Income, after taxes and depreciation but before interest, stood at \$773,370 or \$14,946 below 1933. Interest charges amounted to \$136,000 on the long-term debt of the company. The net after interest was \$232,937.

Dividends paid on the stocks of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company in 1933 were cut to \$16,940. In 1932 dividends paid totaled \$43,590. All of the common stock of the company is owned by the Federal Water Service corporation of New York.

The operating corporation carries its fixed assets at \$3,756,286 after depreciation. Against these long-term outstanding debts totaling \$2,674,500, the bulk of which is the 5 percent gold note mortgage maturing in 1937. The only long-term debt retired by the company during the year was \$4500 of Coos Bay Water company bonds repurchased at a \$1150 discount. Cash of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company at the end of the year was \$9804. Current assets totaled \$91,464. Included in the current payables were \$34,600 of short term notes.

Expense items charged to operations of the local plant in 1933 included water supply \$504; electric power pumping \$15,444; hydraulic power pumping \$2468; purification expense \$2654; transmission and distribution costs \$3110; commercial expense including meter reading and collection of bills \$11,825; general office salaries \$8114; depreciation \$9636 which was a part of general expense, the latter totalling \$21,712.

During the year the company incurred expenses in connection with its condemnation proceedings here and at Hillsboro of \$14,000. These were charged to the profit and loss account and were not included in operating costs.

LONE SURVIVOR OF CRASH IS RESCUED

CALI, Colombia, April 5.—(P)—Primitive Indians searching for treasure found Newton C. Marshall of Milwaukee, Wis., alive today, the sole survivor of an airplane accident March 10 in the Bolivar-Valle department which took a reported toll of five lives, an official announcement said.

Weak and ill, Marshall had wandered for weeks through the dense jungles of that mountainous region. Marshall was completely exhausted and found it almost impossible to talk when he was located by a tribe of Indians called the Guagueros, famed for the use of poison arrows in years gone by. The Scandia airline, which owned the plane, rushed a physician and nurse from Cali aboard a special plane, and two employees of the company were sent from Bogota to the region where Marshall was reported located.

JOHNSON TO TALK AT WORLD MEETING

International recognition of the achievement of Dr. W. T. Johnson, poultry pathologist at Oregon State college, in working out a new and successful vaccination for owl pox, has come in the form of an invitation for him to speak on this subject at the International Veterinary congress to be in New York this summer.

This is the first time that this famous world wide body has met in the United States and the gathering is attracting much attention. Dr. Johnson and two scientists from California are the only men west of the Mississippi river to appear on the program.

Dr. Johnson was the first to develop a successful method of using live, unattenuated virus in vaccinating for chicken pox. He made it so safe and simple that it is now used by the ordinary grower. Since its introduction outbreaks of this widely distributed disease of chickens and turkeys have become easily preventable.

Forest Service May Go Over to Interior's Rule

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(P)—There is more than an even chance, leaders of the house public lands committee indicated today, that the huge forest service will be transferred to the interior department upon enactment of the Taylor public domain bill. The bill, written by Representative Taylor (D-Colo.) and supported by the administration, would vest control of 173,000,000 acres of public grazing lands in the interior department.

Billion Dollar Issue is Going Well, Reported

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(P)—Secretary Morgenthau finds the treasury's new billion dollar bond issue going over "very well" on the basis of the first day reports. New cash is not being sought. The only subscriptions the treasury will accept are two issues to outstanding securities—a billion is called fourth liberty bonds and \$244,234,600 in notes. "We will give a reasonable time for owners of these obligations to exchange them," Morgenthau replied when asked how long subscriptions would remain open.

BOUILLARD WINNER
NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 5.—(P)—Lou Bouillard, the clever Frenchman from Worcester, Mass., won a decision over Bob Olin of New York at the Arena tonight in a close 10-round battle in which the New York fighter hit the canvas once for the count of three.

LA PAZ, Bolivia, April 5.—(P)—Two women were killed in a short-lived revolution of a group of military cadets here today. The cadets made a surprise attack on police stations, occupying them and firing at Carabineros from the windows of the building.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 5.—(P)—Col. Frank Knox, publisher of the Chicago Daily News, tonight called upon republicans to adopt a policy of "Recovery but not revolution."

The present administration, Col. Knox said, had abandoned its principles of democracy in favor of government percepts that were tried out 400 years ago and found wanting—the Guild concepts of the middle ages.

The Roosevelt program, he added, also smacks of the fascism existing in Germany and Italy and "is unquestionably the underlying concept of the soviet republic of Russia."

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WOODBURN BANK Dividend Made
An initial liquidating dividend of 10 percent on savings accounts in the Bank of Woodburn was authorized here yesterday by Judge L. G. Lewelling. The dividend totals \$9453. One depositor will receive \$747 from the payment. The bank was turned over last summer to A. A. Schramm, state banking superintendent, for liquidation. During the period in which it was restricted, some small releases were made both to savings and to commercial depositors.

BRAIN TRUST USES PROPAGANDA, HELD

NEW YORK, April 5.—(P)—The "Brain Trust," says Dr. William A. Wirt in the fifth installment of his copyrighted pamphlet attacking regimentation as a means of economic recovery, depends upon propaganda as the means of overthrowing the present social order.

"It was frankly told," Wirt continues, "that I underestimated the power of propaganda. That they could make the newspapers and magazines beg for mercy by threatening to take away much of their advertising. That they could make the financiers be good by showing up at public investigations to crooks in the game, and that the power of public investigation in their hands alone would make the cold chills run up and down the spines of business leaders and politicians—honest men as well as crooks. Note the recent despicable efforts to destroy the reputation of Colonel Lindbergh."

"They were sure they could depend upon the psychology of empty stomachs and they would keep the stomachs empty."

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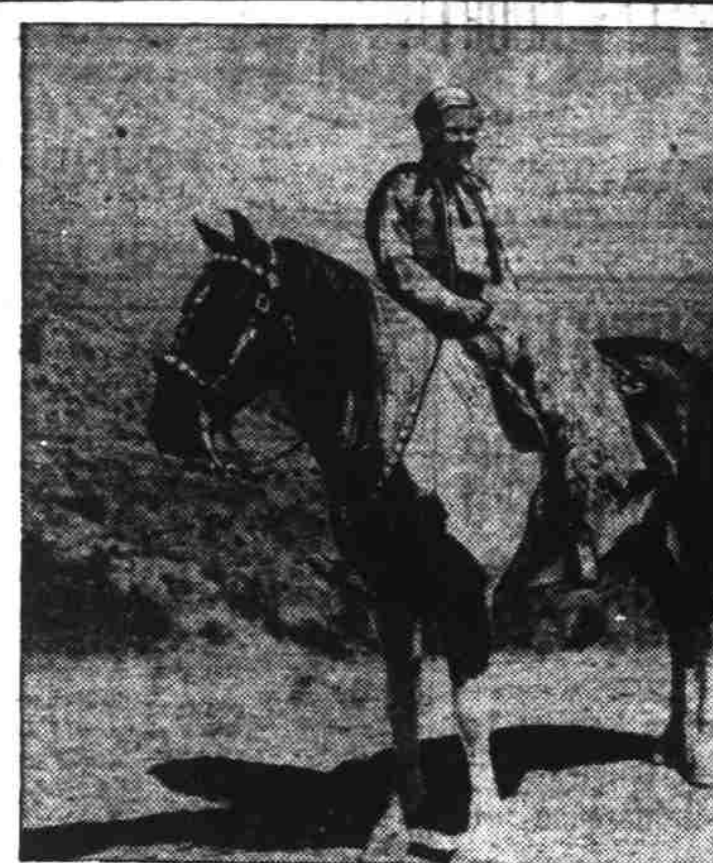

ROOSEVELT PARTY SCHEME DEFEATED

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(P)—A shield frequently used to protect presidential recommendations was welded today by house leaders to make certain an amendment approved by President Roosevelt did not get into the home loan bank bill.

They brought up and passed under a procedure that forbade the offering of amendments, the measure to guarantee the principal as well as the interest of bonds issued by the home loan corporation.

The procedure did not allow the offering of an amendment which would have stipulated that party affiliation not be considered in selecting employees for the corporation. The senate had put such an amendment in the bill and the house banking committee took it out.

Republicans warned in debate they intended to make a campaign issue of the political amendment. On the final roll call, there was only one dissenting vote and that by a democrat—Representative Kennedy of New York.

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MEDICA SMASHES ANOTHER RECORD

OHIO NATATORIUM, Columbus, O., April 5.—(P)—Three new world marks and one A. A. U. standard were written into the records here today in the first day's competition of the annual national amateur athletic union's indoor championships.

A 17-year-old Patterson, N. J., high school lad, Al Yande Weghe, sporting the colors of the Newark A. C., lowered the world's standard in the 150-yard back stroke when he won the event in the remarkable time of 1:36.9.

Another world mark went by the boards this afternoon when Taylor Drysdale, of the University of Michigan, won his heat in the 300 yard medley, lowering the mark made by Buster Crabbe in 1932.

The third world mark to fall was no made in actual competition.

However, it was sanctioned by A. A. U. officials and will stand. Faced by two Ohio State university tankmen, Jack Medica of the University of Washington, negotiated the 400 yard free style in 4:16. The old mark of 4:20 flat was held by Ralph Flannigan.

California Crop Summer Celery Due for Decrease

A preliminary estimate of acreage for cantaloupes in the Imperial Valley, Calif., indicates a decrease of 21 per cent from the 1933 crop, or 27,904 acres this season. Of this, 3,837 acres are planted to Honeydews and 2,550 acres to Honeyballs.

The California summer celery crop is estimated at \$27,000 two-thirds size crates, compared to \$44,000 last year, a probable decrease of 17 per cent. Reported acreage, 1,350, and expected yield per acre, 338 crates, are both 10 per cent below last year. A three per cent decrease in lettuce for Arizona, and California is expected.
