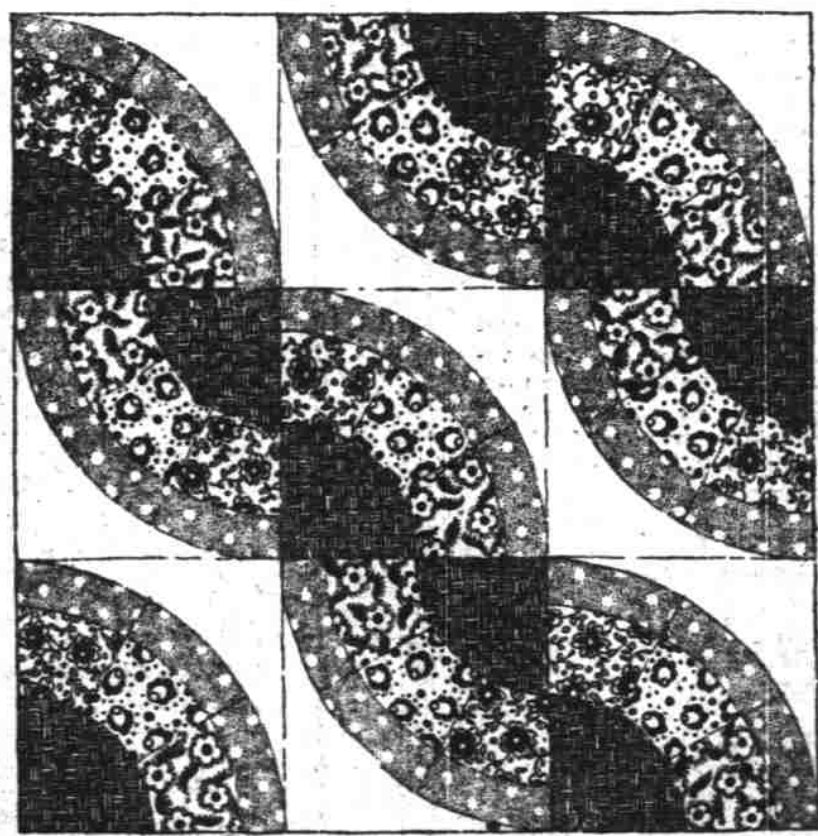

DURING THE PAST YEAR a new division has been added to the American Home department of the Salem Women's Club, namely, "The Children's Farm Home Division." The special committee comprising this division consists of Mrs. J. M. Devers, Mrs. C. P. Bishop, Mrs. H. J. Wiedmer, Mrs. Wm. F. Fargo, Mrs. J. H. Lauterman, Mrs. J. A. Brownson and Mrs. C. T. Ellison.

On Tuesday, March 20, at the home of Mrs. C. P. Bishop on Court street, the Women's club will sponsor a tea and shower for the benefit of the home. The women of Salem and vicinity are cordially invited to attend.

The following list of articles as compiled and sent to the club from the school will be most acceptable. The articles need not necessarily be new, just so they are of value and service.

1. Rugs, made of woolen rugs, about 4 1/2 by 8 feet, cut the rugs about one inch wide, round the corners and sew flat.

Rugs of cotton rugs, about 36 by 54 inches.

2. Comforts, 60 by 84 inches. If tied please tie very closely so they will launder well.

3. Napkins, 18 inches square. 1 yard of Indianhead muslin makes 4 napkins.

Tea towels made of flour sacks.

4. Pillows.

Bed spreads, 72 by 105 inches.

Muslin may be made of unbleached muslin with some handwork, or bleached 100 pound flour sacks.

5. Bath towels, any size. The three girls' cottages have the colors pink, blue and lavender respectively.

6. Butcher's aprons, both large and small. May be made of 100-pound flour sacks, blue denim (for boys), or other dark material or unbleached muslin.

7. Print dresses and slips for girls between the ages of six and sixteen. Sleeping garments for boys and girls between the ages of six and sixteen.

The Salem Women's club became particularly interested in the home three years ago when it was established in a small building ready located on the grounds.

This building consists of two small rooms, and was used by the Home as their first school house.

It is now serving as a small hospital segregation ward where the children may be placed in case of illness or epidemics which often visit an institution of this kind.

A nurse is in attendance who serves as a nurse when needed, and at other times, as an assistant matron in one of the cottages.
