members of the American Legion were posted ahead of time near the demonstrators.

The trucks bore banners proclaiming "billions for war—\$1.20 a week for unemployed."

A spectator leaped at one truck, tearing off the banner. War veterans overtook the other truck at Ninth avenue and Union street, pulling its cargo of three young men into the street. Hundreds of spectators swarmed after the veterans, milling about. At the end of this melee, the three young men, considerably beaten, were held for police, whose shrieking sirens announced reinforcements.

Young women of an American Legion auxiliary were being introduced to the audience when placards were exhibited inside the hall, saying—

"Down with war. Down with preparedness. War is mass murder. Wall street chooses—youth loses."

threatened to ballot on a strike Saturday if denied higher wages.

Alabama coal operators shut down their mines Friday, throwing 15,000 men out of work, holding that they could not meet the wage and hour provision of the latest NRA decree. At the same time they asked an injunction in federal court to halt enforcement of the code and its seven hour day.

Federal Judge C. B. Kennamer at Birmingham granted the injunction for a 10-day period.

Coal miners in Illinois were partly idle, 1,700 in Saline county alone being unemployed while Sahara and Wagon Coal company officials tried to iron out contract difficulties precipitated by the 35 hour week edict.

A spokesman for Weirton Steel company employees told the senate labor committee at Washington the Weirton management had never coerced employees, and asserted the American Federation of Labor and the United Mine Workers of America were "racketeers." The labor board, he said, was dominated by the American Federation of Labor and politicians.

PLAN TO DENATURE LOW GRADE WHEAT

ROME, April 6. — (AP) — A plan to use wheat in producing pork and beef instead of bread and thus help farmers get higher prices was approved today by the world advisory commission.

Under the scheme, one of a comprehensive program to rehabilitate one of the world's oldest and most important commodities, an international agreement to denature low-quality wheat would be recommended to the various governments for their signatures.

The 35 representatives of 15 countries meeting here to find ways for restricting production and increasing consumption believed the idea has a present and a future. To remove from the present huge stocks the low grade wheats, treat them with chemicals, and turn them over to cattlemen for animal food, and to remove in the future all low-grade wheats from the world markets.

Simultaneously those experts who yesterday were discouraged by reports showing the world carryover on August 1 will be as large as last year's were pleased today by promises that France, Germany, and Italy will return to the status of importers within a year instead of seeking to become self-sufficient producers.

BARROW FREES WOUNDED CHIEF

Hot Pursuit of Desperado
Pair is on; Constable
Killed in Battle

Clyde Barrow and Raymond Hamilton, Texas killers, rattled out death again today.

Caught mired in a mudhole, two outlaws shot down Cal Campbell, 63-year-old constable, wounded and kidnapped Percy Boyd, Commerce, Okla., police chief, and sped away, accompanied by a woman officer believed to be Barrow's cigar-smoking accomplice, Bonnie Parker.

A net of officers thrown about the area ran down several reports the fugitives had been seen later in the day, but did not gain sight of the last little car in which they were riding.

Campbell was felled by a single machine gun bullet in the chest. By his side was found his revolver, with three cartridges expended.

Boyd, wounded in the face and shoulder, was forced roughly into the outlaws' car while blood streamed down his face.

POSTAL OFFICIAL FIRED FOR CAUSE

WASHINGTON, April 6. — (AP) — A repercussion of the airmail investigation testimony today sent to the sidelines the assistant superintendent of railway mail service in the postoffice department, Chase C. Gove.

Gove was suspended from duty, explained Harless Branch, assistant postmaster general, pending completion of investigation of testimony by Paul Henderson, vice president of United Aircraft, that Gove had borrowed \$10,000 from him.

Along with this the postoffice department announced new steps toward ultimate restoration of complete airmail service.

The army takes over another air route on the present army schedule.

Shortly before word of the new route became public, the postoffice department announced its specifications for four additional routes, advertised for private contract service.

ANTI-WAR PARADE STAGED AT EUGENE

EUGENE, April 6. — (AP) — Banners declaring "the army builds men to kill them," and other anti-war placards were paraded today by a group of University of Oregon students togged in various pieces of old military uniforms and helmets.

Their leader, Wallace J. Campbell, graduate student in sociology, said, "Army day is an occasion for patriotic demonstrations. We believe those people most patriotic who most earnestly oppose war."

A number of the students were members of the "Radical club," student anti-war organization.

Other placards bore such slogans as "Protect our munitions makers," "Generals die in bed or run for governor," "The profiteer is not without honor in his own country," "Less for education — more for eradication."

ROOSEVELT'S SKILL AT FISHING PROBED

MIAMI, Fla., April 6. — (AP) — President Roosevelt agreed today to submit to a close examining committee on his fishing qualifications.

In response to his request for an investigation of the story of his son Elliott that other members of the Nourmahal party were catching all the fish, the White House correspondents here volunteered.

"Fishing data on hand," replied Mr. Roosevelt today in accepting the inquiry, "Witnesses will waive immunity."

The president suggested that the inquiry be held Monday noon, when he will be in the vicinity of Cat Cay, far down in the Bahamas Islands.

The Nourmahal was near Anguilla island at the southern end of Salt Key banks tonight for another round of fishing and inside sources reported the president was doing some real practice work.

ORIENTAL BATTLE WAGED, PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6. — (AP) — Oaths, imprecations and cries for police were shrieked in occidental and oriental languages as a fugitive was pursued and felled with the butt of a loaded .33 caliber revolver in Chinatown here today.

Police said Harry Fong, intended target for the gas pipe, related that Sinus attempted to grab his roll of about \$100 in currency as Fong was paying his bill at China Inn yesterday.

Today Sinus allegedly visited Fong's establishment with the business-like bludgeon. However Sinus failed to reckon with Fong's able employee, Chin Hing, who grabbed the house gun and started a counter attack. PRECINCT FILINGS SET RECORDS HERE

67 Republicans, 64 Demos
Out; Rise of Bourbon
Hopes Reflected

The greatest number of filings for precinct committeemanship in the history of Marion county has just been completed, U. G. Boyer, county clerk, reports. Candidates on the republican ballot total 67 and on the democratic ticket 64. There are 79 precinct committee posts to fill. Since a number of candidates are contesting for the same post, about 20 precincts have no candidates on either ticket. These positions will be filled by appointment of the party's county central committeeman after the primary vote is canvassed.

STATE BANKS NOW IN GOOD POSITION

Capital Debentures Issued
to RFC in Excess of
Million, Stated

State banks throughout Oregon have issued upwards of one million dollars in capital debentures within the last month, to RFC, A. A. Schramm, state banking superintendent, announced yesterday. He said the capital structure of the state banks was now the soundest it had been for many years.

Many of the banks selling these debentures have charged off from their assets an amount sufficient to equal the debenture payment money which have come from RFC. While the bulk of the assets are recoverable, they have been charged off to give the banks the liquidity demanded by the Deposit Insurance corporation.

Schramm said the problem bothering many bankers now was how to employ their money at sufficient return to pay RFC the four per cent interest on the debentures issued to it, and at the same time to keep the liquidity and solvency demanded by the insurance corporation.

Home Owners' Loan corporation applications have been filed by the state banking department in liquidating many of the assets of closed banks. Schramm said yesterday he expected to receive many loans for these banks from HOLC and thus make available early liquidation dividends to the depositors of the closed institutions.

LEGION DANGEROUS, EDUCATOR ASSERTS

SPOKANE, Wash., April 6. — (AP) — "Because they live in memories the American Legion and D. A. R. were branded as 'dangerous' by an eminent educator here today."

The speaker, Dr. Alexander Melkielejohn, education research scholar at the University of California, addressed the general session of the Inland Empire Education association convention, which closed tonight.

The football star whose sun had set after his graduation from college also was included in the "dangerous" category by Dr. Melkielejohn "because he, too, lives in memories."

Dr. Melkielejohn did not further define his meaning of "dangerous."

His topic was "Why Study," and he gave three answers: Because there was work to be done in the world necessary for human welfare; because colleges and schools should teach people how to play and use their freedom; because people should be educated in terms pursuant of wisdom to help adjust human relationships.

Snell Stresses Service When He Opens Campaign

PORTLAND, April 6. — (AP) — The position of secretary of state is a "sacred trust," Speaker Earl Snell of the state legislature said tonight in launching his campaign for the republican nomination to the secretaryship.

Snell pledged that if elected his "guiding star will be service: A sincere and honest devotion to the duties and responsibilities of the office; and . . . advancement of the best interests of all the people."

WASHINGTON, April 6. — (AP) — The senate restaurant today served "fried kingfish."

The menu made no reference to Senator Long of Louisiana, who dominated senate debate yesterday and who had frequently referred to himself as "the Kingfish."
