

Stumpf Becomes Oldsmobile Dealer in Salem Territory

AGENCY TO BE OPEN APRIL 14

Location on Center Street is Acquired; New Agent's Experience Wide

Otto C. Stumpf, zone business manager of the Oldsmobile works at Portland, has resigned his position to become Oldsmobile dealer in Salem. He will be assisted in the management of the business here by his brother, Arthur A. Stumpf, who has been employed by another unit of General Motors at Los Angeles. They have taken over the old Loder Brothers stand at 445 Center street and will open April 14 when renovations will be completed.

O. C. Stumpf has been connected with General Motors in an executive capacity for over 15 years, having started with Chevrolet company as a retail salesman. In 1927 at time of the inauguration of the General Motors dealers' standard accounting system, Mr. Stumpf was appointed zone business manager for Chevrolet company at St. Louis. He has held similar positions at Kansas City and Los Angeles, and was for three years business manager of Pacific coast region for Chevrolet with headquarters at Oakland, Cal.

In commenting on his appointment as dealer at Salem for Oldsmobile, Mr. Stumpf stated that in his opinion Oldsmobile equipped with a super-hydraulic brake, knee action, the same as the higher priced General Motors cars, center control steering and ride stabilizer at a price slightly higher than the lowest priced cars, Oldsmobile affords the purchaser of motor cars an opportunity that even the more conservative can not overlook.

Mr. Stumpf is very enthusiastic over the prospects in Salem. He and his family have moved here from Portland and reside at 1775 Fairground avenue. He states that he has been desirous of securing a dealer connection for quite some time and is exceedingly hopeful over the opportunities afforded in Salem. This city appealed to him when he first contacted local dealers in 1929, he says. He is particularly impressed by the home spirit, hospitality of the people and the diversified income presented in this area.

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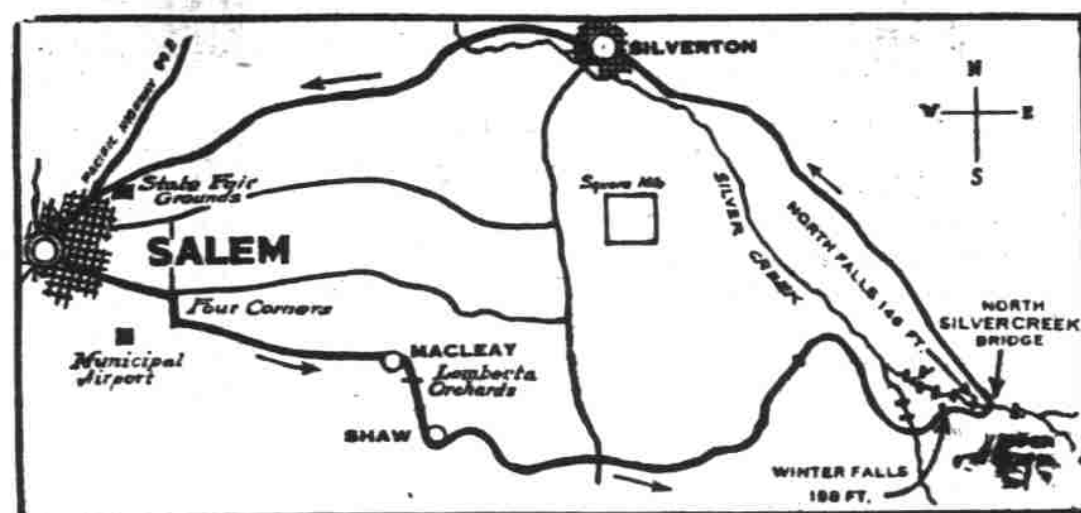
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Auto Routes for Week-End Trips

NINE FALLS SEEN ON SILVER LOOP

A most interesting trip from Salem is the Silver Creek Falls loop trip. The total distance of the trip is 57 miles, and anyone will find it most interesting.

In the Silver Falls state park one may visit nine of the most beautiful falls in the west. Forest trails lead from the road to the falls, and they all may be reached by walking only four and a half miles. One does not have to visit all the falls; the distance is too much. One may drive right to some of them.

One may walk over, underneath and behind several of these falls. At the south falls one may look

down 184 feet of falling water or you may go down below and look up the 184 feet and watch the water fall. At the lower falls about a half mile below the South falls one may see a wide waterfall curtain dropping 100 feet.

Leaving Salem for the falls we go out State street by the penitentiary out to the Four Corners. He who jogs to the right until we come to the first road turning east. We continue on this road passing through Macleay and Shaw and when we arrive at the North Silver Creek bridge we find that we have traveled 28 miles. From here to Silverton is another 14 miles, or a total distance of 42 miles. From Silverton to Salem is 15 miles, making the total loop trip 57 miles. Perhaps the best route is by way of Silverton, but there are many who prefer to go the other road. The loop gives a variety of road and scenery and makes a fine afternoon drive.

Former Resident Dies at Longview

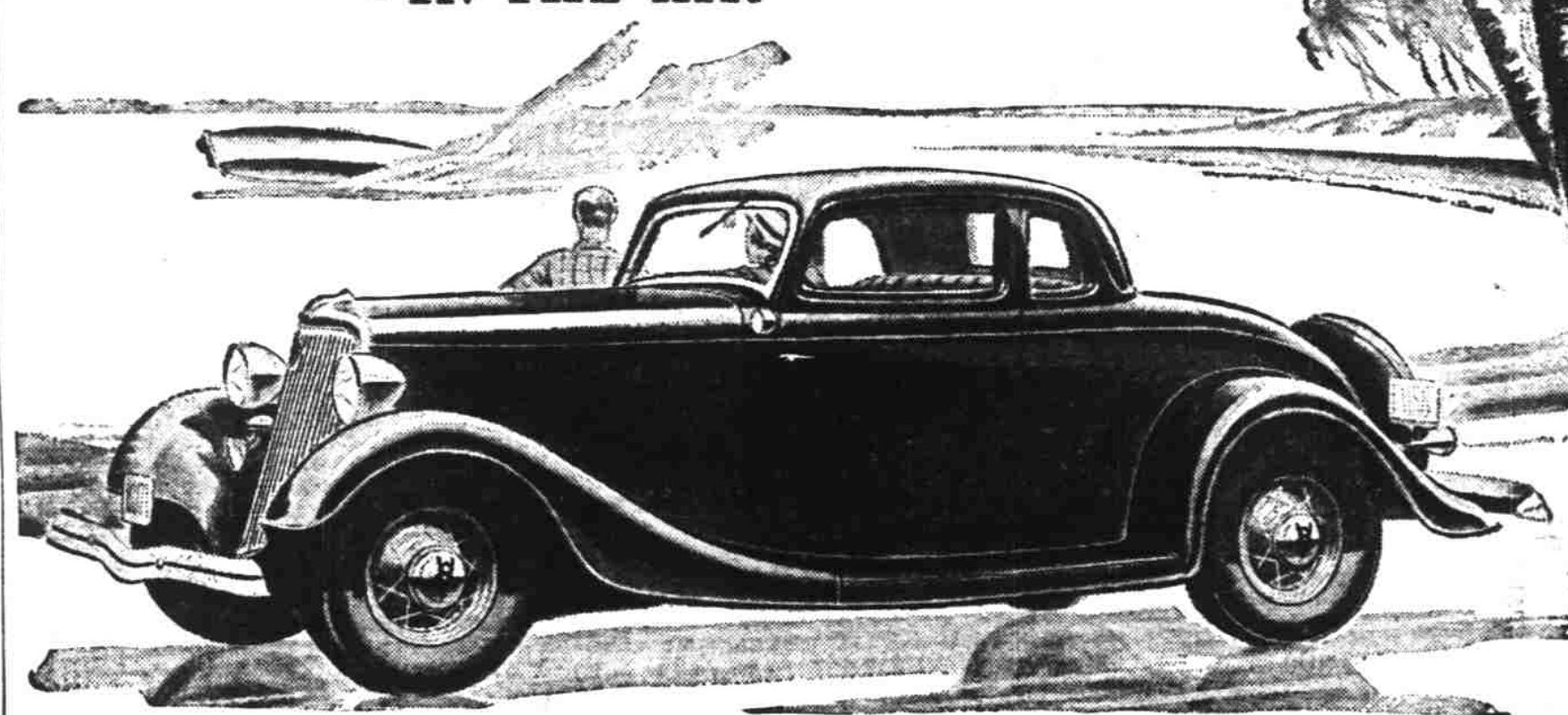

He was born at Woodburn, December 24, 1919, he was married to Mary Fenton, who, with a daughter, Velma, survive. Others surviving are his mother, Mrs. Addie Palmater of Stayton; a half-brother, Albert of Woodburn, and step-brother and sister, Oral and Winnie Palmater of Woodburn.

He had made his home at Longview for the past five years where he was employed by the Weyerhaeuser mill. He was vice-president of the 4-L and assistant historian of the Van Cleave clan. He was laid to rest in the Longview cemetery with full military honors.
