BISHOP WARNER RALLY SPEAKER

At Evangelical Church on Sunday; Union Under Way Nationally

Bishop Ira D. Warner, presiding officer of the Pacific District of the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, will be the guest speaker Sunday at the First Evangelical church, Salem, Oregon. Rev. Emory W. Pettiford, D. D., minister.

Bishop Warner is a member of the commission on church union of his denomination which is conducting negotiations with the Evangelical church looking toward the merger of these two bodies.

The commissions of the church union of these two denominations have been in session during the past few weeks in Dayton, Ohio, and Bishop Warner will bring to the gathering here, April 8, the latest news of the proceedings toward merger.

Merger Under Way—The general conference of the Evangelical church, which convenes every four years, will hold its sessions in Akron, Ohio, next October. Some aspects of the merger question will very likely come before the gathering.

Both denominations had their origins in Pennsylvania in the last quarter of the 18th century. Philip Otterbein founded the United Brethren church, and Jacob Albright the Evangelical church. Both were of German extraction. Statistics for 1933 follow:

United Brethren: Organized congregations, 3,000; membership, 400,000; itinerant preachers, 1,386; local preachers, 600; Sunday schools, 2,845; Sunday school enrollment, 450,000; young people's societies, 2,000; membership in Y. P. societies, 38,507; American conferences, 33; total property value, \$48,000,000.

Evangelical: Organized congregations, 3,900; membership, 267,000; itinerant preachers, 1,657; local preachers, 340; Sunday schools, 2,051; Sunday school enrollment, 320,150; young people's societies, 1,900; membership in Y. P. societies, 48,804; American conferences, 26; total property value, \$30,896,000.

Services Sunday—The gathering here, April 8, is the annual Spring Rally of the First Evangelical church, with Bishop Warner as the guest speaker. There will be three great services on that day, at 10:45 a.m. and at 2:30 and 7:30 p.m.

In the afternoon and evening services the following ministers and their congregations will join in the rally: Rev. R. W. Benson, of the English United Brethren church; Rev. J. H. Wortman of the Hazel Green United Brethren church; Rev. Dean L. Vermillion of the Fruitland Evangelical church, and Rev. G. F. Liening Jr., of the Salem Circuit of the Evangelical church.

Easter Sunday was a very successful day at the First Evangelical church with over 1100 present during the services of the day. A greater number is expected for the Rally Day Services on April 8th.

The pastor, Dr. Emory W. Pettiford, will close the second year of his ministry here on "Salem May the 31st." The annual conference will convene in Corvallis during the first part of the month of June.

Perks Revivals Will Close With Water Baptism

The Perks evangelistic party that has been holding meetings for the past five weeks at Evangelical Tabernacle will close their services Sunday evening with a water baptism service. The evangelist, Mollie Perks, will speak in the morning on "God's Afterward." And in the evening on "The Sin That Has No Forgiveness." Evangelist Cecil Perks will sing "The Songs My Mother Sang to Me" and "Give Me Jesus."

Pastor Weston states that the campaign has been one of the best ever held at Evangelical Tabernacle. Results have been excellent and attendance has been very good. "We are preparing for a large crowd on the closing day, when many are to be baptized in water," says he.

The Tabernacle is located on Ferry street at Thirteenth, one block south and one east from the supreme court building.

GILSTRAP DEEMED RECKLESS DRIVER

\$50 Fine and Ten Days Jail is Sentence; Views of Witnesses Differ

Jury hearing reckless driving charges tried in justice court yesterday afternoon against Owen Gilstrap, 21, took less than an hour to find a verdict of guilty. Judge Miller Hayden fined Gilstrap \$50 and sentenced him to 10 days in jail, whereupon his attorney, Martin Ferrey, appealed the case.

The case grew out of an accident on the Gratum road last January 18, when truck driven by Gilstrap ran into wagon driven by W. M. Pound and killed three horses owned by A. A. Geer, 845 Marion street. Gilstrap and H. T. Hoke, riding with him were injured, Hoke seriously.

Pound, Hoke and Gilstrap were the only eye witnesses. Pound claimed he was driving the horses and wagon on his side of the road. Gilstrap claimed the wagon was on Gilstrap's side of the road, and in order to avoid a crash which would take human life, he drove to the opposite side of the road. Pound meanwhile pulling the team toward his lawful side of the road. Ferrey claimed Gilstrap had not been criminally negligent or reckless.

Gilstrap testified the truck, eight tons with load, could not safely stop in less than 175 feet, while horses were only about a hundred feet away when he first saw them upon coming over crest of hill. Only other defense witness was Hoke.

Deputy District Attorney Lyle Page called as state witnesses Pound, Dave Ramseyer, F. S. Bowers, R. M. Cunningham, A. A. Geer and State Officer Bloom. Page contended Gilstrap did not show due regard for safety of others in operating the truck at such a speed it would take him from 100 to 175 feet in which to stop.

Members of the jury were J. D. Foley, Henry W. Zobel, W. R. Latimer, Frank Reeves, George O. Savage and R. C. Hunter.

22 BURN TO DEATH IN OREGON IN 1933

Twenty-two persons died and 173 others were injured as the result of fires during 1933, A. H. Averill, state fire marshal, reported yesterday.

Insured losses of \$53,372,640 were involved in fires during the year with an actual loss of \$2,713,360. This was a decrease in actual losses of 35 per cent when compared with the figures for 1932.

The increased efficiency of fire control was clearly shown by the drop in the number of actual losses to the round values involved of 6.58 per cent in 1931, approximately 5.1 per cent in 1932 and a new all-time low record of 3.25 per cent in 1933. Precautionary methods taken by the public, systematic inspection and fire prevention work, have resulted in a reduction of 30.8 per cent in the number of fires.

WALDPORT CASE IS OF INTEREST HERE

City Sued by Water Utility Owner for Encroaching on His Business

Arguments heard this week in the state supreme court in a damage action case brought by Zenas Copeland of Waldport against the City of Waldport, were listened to by a number of Salem citizens, some of whom asserted that the case paralleled the proposed action by the City of Salem.

Copeland asked \$49,500 in damages, claiming that his water distribution system in Waldport had been ruined when the city went into the business on its own behalf. Copeland has a franchise for 42 years. He asserted that the franchise gave him the right to sell water, that the municipality could not take this right without paying a fair price for his plant and that the city council had not followed Waldport's charter in considering his offer to sell his plant.

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Counsel for Copeland admitted that his franchise did not specifically state that it was exclusive. However Pennsylvania cases were cited in which the courts there held that any city which granted a franchise to a private concern, was bound to stay out of the business for which the franchise was granted unless that business was condemned and taken over at a fair price or until the franchise expired.

Chris J. Kowitz, Salem city attorney, said yesterday he thought the case did not bear on the Salem situation. He said the water company's franchise did not expire until 1941 but he declared the franchise expressly stated that the city at any time could operate its own water plant, with or without taking over the existing water distribution facilities.

Much interest in the new dairy milk control board and its functions has been evinced at meetings the past week with dairymen, producers and consumers in Independence, Amity and Silverton. Eugene Chadwick, field representative, stated here yesterday.
