BEND, Ore., March 29.—(AP)—Klensrud and used as a guide, J. Dallas, Bend resident, was forced to show strangers armed with machine guns and two sawed-off shotguns, the lay of a local bank before daylight this morning, police said he informed them.

Dallas said he believed one of the men in the blue sedan was John Dillinger, hunted killer, but admitted he had little information on which to base the belief. He said the woman was a blonde.

Police here also received a report that three sedans, one carrying a machine gun, recently entered the state at Denio, isolated town on the Oregon-Nevada boundary line.

Fred Hall of Denio notified police here that the sedans carrying five persons, one of whom was described as a blonde woman, evidently entered the state there to avoid border line inspection.

He said a bulldog owned by the blonde jumped from the seat of one of the cars, pulling off a blanket and revealing a "nasty looking machine gun."

RESCUE PLANE OFF FOR SIBERIAN CAPE

NOME, Alaska, March 29.—(AP)—The big rescue plane carrying Prof. George Yushakoff, leader of the Soviet expedition headed for the camp of 39 Russians marooned a month and a half on the Arctic ice pack, and his two aides took off from here at noon today for Cape Van Karen, Siberia.

Last minute weather reports said the weather was cloudy at Cape Van Karen, and that a light snow was falling at Camp Schmidt, the refugees' camp on the ice. The marooned party is about 350 miles northwest of here.

With Professor Yushakoff was Pilot F. A. Levanovsky and Clyde Armstrong, an American mechanic, of Fairbanks. Their second plane will remain here to await further orders. The two planes arrived here yesterday after a difficult flight from Nulato, on the Yukon, through snow and sleet.

Speaking through an interpreter, Professor Yushakoff said his plans were to fly first to Cape Van Karen, where the Russian aviator Lapidovsky was found March 19, after being lost several days. Lapidovsky had succeeded previously in rescuing a number of the marooned party. Attempts will be made to assist Lapidovsky, after finding out what repairs he needs and then a hurried flight will be made north over the ice to Camp Schmidt, and the long marooned Russians.

gene stated nine counties are now in the aid plan. Lane, Linn, Marion, Benton, Polk, Yamhill, Clackamas, Washington and Multnomah. Multnomah has named Commissioner Phlegley and Roadmaster Busk as members of the directorate. He said over \$2,000,000 damages by flood was shown in the valley last year and that he had never seen a movement in the Willamette valley before which received such a ready response as this one. He stated it was estimated storage dams should be constructed to store 220,000 acre feet of water to prevent flood damage, and that such dams would restore thousands of acres of valuable land to use and to the tax rolls of the state.

"It's not a reclamation project," he said, "it's rather a project to restore lands once fertile and very productive but the value of which has been destroyed by flood waters."

the many offers of support should I become a candidate for election to the office of secretary of state, personal considerations make it necessary at this time for me to decline to seek this office."

Holman's statement was made during his tenure in office it will be my constant effort to justify the confidence placed in me by Governor Meier, whose unsolicited appointment is something for which I will always be deeply grateful. During the balance of my term I intend to devote my time to the problems of the boards and commissions, transacting the business of the state and to the other duties of the office, and believe that this can best be done without the distractions of a personal campaign, leaving me free at the end of the term to retire to my own business.

"My associations here have been uniformly pleasant, and I desire at this time to express my gratitude to the state officials for the courtesy and help that has been so freely given me in taking up the duties and conduct of this office, and at the same time to express my appreciation for the cheerful cooperation from the employees of the office of the secretary of state."

Holman Writes Two Verdicts, Picks One

Treasurer Holman's statement came early yesterday morning. His advisors said the decision to make the campaign was a hard one for the state treasurer and indicated he had prepared an alternate statement of declination to release if the decision was against a campaign. He finally decided to enter the lists and among his strongest supporters are said to be Senator Burke and Charles M. Thomas, utilities chief under Governor Meier.

Holman's formal statement read:

"I am persuaded that it is my duty to the progressives and to the members of the republican party of the state and to all those who labor for their daily bread, who have favored me with nominations and helped me with elections to permit my name to be presented to the voters as a candidate for governor."

"My platform will be prepared and formal filing will be made in due time as required by law."

Delzell has been flirting with the idea of running for congress ever since he nose-dived two years ago in a close contest with Harvey Starkweather. When a word came from Washington recently that he could take a leave of absence from the internal revenue office to make his campaign, Delzell was understood to have made up his mind to make the race.

Consulting with him for favor of the democrats will be John D. Goss of Marshfield and R. R. Turner of Dallas. J. M. Devers and James W. Mott will fight it at the congressional nomination on the republican ticket in this district.
