INDEPENDENCE, March 12.—Eric Manual Kullander, 73, died at the family home here Sunday and funeral services will be held at the Keeney funeral home here Tuesday at 2 o'clock, with Rev. Charles Dunsmore officiating. Interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

ANDERSON TO TALK TONIGHT AT WALLER

Gus Anderson, known to Willamette grade of slightly more than a decade ago as their schoolmate "Gloomy," now a persistent globetrotter, will lecture at 8 o'clock tonight on present conditions and trends in Russia, presenting uncensored motion pictures of scenes and people in that country, interesting because of its unique economic and social experiment.

Anderson's lecture, "What's Going on in Russia Today," aims to present the facts without prejudice regarding communism one way or the other, but he says he has been "checked in every known language."

He may have something to say tonight also about Manchuria, China and Japan, which he toured extensively last summer and fall. This year he plans to visit even more out-of-the-way places than any he has reached in the past.

There will be no charge for tonight's lecture in Waller hall but an offering to cover the expenses of the hall will be taken. Anderson agrees to answer questions at the end of his talk. He will also address the Rotary club Wednesday noon.

WEAVER IS SOUGHT IN PORTLAND NOW

PORTLAND, March 12.—(AP)—Police were watching tonight for Fred Weaver, ex-convict, wanted for questioning in connection with the slaying Saturday of Frank Kinsey, woodcutter, near Stevenson, Wash.

It was learned that Weaver was here two days prior to the slaying of his partner Kinsey. Police detectives said Weaver doubtless read of Kinsey's visit to police headquarters where he pointed to Weaver's picture as his partner and the man suspected by Skamania county authorities of implication in the fatal shooting February 18 of William Zawistowski.

Police recalled that Portland was the favorite haunt of Weaver, erstwhile barefoot burglar credited with scores of house lootings. He was convicted here three times and sent to the Oregon penitentiary for house robberies.
