To Canvass Vote—Official canvass of the vote, by which six districts at Corvallis agreed Saturday not to dissolve their union high school territory, has been set for Friday by the county boundary board. The latter consists of the county court and the county school superintendent. The vote was 2-3 against dissolution and 1-2 for dissolution according to the unofficial report.

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Band Plans Made—Oscar A. Steelhammer, band director, is making plans for the summer concert which will be revived here in Wilson park this year. Steelhammer has made an agreement with the council to conduct the concert. He is not yet sure how many men will be in the band. Practice will start in 30 to 60 days.

Final Account In—Final account in the estate of the late Charles Paul Darst was filed in probate court Wednesday by Phildelia Darst, administratrix. Property belonging to the estate totaled \$10,887 of which \$1787 was spent in administrative and other charges. Of the property in the estate, \$9100 was in realty.

Ask Library Orders—Blanks on which teachers can order library books were being sent out by the school superintendent's office here today. Teachers have until April 1 to place their orders. An allotment of 10 cents a census child is made annually for school library books which are obtained through the state librarian.

Guardian Reports—The fourth annual report of Joseph Lambrecht, guardian of the estates of Clifford and Germaine Etzel and Andrew and Margaret Helm, was filed in probate court Wednesday. Assets of the trust consist of \$309.36 held for each of the minors in a local saving and loan association.

Insurance Firm Replies—The Norwich Union Fire Insurance society, in its answer filed Wednesday in circuit court to the complaint of Mary A. Rodgers, alleges that the assured transferred her policy in 1933 to C. E. Emmons and therefore cannot be plaintiff in any suit against the defendant.

Wants Divorce—Bessie Ryan filed suit for divorce from Lester M. Ryan in circuit court here Wednesday. She alleges that he deserted her in 1931 in Corte Madera, Marin county, California. She asks the custody of their daughter. The Ryans were married in San Francisco in 1915.

42 Cases on Docket—There are 42 appealed cases at issue for the March term of the state supreme court which opens next Monday, as against 92 cases on the opening day of the March term a year ago. Officials said these figures indicated the reduction that had been made in appealed cases during the last 12 months.

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146,751 in Turnover—The state land department turned over to the state treasurer during the month of February a total of \$146,751.87. George G. Brown, clerk of the land board reported yesterday. Items included in the transfers follow: common school fund principal, payments on loans, \$62,033.33; common school fund principal, income sources, \$100; common school fund inter, \$49,094.36; common school fund, abstract deposits, \$106; agricultural college fund principal, income sources, \$107,246; agricultural college fund interest, \$12,176.42.

Permission Refused—Speed test automobile runs on Oregon highways will not be tolerated, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, yesterday informed a "Flash" Overman, who gave his address as Rex Theater, Third and University streets, Seattle. Overman had written Baldock a letter requesting permission to conduct a speed test automobile run through Oregon. He said he expected to leave Vancouver, B. C., early today in the hope of breaking "Cannon-Ball" Baker's record between that city and Tia Juana, Mexico.

Vazakas to Speak—Dr. Alexander A. Vazakas, who spent much of the early part of his life in Europe, will give his interpretation of present European affairs at the public lobby program in the city Y. M. C. A. Friday night at 8 o'clock. Vazakas, professor of modern languages at Willamette university, is popular as a speaker on this subject which has given considerable study. The program will also include special musical numbers.

McCloskey Files—J. H. McCloskey of Norway, Coos county, yesterday filed in the state department here his declaration of candidacy for the office of state representative in the legislature from the 16th district. He is a democrat. William C. Rankin of Portland has filed for the democratic nomination for representative in the legislature from the fifth district, Multnomah county.

Will Teach Languages—Dr. P. O. Riley, well known educator and linguist, is starting classes in French and Italian languages Friday evening at the Marion hotel. Dr. Riley uses practical methods combining grammar and conversation. He had many years of study in Europe and has done extensive teaching in romance languages in this country.

Jones Case Postponed—Hearing of the application of Robert L. Jones of Eugene, for a permit to operate as a contract carrier under the state transporting act, has been postponed indefinitely. Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, announced yesterday. The hearing previously was set for March 3 here.

Dairy Professor Here—Prof. P. M. Brandt was in Salem yesterday. He is professor of dairying at the state college and was here conferring with regard to the pending legislation for dairy herd reduction.

Suffers Paralysis—Charlie Newburgh, 440 Mill street, has been confined to his bed for two weeks as result of creeping paralysis. He has lost the speech faculty.

To Take Leave March 15—J. M. Devers, counsel for the state highway commission, will take a leave of absence March 15 to conduct his campaign for the republican nomination for congress. Devers hopes to complete the legal work for the coast bridge projects before he begins his campaign. He announced his candidacy ten days ago.

Dads May Organize—To discuss possibilities of forming a Dads' club, a dinner meeting of fathers of boys prominent in the junior division of the Salem Y. M. C. A. has been called for next Tuesday night. If organized the group would serve the junior division as an advisory body and serve to sponsor mutual activities for dads and lads.

Federation to Elect—The annual election of officers of the Marion county Christian federation, originally scheduled for early this week, has been deferred until the meeting to be held March 12 in the local W.C.T.U. hall, according to Fred J. Toole, Jr., president.

5-DAY SALES OF LIQUOR TOTAL \$1124

Sales of beverages and personal permits have dropped off sharply since Saturday, the rush day, at the state liquor store here. Manager Roy Stewart last night announced Wednesday's receipts as \$209.85. Tuesday's \$190.45 and Monday's \$219.

Total receipts since the store was opened last Friday have amounted to \$1523.70 of which \$1124.20 came from liquor sales and \$404.50 from permit sales. The nature of individual purchases is showing considerable variation, indicating probably that a good deal of sampling of the various brands and types of beverages is being indulged in, Stewart said. A noticeable trend, he stated, has been toward whiskies and gins of better quality than those of lowest price, which sold most heavily at first. Wine sales, numerous the first two days, are dropping off.

More women than had been anticipated are making purchases at the state store, Stewart reported, and most of the customers are quickly coming to understand the procedure of selecting their purchases from the showcase display, paying the cashier and then receiving their package from the clerk.

Vandevort Denies He Backs Perrine

Alderman H. H. Vandevort of the first ward yesterday stated that he was not sponsoring the candidacy of E. B. Perrine for the first ward position now held by Alderman V. E. Kuhn, who is seeking election as mayor. "I am not opposed to Mr. Perrine; I think he is a good man," Vandevort declared. "But I'm not sponsoring him nor anyone else."

MRS. DUNBAR ASKS HEALTH WORK HELP

An eloquent plea for popular support of public health and child welfare work was voiced by Mrs. Sallie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon tuberculosis association. She warned the Rotary club which she was addressing that the declining curve of death rate on tuberculosis did not mean that the job of education must be curtailed in budgets. She said that the job of education must be kept up. This means that public health activities, nursing, publicity, and investigation must be kept up.

She made note of the effect of the depression on support of public health activities, mentioning that these were among the first to be curtailed in budgets. She warned, however, lest in addition to laying financial mortgages on our children in the way of greatly increased public debt we also impose mortgages of stunted lives and lessened opportunities. The closing of schools and welfare agencies deprived youth of the needed development during the adolescent years, and many of these losses would never be regained.

Mrs. Dunbar was listened to with close interest by the club.

Silverton Bank Granted 30 Days Longer by State

Extension of the restricted basis under which Coolidge & McClaine, Silverton bank, has operated since the 1933 bank holiday, was granted yesterday by A. A. Schramm, state banking superintendent. The extension runs through March 31.

Reorganization plans are well under way for the Silverton bank and it is hoped they will be completed before the present extension ends. Stock for the bank has been subscribed, RFC will be asked to put up \$30,000 in capital notes and depositors will be asked to scale down their deposit claims sufficiently to get the reorganized bank under way. Criticized assets will be taken out and placed in a trust fund to be liquidated for the account of the unpaid deposit claims.

February Dull in Building, Report

Although February brought more than the usual amount of favorable building weather, private construction activities remained near the extreme ebb reached in January. Total construction costs, as revealed by the 26 permits issued by E. C. Bushnell, city building inspector, during the past month amounted to but \$3843. The figure belies actual construction work, however, because it does not include several thousand dollars spent on CWA projects in the city. Twenty-four of the February

permits were for repairs and alterations costing \$3713, the other two for \$130 spent on new garages.

Progressive Note Urged by Fourth Council Seeker

The fourth man to seek election for the two-year aldermanic term in the fifth ward this year filed his notice of candidacy with the city recorder yesterday. He is Ross Goodman, who lives at 1085 Highland avenue, and conducts a grocery and feed business at 2446 Fairgrounds road. Goodman's statement reads:

"If elected, I intend to vote the new progressive voice of the people so that the administration of our civic affairs will proceed with the progress of the times and of all government."

Other candidates for the same position include Kenneth L. Randall, Arthur Gird and A. L. Tumbleton.

80 MORE LOSE JOBS

Eighty-six jobs will be cut from Marion county's CWA quota next week as its share in the reduction required for the entire state, County Administrator Glenn C. Niles was instructed yesterday by State Administrator E. R. Goudy. The reduction ordered for the present week was 347 jobs, reducing the county's quota of CWA employees to 1064.

WALKER LINES UP SUPPORT, SENATOR

Dean H. Walker of Independence, representative from Polk county, is reported to have lined up support for the republican nomination for joint senator from Polk and Benton counties. In this joint district the senatorship has alternated between the two counties. The present incumbent is Julian McFadden, democrat, of Corvallis. Under the "gentlemen's agreement" it is Polk county's turn for the office.

Walker has been quietly lining up support. His greatest hurdle was in Corvallis where the principal object of concern is the state college. Walker is a university graduate, so it was necessary for him to satisfy Corvallis interests in order to get republican support there.

At the republican banquet at Corvallis February 22 political leaders of both counties got together, and according to reports agreed on Walker for the senatorship. While the district has been strongly republican, McFadden, the present senator, is a strong democrat. Just what the democrats of the district will do is not clear. McFadden it is said, will not be a candidate unless he has the full support of the Polk county democratic central committee.
