ally cannot pay for damage done by the cars they drive."
A state-wide poll showed 81 per cent of those answering in favor of instituting efforts for state prohibition, Dr. Milton A. Marcy reported.

To the question, "Is enforcement of the liquor law in your community proving satisfactory?" 86 per cent answered "No," he said.

The survey also showed high percentages reporting that conditions were worse regarding use of liquor by youth, use in the home, drunkenness on the streets, drunk driving, bootlegging and juvenile delinquency.

"Sentiment is strongly in favor of some immediate action, and this should be in the nature of education in temperance and in legislative reform," Dr. Marcy declared. The survey termed conditions far worse than in prohibition days and more dangerous than the old saloon days.

HOLMAN AVERS HE WILL NOT RESIGN

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, has no intention of resigning his office while he is a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. He made this plain yesterday in an oral statement saying he would probably comment in more detail on the matter later in the campaign.

"I don't see any reason I should resign now," he said. The state treasurer said he would consider resigning should he receive the republican nomination. His declaration followed the adopting by the Macleay grange of a resolution asking his immediate resignation as treasurer. The grange in its statement said Holman should resign "so that a servant of the people's choice may be nominated and elected."

The state treasurer pointed out that the resolution, to his knowledge, had been adopted by only one grange and that organization one in Marion county where State Senator Brown is being strongly supported by various farm groups in his race for the republican nomination for governor.

ENVOY TO IRELAND DIES AT BANQUET

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, April 9.—(P)—William Wallace McDowell, American minister to the Irish Free State, collapsed at an official banquet given in his honor tonight and died within a few minutes.

The death caused such confusion the identity of the dead man was not established definitely for some time. As he was responding to speeches of congratulation the minister faltered and collapsed of a heart attack.

President De Valera, who was sitting beside the minister, and several other persons at the table gave him assistance but he died within a few minutes.

DUBLIN, April 10.—(P)—(Tuesday)—The Irish Press, President De Valera's newspaper, ran an editorial entitled "Sorrow," expressing profound grief today at the death of American Minister William Wallace McDowell.

understanding of the finest things in this sphere of culture qualified her to select the best.

"It is further resolved, that this gift will be called the Martha Draper Burghardt collection, and that additions as they accumulate shall be likewise included under that name."

Mrs. Burghardt, whose musical ability and talent will be well remembered, carefully built her library here and while she was abroad. Its range is a wide one—from eighteenth-century composers, Bocherini, Couperin, and Rameau to the ultra-modern Honnegger's Le Roi David, a psalm symphony and several of his other works. There is a fine collection of the Russian composers represented by Tchaikovsky, Rachmaninoff, Stravinsky, Rimski-Korsakov, and Scriabin, who was regarded as the leader of the futuristic school of music.

There are selections of the Spanish composers, Manuel Infante, Albeniz, and Manuel de Falla. The collection also includes many compositions by Chopin, Brahms, Debussy, Schumann, and Schubert, as well as others. Each piece of music will be adequately marked with a beautiful and appropriately designed bookplate which Mr. Burghardt has had made.

Music lovers will be glad to know that the music is being catalogued and prepared for circulation, use, and appreciation.

JOHN V. WEBBER IS CALLED BY DEATH

MONMOUTH, April 9.—John V. Webber, 75, well known resident of this community, died Sunday at the family home after a long period of ill health. He was born at Colfax, Cal., January 21, 1859, and at the age of 10 accompanied his parents to Reno, where he was educated.

For a time he lived in Walla Walla, serving as a penitentiary guard. While in that region he became acquainted with Hank Vaughn, famous bad man of his day. He always said that he and Hank had no conflict, since he wasn't afraid of Hank, who left folks alone if they did not fear him.

The Webber family located at Monmouth in 1911, operating a chicken farm. For many years Mr. Webber was active as a carpenter, but impaired health in the past six years had curtailed his activities.

Surviving are Mrs. Webber and three children, Mrs. Ona Cordill of Reno, John X. Webber of Seattle, and Mrs. Jessie Kemper of Los Angeles. Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

LEGISLATORS' PAST FOUND INTERESTING

Milo Ross of Willamette is Compiler of Data Upon Racial History

Senator Sam Brown of Gervais was found to be one-half English, Irish strain and one-half German. Ross's inquiries into the senator's family history revealed that his parents emigrated to California just before the gold rush and that Brown's father was about to start a sawmill employing 40 men, when the gold rush started and no men stayed to run the mill. Brown's father joined the trek for gold, was successful to the extent of \$20,000 and came north temporarily to visit with Mrs. Brown at the latter's parents who had moved to Oregon. The Browns then decided to remain in Oregon and settled at Gervais where Sam was born. The senator's father at times rued the fact that he had not remained in the south, recalling that lots he was offered in San Francisco for \$15 became worth a fortune.

The family line of Romeo Gouley of Brooks was found to be one-half French and one-half English. His grandfather was French, the name being Goulet. His grandfather's name on his mother's side was F. G. Lowell and English of a noble family, who emigrated to the west coast by coming around the Horn. The Lowell's settled in the Homere district and Mr. Lowell took a prominent part in the mill at Parkersville, being the first millwright on the coast.

While the family strain of Earl C. Snell, house painter, shows a 10-16ths English strain, the family name was originally spelled Schnell, in German fashion. Four-sixteenths of Snell's family composition is French.

J. K. Weatherford, Jr., of Albany has several marks of distinction, one of them being that he is a descendant of Chief Weatherford of Virginia and claims about one-sixteenth Indian blood in his veins. Ross found Weatherford to have the largest head in the house, well-proportioned, however, and not unduly large considering Weatherford was the largest man in the house. He wears an eight and one-half size hat.

Joe E. Dunne, Multnomah county senator and now a candidate for the republican nomination for governor, is proud of the fact that a one-fourth portion of his racial composition is Spanish, the remaining three-fourths being equally divided between Scotch, Irish and Welsh ancestors. Dunne told Ross his grandmother was a Spanish duchess of the name of Castinolia. One of Dunne's ancestors were numerous ruling princes in Ireland in the kingdoms of Westford, Kildare, Heath, Tipperary and West Heath districts, Dunne said, which were never conquered by England.

Frank J. Loneragan, another candidate for governor, is a direct descendant of Old Ireland, both of his parents being born there. Otto K. Paulus, Marion county representative, traces his family directly to Germany, his grandfather being a resident of the Rhineland and his mother coming from Hesse, being brought up in the family house occupied by her forebears for several hundreds of years.

John D. Goss, Coos Bay senator and a candidate for the democratic nomination for congress, was found to be 10-16ths English descent, 4-16ths Welsh and 2-16ths Indian. Ross found this curious fact about Goss's name: in Cornish, Goss means woods and the word "coos" in Cornish also means woods; in Oregon Goss lives in Coos. Ross said the senator had a small strain of French in his racial makeup.

DALLAS, April 9.—A new Polk county grand jury was selected here when the spring term of circuit court opened. The new group went into session shortly after being selected and will make their report to Judge Arlie G. Walker some time this week.

H. D. Hitt of Independence was named as foreman of the grand jury, and others named on the group were G. M. Partridge, Monmouth; Maude Brown, Falls City; Percy Zumwalt, Perrydale; Clyde Robbins, Pioneer; Floyd Graham, Falls City, and Kenneth Bursell, Monmouth.

Judge Walker started hearing the case of Paetsch vs. Campbell, a damage suit involving a collision here some months ago.

HOUSING NEED SEEN AT STATE HOSPITAL

Question Taken Up by Board of Control; Legislative Study Forecast

Appropriations for additional housing facilities at the two Oregon state hospitals for the insane, will have to be sought at the 1935 legislative session, Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the Salem institution, informed members of the state board of control at their monthly meeting yesterday.

Steiner declared that both the Salem and Pendleton institutions were crowded to their capacity despite the liberal parole policy that has been adopted. Steiner's statement followed a suggestion by Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, that the employment of a parole officer might tend to reduce the population of the two hospitals.

Dr. Steiner said he feared that a more liberal parole policy at the insane hospitals would result in additional grief for the members of the board of control. A report prepared by Steiner showed that his institution has kept well within its biennial appropriation. The average daily population at the local state hospital, covering a period of 12 months, was 2177, Steiner said.

Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospitals, reported three acute appendicitis cases at the Salem institution during the past three weeks. He declared that these were the first acute appendicitis cases necessitating operations that have come to his attention during the 20 years he has served as superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospitals.

The board refused to take any action in connection with the payment of claims by architects, who prepared plans and specifications for the several proposed state buildings included in the state building program.

The state treasurer presided at yesterday's meeting of the board of control in the absence of Governor Meier who is ill in Portland.

A petition signed by E. G. Neal and 87 other residents of the Union Hill district, filed with the county court yesterday, requests that the county improve the road from the end of the present Coon Hollow market road for a distance of three miles east and north to the Silver Creek Falls road.

This improvement would not be expensive, would give a short cut of 12 miles between Silverton and Mehama, via Silver falls, and would make an ideal entrance for the new Santiam Highway, the petition states. It also would make a four to six mile short cut between Sublimity and the Silver Falls country, thus igners state. The road at present is impassable because of fallen trees, underbrush and washouts.

7 POINTS IN PLAN OF OREGON BOARD

A seven-point program, having to do with the promotion and development of public projects, was adopted at a meeting of the Oregon state planning board yesterday. Besides members of the board the meeting was attended by Marshall Dana, chairman of the Pacific northwest regional planning commission, and Major Bressey, planning consultant.

The program, as outlined, follows:

Promotion and development of public works.

Making use of federal works, including the Bonneville dam project now under construction.

Land utilization and classification of land areas.

Survey of mineral resources.

Estimate of water and power resources, to fit in with President Roosevelt's plan to divide the United States into seven irrigation districts.

Cooperation with industries and their affiliated activities.

Coordination of transportation. Three important resolutions were approved. One of these urged city and county planning commissions to select immediately the projects which would qualify under the emergency relief administration.

Another endorsed the appointment of a committee by the regional commission to conduct a survey of the Columbia river drainage area with relation to flood control, prevention of soil erosion and the uses of water for power and other purposes.

The third resolution proposed a general project for the Columbia river valley, including maximum development of its resources for the benefit of the people of that area.

CHURCH STREET IS BUMPY BOULEVARD
