Insull Vessel Passes Dardanelles En Route to Black Sea

off the ship, permission would be asked of the Greek government to search the vessel.

Martin J. Insull was returned to Chicago to face trial Wednesday while his elder brother and former associate in a utilities empire sought another refuge, perhaps in Rumania.

In the custody of two American officials, Martin Insull was brought from Toronto after losing a 17-month flight against extradition.

His trip was delayed at Detroit while an American immigration board declared him "a person likely to become a public charge," and therefore subject to deportation, but his journey to Chicago was later completed.

The Greek freighter Samuel Insull chartered two weeks ago for a flight from Greece passed through the Dardanelles and steamed toward Istanbul and the Bosphorus.

She had one passenger, but whether this was the 74-year-old former Chicagoan was not established.

Mrs. Samuel Insull, still in Athens, was refused a British passport visa despite the American minister's request that she be given one. She has a 30-day French transit visa, but that was believed useless in view of the British action. The probability was seen that she might go to Italy or try to remain there indefinitely.

The Greek government, it was learned, no longer considers her an undesirable alien because she helped her husband flee.

Expect Payment Non-High Funds When Taxes Come

Marion county high schools who are receiving pupils from outside their own districts and charging tuition, will receive a payment on account of the 1934-1935 charges as soon as 1934 taxes are disbursed by the county treasurer's office. their bills, the payments being only a portion of the tuition due and made on a certification of the number of tuition pupils a high school is handling.

Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, ex-officio secretary of the non-high school board, said the moneys would be only from 1934 taxes. Income prior to that date goes to liquidate warrants issued to the high schools in 1933 and not paid for want of funds.

M. Weinacht, chairman of the non-high school board, said that organization was anxious to get the money to the various high schools as soon as possible so warrant interest could be stopped.

In addition, the Carnegie Steel company's Youngstown plant received unofficial word of a similar increase, but the Carnegie firm, another U. S. Steel subsidiary, issued no official announcement.

Increases for 57,500 employees in six other companies, were announced Tuesday. They were:

The National Steel Corp., 18,000; Jones and Laughlin Steel Corp., 17,000; Great Lakes Steel Corp., 4,500; Wheeling Steel Corp., 5,500; Corrikan-McKinney Steel Co., 4,500; and American Rolling Mills Co., 8,000.

Since the minimum wage of the industry is \$17 a week of 40 hours, the 10 per cent wage boost will mean an additional \$1.70 weekly for the lowest-paid class of the workers. Other workers will receive larger amounts, in proportion to their wages.

While many of the companies have not worked out full details of the increase, it is generally understood not to apply to salaried employees.

'WOMAN'S RIGHTS' THEME OF PLAY

Chemeketa Players are presenting all this week a comedy entitled, "Her Honor, the Mayor", a light comedy by Mary Burns. The play is coached by Beulah Graham. The opening performance was last night.

Slightly reminiscent of "The Warrior's Husband", the play has to do with woman suffrage, the main action taking place in the dream of an ardent admirer of women's rights in politics. Women take the place of men, and the ensuing scramble furnishes ample laughs throughout the entire show. When the sleeper wakes she is more positive than ever of the correctness of her views; and learning that her fiance who is a candidate for mayor, shares her opinion, the usual happy ending results.

Ruth Versteeg as Eve Greenway, the mayor, turns in a convincing and humorous performance, showing police throughout the play. Mike Panek as an Irish politician and Fern Shelton as a negro servant girl may be credited with well-played character parts. The part of Mrs. McNabb, a prim suffragette, was played by Pat Peterson. Perhaps a somewhat overdone in the first act, the performance in the second and third acts compensated both in style and characterization.

Others in the cast whose parts were creditably played were Jacquie Hughes, Elenora Tonsing, Nathan Steinbock and J. Morgan Cook.

Simple but effective stage settings were designed by George Campbell, stage manager.

DALLAS, March 28.—R. W. Stevenson, 47, passed away at the Dallas hospital about 11 o'clock Tuesday night as a result of injuries sustained last Thursday night when he was struck by a car driven by H. S. Pinkerton, salesman for the Willamette Valley Lumber company.

Stevenson was born in Delhi, Minn., in 1886 and had lived in Oregon for over 20 years. He was employed in Portland for 12 years, coming to Dallas in 1926 where he took the position as chief engineer for the Willamette Valley Lumber company. He was a member of Jennings lodge of the Masons.

He is survived by his widow; two sons, Glen and Jimmie; one daughter, Helen; two sisters, Mrs. Chris Stevenson and Mrs. Bud Riley of Stockton, Cal., and a brother, Tom Stevenson of Saskatchewan, Canada.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p. m. at the Henkle and Thomas chapel with Rev. G. W. Bruce officiating. Burial will be in Salem.

SPECIAL MAN WILL PUSH HOLC LOANS

In an effort to get cash to depositors in closed banks and at the same time to prevent forced liquidation of home-loan mortgages to these institutions, the Home Owners' Loan corporation here is making special efforts to refinance all such loans through its organization, J. F. Ulrich, Marion county appraiser, announced yesterday. He said E. Potter had been named a special representative of HOLC in Oregon to push these loans through the state organization.

Ulrich said at the same time announced that all home owners whose mortgages were in default, should consult him at his State street office, before determining that their mortgages were not eligible to be refinanced. He said many persons had received erroneous information on the basis for refinancing loans and had not made any effort to relieve their debts through HOLC.

Ulrich said as many as 12 applications for loans were being appraised through his office in day. Three factors are considered in making the appraisal: the present value of the property, its replacement or reproduction value, and its capitalized value based on rent and taxes over the last ten years. These three items divided by three, give the composite figure set by HOLC as the value of the property.

Loose Loses Case
In Justice Court

Decision for the plaintiff in the full sum asked, \$53, was returned by the jury which heard the trial of Kenneth Plank vs. Frank E. Loose, doing business as the Capital City Transfer company, in justice court yesterday afternoon.

The action grew out of an automobile accident on State street near 14th December 13, when plaintiff claimed his 1934 Star car was damaged to extent of \$53 because defendant's truck, parked to unload furniture, had no lights. Defense witnesses contended side lights as required by law were lighted.

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MARION QUOTA SET FOR CMTC CAMPS

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, March 28.—(Special)—Renewed for the ninth consecutive year, the Citizens Military Training camp at this post is scheduled to offer four weeks of outdoor life and play to many Oregon and Washington youths again this summer. Orders to enroll applicants and prepare for the camp have been received.

As was the case last year, however, the camp quota has been more than cut in half, and the total at present is set at 228. Marion county's share is 5.

Except for a later starting date, the 1934 camp will be much the same as that in 1933. Because of the reduced number to be admitted, basic or beginning students will not be accepted, and the camp will be restricted to red, white, and blue, or second, third and fourth-year men. This time, however, the course will not open until July 5, about three weeks later than in previous years. It will run for four weeks as usual, and the same general course of instruction and activity is expected to be followed.

The camp area, as formerly, comprises the whole of Oregon and Clark, Cowitz, Wahkiskum, Skamania and Klickitat counties in Washington.

Mr. Carl Abrams, Salem, Ore., has been named as enrollment campaign chairman and will assist in the work of securing applications for Marion county.

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
