GOVERNMENT PAYS OUT HUGE AMOUNT

Rental and benefit payments distributed under agricultural adjustment administration programs up to March 1 totaled \$173,570,549, it is shown by summaries announced by the administration. The distribution was made among 1,774,431 farmers in 46 states.

Oregon's only participation was in the wheat control program, which brought \$1,684,709.93 into the state. Washington received \$2,616,484.33 under the wheat allotment and California got \$665,997.91 on wheat and \$163,201.67 on cotton.

In addition to these payments, the administration had expended \$8,979,923 on that date for administrative expense, and \$49,841,684 for removal of surplus products.

The \$173,570,549 rental and benefit payments made up to March 1 were distributed as follows: \$112,349,176 to 1,030,536 cotton growers; \$59,635,216 to 712,354 wheat farmers, and \$1,586,156 to 31,541 tobacco growers. Distribution of rental and benefits during the month of February increased by \$14,576,037. The number of farmers to whom payments were made during the month increased by 182,732.

EGG PRICES HOLD RECENT ADVANCES

PORTLAND, March 26.—(AP)—Egg prices were steady in Portland today. The market for fresh eggs was generally weaker than in the week. At practically all leading points throughout the country there was general reaction in values as a result of increasing output with some additional accumulations suggested.

Market for butter indicated a generally weaker tone but on the open market there were no visible changes for cubes during the day aside from some reaction in values as a result of increasing output with some additional accumulations suggested.

Advanced price named by the Pacific co-ops for eggs and one also named by the produce exchange recently were being maintained along with the prices just as high previously set by the Oregon Land organization.

In general there was a lack of change in the market for country killed meats Monday. Veal and hogs were steady as were lambs, both old and new.

Sacramento strawberry raisin in quite fair supply arrived during the day. The stock was packed in 24s and was of rather fair quality. Prices for initial moving around \$4.25 crate.

SELLERS DOMINATE GRAIN MARKET TREND

CHICAGO, March 26.—(AP)—Sellers outnumbered buyers in the grain markets today and prices went lower, largely because of timely snow and rain over domestic wheat territory southwest.

As much as 21 inches of snow was reported at Amarillo, Tex., the heaviest fall since 1903. Owing to crop benefits expected from the moisture, grain traders almost ignored the settlement of automotive labor troubles, and likewise made no immediate response to a fresh decrease of the United States wheat visible supply total.

Wheat closed weak at about the day's bottom prices, 1-1/2c under Saturday's finish, corn 3/4c down, oats 3/4c off, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 5 cents.

Today's closing quotations: Wheat: May, 86 3/4; July, 86 1/2; September, 87 1/2. Corn: May, 50 3/4; July, 52 1/2; September, 54 1/2. Oats: May, 33 1/2; July, 34 1/2; September, 34 1/2.

Rains Won't Hurt Prunes

SEVERE DOWNPOUR WOULD BE SERIOUS

Gentle rains, such as the drops that fell Monday, will have no disastrous effect upon the now rosy prune situation. H. S. Gille of the Willamette Valley Prunes association, said yesterday. Orchardists generally hold that the prune crop was already pretty well set, and that only a severe, cold downfall will be detrimental at this stage.

About the cherry trees, there is less unanimity of opinion. Prunes blossomed earlier than cherries in the main this year, and there is some feeling that cherries have not reached the safe stage of the prune blooms. Recent reports of frost damages to cherries in mid-west sections have given valley orchardists hopes for a good market and price this summer.

The prune situation, both as to markets, price and production, has not looked so encouraging as now in many years. Chief of the booms to the prune outlook is the fact that the entire 1933 crop has now been cleaned up.
