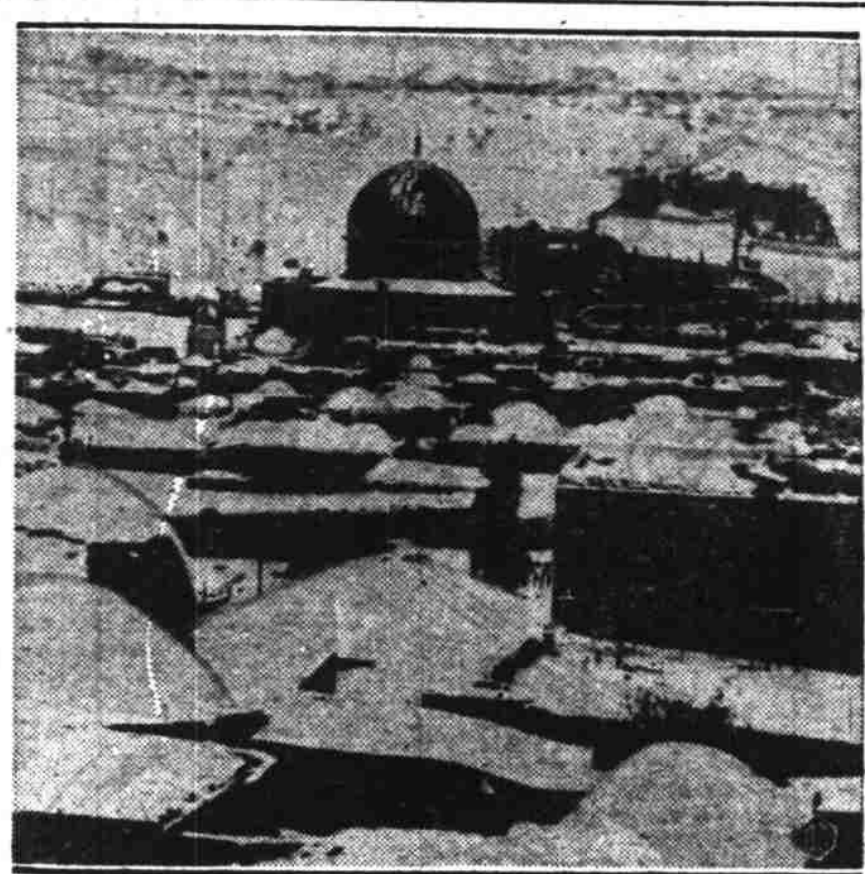

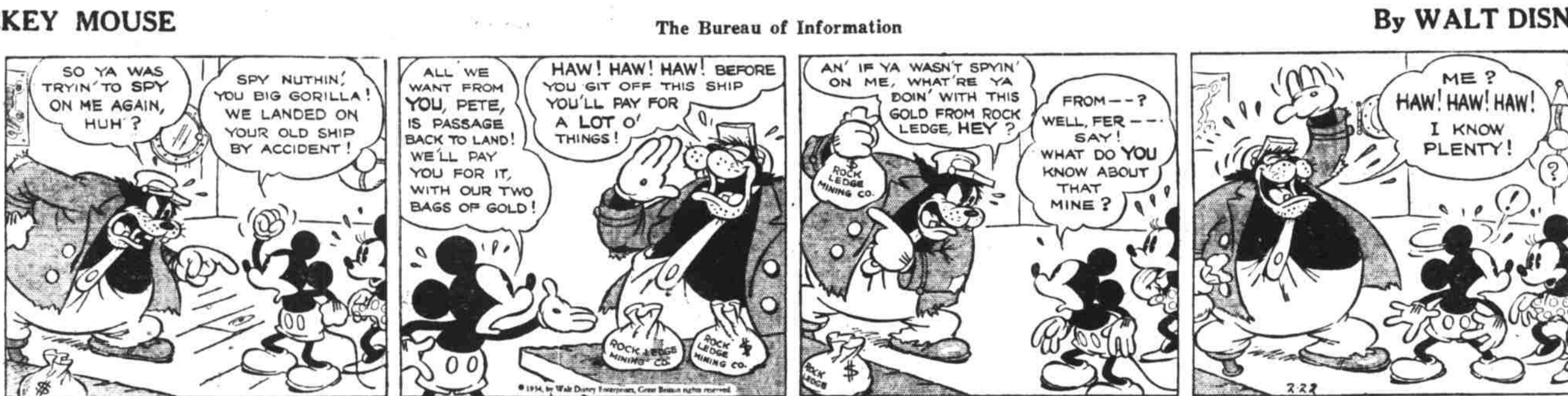
