Vocational rehabilitation of the disabled, including those suffering from either the disease or after effects of tuberculosis, was briefly outlined by O. D. Adams, director of the state vocational education department, at the Tuesday afternoon session.

Adams explained that his department provided services of assistance, advice, guidance and supervision to disabled persons, fitting them for gainful employment and self support. The work is carried on entirely with federal funds and financial aid from the Industrial Accident commission. Sixty-nine cases are now under advisement together with 22 cases added since the creation of the C. W. A.

Methods employed by the department include removal of the disability as much as possible through surgical treatment; fitting of artificial appliances to help restore the function of a lost member; direct placement of a disabled person in a job; training for a specific vocation and placing the person in that vocation. These methods frequently converge in the treatment of one case.

There has been a steady decline in the tuberculosis death rate, both in Oregon and throughout the nation, according to reports submitted at the Tuesday session. The reports indicated that this showing had been made in the face of reduced appropriations for tuberculosis work, creation of additional health organizations and a material decrease in the receipts from the sale of Christmas tuberculosis seals.

The death rate from tuberculosis in Oregon, which was 95 per 100,000 population at the inception of the association, dropped to 27 per 100,000 in 1931, the last year for which census bureau figures are available.

MANY CHILDREN ON RELIEF ROLLS HERE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Corrington Gill, director of research and statistics of the federal relief administration, announced today that children under 16 years of age constituted 36 per cent of the 52,310 persons who received aid from public funds in Oregon during October, 1933.

Gill said that the percentage represented approximately 18,800 children, almost a third of them being of pre-school age. Children of that age class represented but 26 per cent of the population in the 1930 census, he added.

Non-family persons made up 26 per cent of the total which was twice as high as the comparable per cent of this group in the 1930 census, he said. Families of two to four members represented 52 per cent of the relief families and 67 per cent of the population while families of five or more totaled 22 per cent on the relief rolls and but 20 per cent of the population.

GLENDHILL, CHAPIN DESERT AMATEURS

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Professional tennis made further inroads on the amateur ranks today as Keith Glendhill of Santa Barbara, Cal., present ninth ranking player of the United States, and Alfred H. Chapin, Jr., of Springfield, Mass., seventh ranking star in 1926, agreed to join Big Bill Tilden's touring troupe.

They will play their first matches for pay at New Haven, March 21 and make a nationwide tour with Tilden and Ellsworth Vines, Jr., former United States and Wimbledon titleholder, who deserted the simon pures last fall and since has made some \$30,000 for himself.

Announcement of the decision of the two players was made by Bill O'Brien, co-promoter with Tilden, who also disclosed plans for the continuation of the tour now being made by Tilden, Vines, Henri Cochet, former ranking amateur of the world, and Martin Plaa, the French professionals.

The four headlines will be split between two touring groups, Cochet and Plaa joining with Vincent Richards and Bruce Barnes, long-time converts to the professional cause.

Widow Indicated With ex-Police Officer, Murder

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., Feb. 27.—(AP)—Don T. Snyder, former Los Angeles policeman, and Mrs. Louise D. Shaw, Southgate housewife, were indicted today by the county grand jury on a charge of murdering the woman's husband, Harry D. Shaw. Both were held without bail.

Shaw was found dying beside his truck near Rialto on Feb. 10, having been severely beaten. Mrs. Shaw was the beneficiary of a \$5,000 policy on the husband's life. Snyder was a former boarder in the Shaw home.

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MANAGER PLAN HEARING LOOMS

Meeting is Called Primarily at Request of Labor; Discussion Invited

manager, in the proposed amendment, read in part as follows: "The city manager shall be chosen by the council solely on the basis of his executive and administrative qualifications with special reference to his actual experience in, or knowledge of, accepted practice in respect to the duties of this office. At the time of his appointment he need not be a resident of the city or state, but during his term of office he shall reside within the city. No person elected to membership on the council shall subsequent to such election be eligible for appointment as city manager until one year has elapsed following the expiration of the term for which he was elected."

Powers and duties delegated to the manager include control of all departments, bureaus and public utilities owned by the city, seeing that laws of the city and state are enforced, collection and supervision of collection of all revenues, acting as purchasing agent, custody of city properties, appointment of officials as provided by the charter. The manager would be required to call for bids when contracts for work or supplying of materials exceed \$250.

Receipt of an allotment of \$480 CWS funds for the adult education project in Salem was announced last night by T. T. MacKenzie, head of the project school here. These funds, he said, would be used to pay for the final week of the February term of night classes and for the March term, registrations for which opened Monday night and will be continued tonight at the senior high school building from 7 to 9 o'clock.

Monday night's registrations reached the hundred mark, it was reported yesterday. A similar number is expected tonight while no tabulation has yet been made of the re-registrants. Cuts in expenditures necessitated by the cut allotment may be made by organizing some classes to meet only twice a week instead of three nights as under the present system according to MacKenzie. Persistent calls for courses in penmanship and spelling and in short story writing may be answered with one hour courses in these subjects.

Approximately 50 persons are said to be intensely interested in a course in diesel engineering. The length of the term would make any attempt to offer a complete course in this subject impractical, but if a teacher could be secured, a very elementary foundation of the field might become a part of the curriculum.

Clackamas, \$135,000; and Washington, for one year, \$360,000.

The report of the army engineers was quoted to show that the Willamette valley has farm valuation of \$275,000,000 and that a fourth of the farm land has been under water from overflowing rivers once every two years since 1889.

The losses estimated by Swart in Marion county are segregated as follows: North Santiam, Green's bridge district, \$42,400; Stayton district, \$35,450; Talbot district, \$164,200; Willamette river, Eola Hills and Ferry districts, \$50,000; Horse Shoe Lake district, \$22,800; Mill creek, Salem-Turner district, \$80,000; Silver Creek, \$10,000; Albion, \$2,000; Butte creek, \$10,000.

For Polk county, a loss brought by the various streams is estimated at: Willamette river, Buena Vista-Independence district, \$30,000; Independence-Eola district, \$50,000; Windsor island district, \$20,000; Salem district, \$20,000; Rickreall creek, Dallas district, \$5,000; Derry district, \$5,000.

BUILDINGS HERE GO ON APPROVED LIST

PORTLAND, Feb. 27.—(AP)—At the final meeting of its existence the state PWA advisory board today forwarded to Washington 31 loan applications, totaling \$19,355,403 and then disbanded under order of Administrator Harold L. Ickes.

State building program applications forwarded were: State library at Salem, \$350,000; state penitentiary insane hospital, \$299,500; physicians' residence at Fairview school, \$40,000; school and recreational building at Camp Clatsop, \$20,000.

Several incomplete applications which may be presented later will be acted upon by State PWA Engineer C. C. Hockley. The projects forwarded completed all business before the state board.

Other applications forwarded included: \$16,000 for water supply project at Willamina.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 27.—(AP)—Lincoln high threw the Portland scholastic league into a three-way tie by defeating the league-leading Franklin high basketball team 20 to 19 tonight.

Washington defeated Roosevelt 28 to 18 to edge back alongside Franklin and Jefferson dumped Grant 24 to 17 to remain abreast the Colonials. Commerce won its second game of the season with a 30 to 29 surprise victory over Benson.

ADULT EDUCATION FUND IS RECEIVED

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Stage settings will be absent tomorrow night from the premiere of "Helen Retires," the John Erskine George Antheil opera, which will be mounted entirely in light.

Instead of painted drops, sculptural or relief sets, Frederick Kiesler is achieving the entire background through "static" light, or light in motion.

Kiesler has utilized every mechanical device possible, from motion picture projects to the big square affairs that stand in the wings of the conventional theatre.

One advantage of his method, he says, is the possibility of bringing costumes and setting into proper color harmony with minimum effort and minimum expense.

The Juilliard graduate school, under whose auspices "Helen Retires" is being given, estimated the entire cost of the lights at \$175 for each of the three acts. The opera is the first mounted in the United States by Kiesler, who has been working in Berlin.

ARRESTS OF MORE GANGSTERS SOUGHT

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Death of two gangsters, identified by police as extortionists, in a gun battle with officers, was followed today by orders calling for the arrest of Herman Tipton, head of the Cuckoo gang, and two associates.

Norman Godner, ex-convict, and James Vincent Griffin, also known by police, were killed in a burst of gunfire from weapons of eight detectives who last night hid in the west side apartment of Michael Accardi, a liquor dealer.

Detective James B. Mowbray was wounded in the arm. The squad of officers concealed themselves in the apartment after Accardi reported that a group of men called at his home last Saturday and demanded \$2,500 under the threat of kidnapping and death if he refused.

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OUTSIDE SALESMAN ISSUE TO BE HEARD

A new union to deal with the employment problems of "outside salesman" will be discussed at a meeting of men employed as drivers, H. E. Barker, president of the Salem trades and labor council, announced last night.

Barker said the meeting will be held in Union hall tonight at 8 o'clock in response to requests received by the council.

Roy R. Hewitt, Salem attorney, will be a speaker at the meeting, explaining the codes affecting men who earn their living by operating vehicles. The codes have recognized the fact that drivers who sell products from their vehicles have different problems than drivers who are primarily furnishing transportation for commodities.

Motor transportation industry information received by the Salem trades and labor council from the NRA shows important changes going into effect in Salem and throughout the nation because of codes recently approved by President Roosevelt.

Organized labor has pledged its full support to these new codes and the local labor movement will cooperate with the purpose of seeing that workers affected get the maximum benefits intended, Barker said.

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ARRESTS MADE IN BANK HOLDUP CASE

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 27.—(AP)—An unarmed bank clerk was shot and killed when he was held up on a downtown street late today by three bandits who took from him a satchel containing \$27,294 in securities and cash and escaped in a motor car driven by a fourth person.

Tonight police arrested two men and a woman in connection with the robbery. T. J. Higgins, chief of detectives, said witnesses of the shooting identified one of the men as one of the robbers. Other arrests were predicted before morning.

While Doyle Swiftford, guard for the Commerce Trust company, armed with a pistol, stood by helpless, under threat of the robbers, one of them carrying a machine gun, Webster Kemmer, 29, clerk of the trust company, was shot and held by one of the bandits with a pistol.

Kemmer made no attempt to resist, Swiftford said, and his slayer deliberately placed a pistol against his chest and fired the fatal shot.

The Medford debate with the Ashland normal team will be held on a stopover of the return trip.

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
