

LATE FILINGS ADD TO OFFICIAL LIST

7 Women Out for Job in Legislature; 375 Filings Make up Total

Seven eleventh hour filings for the primary election, which were not checked by the state department until today, were entered in the books of the secretary of state yesterday morning and will appear on the ballot May 18. The time for filing for the primary election expired at 5 p.m. yesterday.

Two of these candidates, R. N. Kawanagh and Hugo H. Swannberg, both of Portland, filed for the republican nomination for state representative from the fifth district, Multnomah county. John Skel, also of Portland, filed for the democratic nomination for state representative from the fifth district.

Three other filings, C. H. Hyde, Belle Lydick and Frank Carl, all of Eugene, were for the democratic nomination for state representative from the 14th district, Lane county.

William Grenbender of Ashland filed for the democratic nomination for state representative from the 19th district, Jackson county.

Records in the state department show that there are seven women candidates for the office of state representative. Two of these women, Nanny Wood Honneman and Gladys M. Everett, both of Portland, filed for the democratic nomination in the fifth district, Multnomah county.

Marjell G. Keasey, also of Portland, is a republican candidate from the fifth district.

Two other women, Hannah Martin, Salem, republican, and Bessie Richards, Salem, democrat, filed for state representative in the 12th district, Marion county.

Grace Kent Magruder, Clatskanie, democrat, is a candidate for state representative from the 33rd district, Clatsop and Columbia counties, while Belle Lydick, Eugene, democrat, is a candidate from the 14th district, Lane county.

Revised figures indicate that there were a total of 375 filings. These included 203 republicans, 134 democrats and 38 non-partisan. There were 428 filings for the primary election two years ago.

Certification of candidates at the primary election to the county clerk will be announced by the secretary of state within the next three weeks.

PARK ON RIVER IS WEST SALEM PLAN

The state highway department is showing interest in a recent proposal that a state park under its supervision be created on the West Salem waterfront south of the Marion-Polk county bridge, residents there report. A communication has been received from the department asking what progress has been made toward acquiring the necessary properties.

A committee has been appointed by the West Salem city council to push the project. Lieutenant Colonel C. A. Robertson is chairman and other members are J. S. Fresen, proprietor of the Salem Box factory, and C. A. Guderian, West Salem alderman. It is understood cooperation of the West Salem council has been asked by the highway department. Several of the 10 or 12 property owners involved already have indicated they might donate their lots for the park, it is reported. Proponents of the plan point out that the site would be ideal from the standpoint of the river view, bathing beaches and wooded portions of the water front.

Marriages Few in Polk in 3 Months

DALLAS, April 4.—A marriage license was issued here today to Earl F. Rowland, legal, carpenter, and Myrtle Johnson, legal, housewife, both of Sheridan. Marriage license business at the clerk's office here has been slack ever since the first of the year with only nine licenses issued to date. January was the best month so far with four, while the sale dropped to one in February and three in March.

14 Men Go to Jobs On North Santiam

Calls for laborers of any sort continue slow at the national re-employment office here, according to Manager D. D. Dotson. To date this week 29 workers have been called for of whom 14 received jobs on the PWA highway construction. Other placements included five farm hands, three common laborers, three woodcutters and four housekeepers.

WILQUEST CLAIM DOWNED
A memorandum explaining why the demurrer to the complaint in the \$100,000 damage action of J. P. Wilquest against Ladd & Bush and others was filed yesterday by Judge L. G. Lewelling. The complaint, the court stated, does not state a cause of action either for malicious prosecution or false imprisonment. The memorandum went on to give the judge's legal grounds for this decision.

Police Radio Use Goes up Each Month

City police last month established a new speed record for handling radio calls, Donald Poudjide, day operator, announced yesterday. The average time per call started by radio was 7.2 minutes, a gain of three-tenths minute over February.

At the same time the number of calls broadcast rose from 2157 in February to 2513 last month and of cases handled by radio from 325 to 365. Altogether in March 2381, 1850 general information and 565 case calls were sent out over the air by KGOZ, police radio station.

VETS USE OF SHREN HIT BY ORGANIZER

At the conclusion of an impassioned speech defending Theodore Jordan, Klamath Falls negro who was condemned to death for murder, Revels Cayton, Seattle negro and International Labor Defense organizer, last night urged his hearers at Workers' hall, 284 North Commercial street, to "take an active stand today against this whistle blowing here." He referred to the recent mobilization of war veterans to aid in the search for the two Lincoln school girls who disappeared last month and were eventually found in Minto slough.

Cayton charged that an attempt was made to "incite lynch riot against Filipinos," basing his declaration on the mistaken clue at time of the search that Filipinos might have made off with the two little girls.

The speaker also urged his audience to organize the Filipino workers in this vicinity along the whites in the Agricultural and Cannery Workers' union that is being formed here. "Unless you organize the Filipinos, they are going to smash your strike," Cayton declared.

The new union, its leaders state, is being formed to enable the workers to picket with employers for suitable wages and working conditions.

Federal agents, learning of the plot, secreted themselves in the Goodman home. When Green and the red-headed woman drove up the man made "menacing" gestures, operatives said, and they opened fire with machine guns. Capture of the pair followed.

Foiled at most of the gang's night formerly frequented a saloon operated by "Dapper Danny" Hogan here. Hogan was killed five years ago by a bomb placed in his automobile.

Frances Perkins Poo-Poo's "Wave Of Strikes" Talk

CLEVELAND, O., April 4.—(AP)—With factory employment and payrolls going up, Frances Perkins, secretary of labor, is not impressed by "the strike wave that people are talking about."

"There isn't a first class strike in America," she told reporters in an interview today. "Why do the American people get the jitters when the word strike is mentioned? Is it so terrible that people leave work and refuse to come back until they get something they want?"

Miss Perkins discussed strikes, company unions and a resignation before delivering a lecture at John Hay high school which was chuck-full of figures on increased payrolls and employment. The payrolls, she said, have jumped 66.5 per cent in the last year, and employment 33.4 per cent.

Wirt Raps Hugh Johnson; Vexing Laws Back, Held

NEW YORK, April 4.—(AP)—Dr. William A. Wirt, the Gary educator who started congress searching for "reds" in the Roosevelt "brain trust," devotes the fourth installment of his copyrighted pamphlet, "America Must Lose," to an attack on the "so-called new deal," and the recovery leadership of General Hugh S. Johnson.

"Now under the so-called new deal," Wirt says in the brochure published by the Committee for the Nation, "we are going back to the same vexatious and obsolete laws that will inevitably enslave again the common man."

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employing in their stead men at a lower rate of wages and below the scale permitted by law, and that the respondent (the Pantages theatre) should pay the men so discharged the additional wages for the period of two weeks as is the universal custom in such cases.

"It is also the opinion of the board that such men as are required should be returned at once to the positions from which they were wrongfully discharged, at the wage provided by the moving picture industry code."

At the start of the controversy some weeks ago, the theatre management contended that it could not meet operating expenses at the prevailing wage scale and that the only alternatives were to reduce the pay or close the house. Stille today refused to make any statement in connection with his refusal to comply with the NRA ruling.

Mr. Stille is well known in Salem on several occasions as manager of local theatres, coming here first to work for George Guthrie.

Beer, Wine Tax Retroactive is Official Opinion

Attorney General Van Winkle indicated yesterday that he would uphold the retroactive feature of the privilege tax law on wines and beers enacted at the last legislative session. The opinion probably will be handed down later this week.

The state liquor commission, through its attorney, George Neuner, requested the opinion after the Oregon Brewers association had protested payment because the act which did not become effective until March 9 provided for collection of the taxes beginning December 10, 1933.

The attorney general declared that the legislature previously had passed tax laws including retroactive features and that there were numerous precedents upon which to base an opinion. His statement implied that there had been a contract with wholesale and retail beer and wine dealers that they were not to be taxed, and that the only statutes not retroactive would be the criminal laws.

Liquor Board is Scored for Going Against Council

PORTLAND, April 4.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission "has violated the very essence and spirit of the Knox law and its agencies have acted in an arbitrary and dictatorial manner in issuing licenses to two beer parlors here after the city council and Chief of Police Lawson recommended that they be denied," the Rosa City Park Lions club charged today in a letter to Administrator George L. Sammis.

The club, according to Paul A. Sayre, author of the letter, objected to a beer parlor known as "The Tent," 1225 N.E. 42d place, and the "Castle Rhine," 4042 N.E. Sandy boulevard.

Nearly \$21,000 is Expended in CWA Jobs at Silvertown

SILVERTOWN, April 4.—Dr. A. W. Simmons, chairman of the water commission, gave the following report of the CWA work done by the department, to members of the city council: 932 feet of 12 inch cast iron, 468 feet of 6 inch cast iron and 60 feet of 4 inch cast iron, making a total of 5600 feet of cast iron pipe laid; 650 feet of 10 inch wood pipe, making a total of 6250 pipe laid. Of the total \$20,659.96 spent, the water department furnished \$8911.56 and the CWA \$11,748.40, of which \$9571.10 was for labor and \$3077.50 for materials.

present provisions permit effective price changes only after ten days following publication.

Col. W. B. Greeley, secretary-manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, agreed in part with Denman, but added he hoped the inclusion of the amendment might make possible an agreement with British Columbia exporters to stabilize foreign market prices for the benefit of both United States and Canadian interests.

Denman also opposed an amendment which would provide that persons failing to fulfill their obligations under the code might be denied an allotment by the governing agency.

The Salem chamber of commerce will participate in observance of "All Oregon Products Days" with a special Oregon-products luncheon featured at its Monday, April 23, noon meeting. Governor Meier has assured the Oregon Manufacturers' association and Portland chamber of commerce retail merchants committee that he will designate the period from April 20 to April 28 as "All Oregon Products Days".

This special week is set aside to stimulate greater interest in Oregon products and payrolls, and the Portland sponsors will ask all communities of the state to give some recognition to the event. It is estimated that about 5,000 retailers over the state will display and feature Oregon products during the week.
