The matter of city insurance was referred to a special committee composed of Aldermen Armstrong, Olson and Vandevort. Alderman Paul Hendricks refusing to serve because of his former connection with the insurance business, George Croisan asked the council to let its insurance to the lowest bidder and opposed Hendricks' original placement on the committee.

The latter replied that he had never received any City of Salem insurance business, and that Croisan, a year ago, had favored the letting of the business to the insurance men's association in the city with 24 underwriters' agents participating. Now that Croisan has withdrawn from this group, Hendricks said, he would like more than his former share of the insurance.

Aldermen Hughes and Vandevort both averred that the insurance should be let to the lowest reputable bidder.

Severity in Parking Enforcement Urged

Recorder Mark Poulsen reported \$18 collected from parking ordinance violators in the last fortnight with 206 tags turned back to the police department for collection. Alderman Frank E. Needham insisted that there be more severity in the collection of parking law violations and he was instructed, as chairman of the police committee, to see to it that local officers collect the tags when the parties tagged did not report to the recorder.

The council ordered \$60 provided by the city boxing commission during 1933 disbursed to local veterans' organizations on the ratio of their membership. An additional \$20 from the commission goes to the Salvation Army and \$20 goes to other charity.

The applications for state beer licenses for 25 local dealers were approved by the council upon recommendation of the police committee and seven dealers were also recommended for package licenses.

SILVERTON, Mar. 5.—"Reasonable compensation" was asked from the city by Evelyn R. Protection is Promised to Small Businesses and Rights of Labor

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of shortening hours and raising wages.

As if amplifying Mr. Roosevelt's own words, Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.), head of the national labor board, later told the gathering that "it is essential that most code wages be revised."

Already unofficial estimates have been made that 30 per cent—perhaps more—of the industries represented are in a position to re-employ more men and pay them more. The central theme will be—"how?"

Discussion of Codes To Be Started Soon
The actual work of discussing code revision was made the task of night meetings of the various groups, but Mr. Roosevelt had clearly outlined, meanwhile, the ends in view.

"One thing is very certain, we are not going back either to the old conditions or to the old methods," he said.

As for the recovery unit itself, the president told his audience: "You have set up representative government in industry. You are carrying it on without violation of the constitutional or the parliamentary system to which the United States has been accustomed."

"The aim of this whole effort is to restore our rich domestic market by raising its vast consuming capacity."

Mr. Roosevelt explained why he had stressed re-employment and higher pay by reminding his listeners "we must remember that the bulk of the market for American industry is among the 90 per cent of our people who live on wages and salaries and not among the 10 per cent of that market is among people who live on profits alone."

HOP WORKER SLAIN BY HUNTER'S SHOT

Death of Silverio Deemed Altogether Accidental; Bird Was Target

DALLAS, March 5.—Joe Silverio, 27, was killed at the Horst Brothers hop ranch near Independence about 8:30 this morning when he stepped from behind a building while Dominador Mansayon was shooting at a bird.

Sheriff T. B. Hooker and Fred Thomas, deputy coroner, were called to Independence and investigated the shooting but did not hold Mansayon as they were satisfied the shooting was accidental. Two nephews of Silverio were questioned this afternoon but no action was taken.

The two men, both Filipinos, were working at the ranch together and had been together for about three years. There was no ill feeling between them and they had eaten breakfast together a short time before the shooting.

The story of the accident, as told to Sheriff Hooker, was that Mansayon had been standing in the lee of a small building near the bunk house at Shorty's camp at the hop ranch, and had just drawn down on a bird with a .25 automatic pistol when Silverio appeared.

Mansayon was in the act of pulling the trigger on the pistol when his partner appeared and had no chance to hold his fire, the bullet striking Silverio in the abdomen. A doctor was called from Independence and the wounded man taken into the bunk house, but death came before the doctor arrived.

The shooting was deemed accidental at the investigation this afternoon and Mansayon was not held. The body was taken to Independence and funeral arrangements will be made later.

INSULT IS ORDERED TO LEAVE COUNTRY

ATHENS, March 5.—(P)—Seventy-four year-old Samuel Insull, Sr. who has said "I am old and sick, I will go home and die," today was ordered to get out of Greece within 48 hours.

And if the former Chicago utilities operator does not comply voluntarily with that order, John Metaxas, minister of the interior, warned "I will put him on an American-bound vessel."

It was not indicated whether Insull, who has fought for months against extradition to Chicago to face charges of embezzlement and grand larceny, might seek refuge in the near east.

There was no hint from his household where the once powerful utilities magnate planned to go.

For the first time since Insull fled here in October, 1932, a police guard was placed about his house.

54 Persons are Placed in Week, Dotson Reports

Fifty-four men and women were sent to work by the national re-employment agency here last week while 45 filed applications for jobs, Manager D. D. Dotson reported Monday. At the end of the week the number of job applicants on the unemployed list was 4413.

Men received 40 of the positions last week, 11 on public works, 10 on farms, eight in personal services, seven in building, and two each on civil works and transportation work. Seven women were employed by CWA and seven in domestic service.

COLLEGE BOARD APPROVES PLAN

Scholarships to be Offered By All Institutions, is Decision of Group

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not more than 2 per cent of the graduates of Oregon high schools who rank in the upper third of their class and who are unable to attend college without financial assistance. Such scholarships will assist recipients from paying the general fees for a year at the institutions. They can attend any one they choose.

At the college and university this amounts to an exemption of \$15 a term, and to \$6 a term at the normal schools. Student and building fees would be collected as usual.

Offers to Outside Students Limited
A still more limited number of out-of-state scholarships were provided by which not to exceed 100 students a year, equally between the university and state college, will be exempt from the \$50 a term non-resident tuition fee, though they will have to pay all the regular resident fees.

The policy will not cost the state a cent under present conditions, Dr. Kerr pointed out, as the institutions can handle the few additional students without increase of teaching or other overhead costs, while the scholarships will go for the most part to students who would not otherwise attend at all.

OREGON RECEIVES SIXTEEN MILLIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 5.—(P)—Oregon residents received approximately \$16,000,000 federal money the past year under President Roosevelt's recovery program.

A survey of federal relief agencies reveals that more than \$7,000,000 was sent to workers on projects involving expenditures of approximately \$60,000,000 federal funds.

Intangible benefits are considered more or less conjectural, even controversial.

Almost 110,000 persons have been re-employed in Oregon under NRA, CCC, PWA, CWA, AAA and HOLC, those agencies report. At its peak the civil works administration provided 27,197 jobs.

From November 30, 1933 to February 22, 1934, CWA projects provided 6,423,300 man hours of labor and \$4,079,288.34 payroll.

Oregon CCC camp activities provided 22,498 men with work and \$3,235,431 pay. The United States forest service values the civilian conservation corps accomplishments in Oregon at \$4,574,275.

On the estimate of two persons hired for each of the 26,000 re-employment agreements, signed the NRA was instrumental in re-employing an estimated 52,000 persons to work. At minimum code wages the annual payroll would be \$39,208,000 for those re-employed.

WARNING IS ISSUED OF FAKE SOLICITOR

Only one place of business is reported where money was given, the proprietor in that place being rather suspicious when the woman showed no credentials. He gave her only \$11. The Y.W. is anxious to know whether if others were imposed upon similarly.

"Our workers go out in pairs," said Mrs. Wagstaff, assistant secretary, yesterday, "and they always carry receipt books and proper supplies and credentials. Any time that a solicitor calls, if she is not known, she should be asked for identification."

HOSPITAL NEED IS REDUCED TO \$1000

Concessions made by bondholders have eased the financial situation of Salem General hospital but \$1000 more is needed to relieve it of tension from this source, William McGilchrist, Jr., chairman of the finance committee, announced Monday. While \$4635 is needed to pay delinquent interest for the period between June 1, 1932 and December 1, 1933, cash pledges have been obtained aggregating \$3462.50 and for services and merchandise worth \$325.

Bondholders' representatives recently agreed, on conferring with McGilchrist and T. A. Windshar in Portland, to reduce the interest rate for the next three years from 6 to 4 per cent, making a saving in that period of \$3090. They also gave the hospital board an extension of time for payment of back interest.

Recently announced improvements at the hospital are now being carried out. An oxygen tent has been received, a resuscitator will arrive soon and a new x-ray room is being fitted up preparatory to the coming of a radiologist from Rochester, Minn. The identity of the radiologist has not been revealed.
