Daveys Surprised on Anniversary

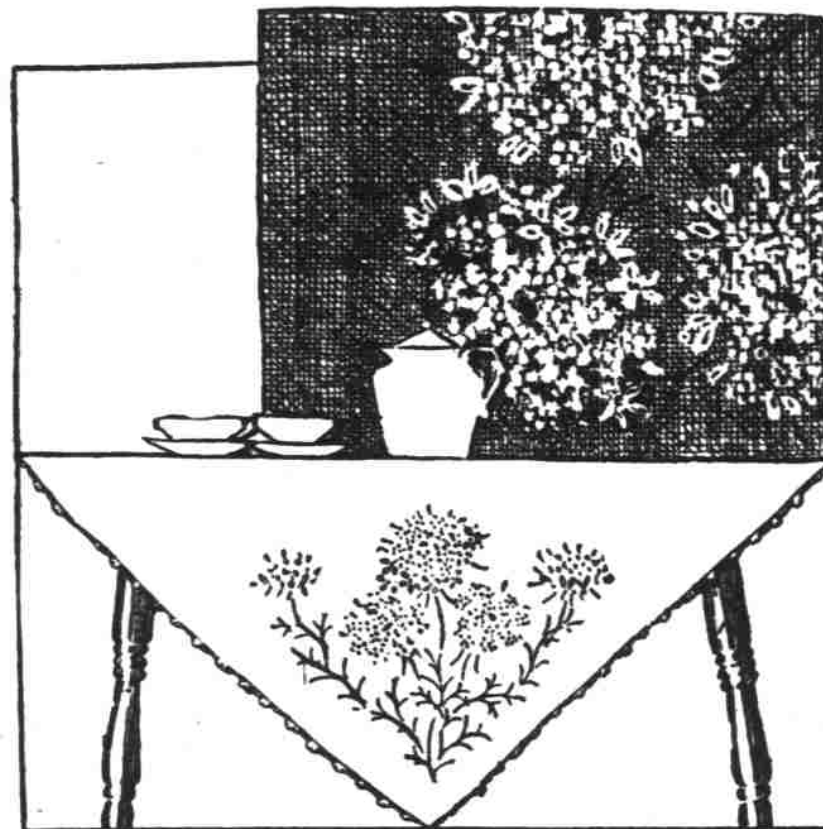

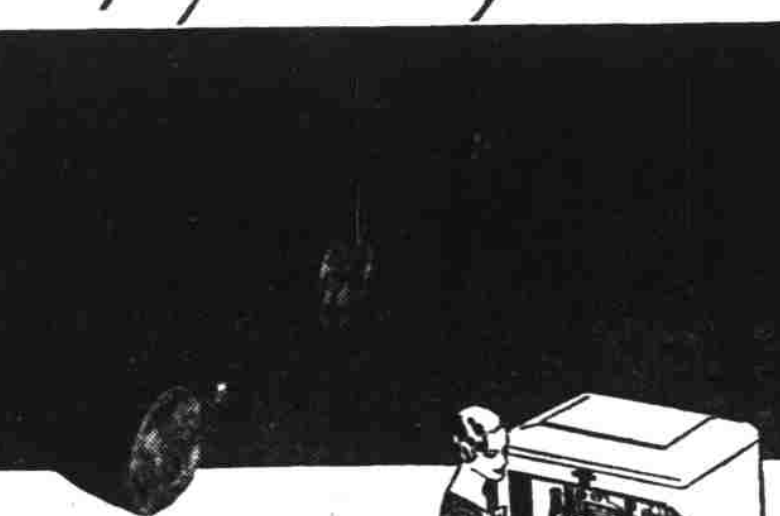
