CO-OP PROJECT IS HELD SUCCESSFUL

Communal enterprise has created a happy home and well filled commissary for 25 men and women living in the artisan's co-operative community at an old hotel structure at Bay Ocean, declares the secretary, Mrs. Louise Smith, who makes frequent trips to Salem to make exchanges of the sea foods the colony members catch for food and clothing.

Although this colony is only six weeks old, it is already enjoying success beyond those held by individual members in the depression years, the secretary says. The nucleus of the colony came from the disbanded Black Rock colony above Falls City, but strife which came upon the colony has been entirely lacking in the artisan's unit.

The colony holds no brief for communistic theories as embraced by communism, and is in fact composed almost solely of democrats and republicans, Mrs. Smith said. The by-laws state the principles as two-fold: "Solidarity for the members and honesty in all our dealings." The members, in which the men predominate so far, are tinsmiths, mechanics, painters and similar workers.

Applications for membership are voted upon by the group at the end of spending a week probationary period in the community. In the audit each two months, 60 per cent of the money goes into the common treasury and 40 per cent is divided among the members according to hours each has worked in creating the whole.

MYSTERY PLAY BY CHEMEKETANS WINS

Chemetek Players are nightly presenting that difficult feat of committing stage murders before the eyes of the public and leaving the murderer until the final scene. Their presentation of the three-act mystery, "The Key Note," is above the average of amateur interpretation. When the problem is finally solved one is inclined to say with shallow, chattering Aggie, "I knew all the time he did it!" so plausible is the solution, so closely tied in with the preceding action, although actually unexpected.

The roles of all the characters, with the exception of Kathryn Rowe, are deceptive in their apparent simplicity. Else why should the audience find in the actions of each a suggestion of guilt or an almost positive proof of innocence? When an element of super-natural enters into the lives of decidedly practical folk their reactions are not all surface ones.

Miss Rowe as the dope addict, tool of the curiously much-hated and loved victim of the first murder, merits praise. An actress with a less pleasing voice in such a part would be joined in her spasms by those beneath the footlights, for she literally goes mad only to return to a joyous sanity when she has obtained her drug.

A part of no mean requirements is taken by Charles Livesley, in his makeup ugly a villain as he is desired and yet very evidently a respected member among the group of associates. Intentional or not, Glen Holman is the "deadpan" of the show and a plausible guilty party in more instances than any other character.

The production is good entertainment of the type which might easily have been spoiled by overacting. It is directed by Clifford Hurt and runs through Saturday night.

\$6,000,000 Roads Money Anticipated

The roads committee of the house has approved a federal appropriation of \$400,000,000 for the construction of highways in the states. Representative Martin telegraphed R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, yesterday. Martin declared that he was satisfied that the appropriation would be approved by the senate. Officials estimated that the state of Oregon would receive approximately \$6,000,000 of the total.

\$1,014,000 Check for Relief Comes

The state of Oregon yesterday received a check for \$1,014,000 from the federal government for emergency relief work for the months of April and May, the executive department announced. The money will be turned over to the relief committee. Oregon requested \$2,572,650 for relief for these two months, including transient relief work. A check for \$550,000 was received a week ago to apply against this request, in addition to the one received yesterday.

pressing forward. Many Christian churches in Japan and Korea are entirely self-supporting but they ask for missionary leaders to guide them in their work.

Stone lauded the spirit of Korean Christians, quoting one native leader who said the Korean churches could repeat word for word the whole New Testament and nearly all the Bible. The devotion and self-sacrifice of missionaries of the North Ireland Presbyterian church and Danish Lutheran church working in Manchuria came in for high tribute of praise. China, he referred to as "the greatest missionary field of the world, a civilization, not a nation."

He showed numerous posters used in educational propaganda for Christian faith in China.

Field Engineers Pulled in; Cash To Pay Lacking

Baer and Cunningham, Portland engineers retained by the city of Salem, have withdrawn their field crew from the survey that was started to locate the proposed mountain water supply line, they have notified city officials. Their surveyors, however, are compiling data already obtained to a point a little west of Sublimity.

Reason for withdrawing the crew, it was understood, was that the engineers did not care to bear the payroll expense necessary until the city sells its first issue of \$20,000 worth of water bonds to provide these funds. Bids on the bonds will be opened April 19.

Holman to Reply To Grange, Says

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, will reply to the resolution adopted recently by the Maclean Grange, urging his resignation, he announced yesterday. A copy of the resolution was received at Holman's office yesterday. Holman refused to comment on his reply other than declaring that it would be ready for release without delay.

A contribution to Cannon's campaign fight against Alfred E. Smith from Sebastian S. Kresge, chain store owner, also appeared in today's testimony. Kresge's secretary, Amos F. Gregory of Detroit, identified a check for \$1000 made out to "James Cannon Jr., chairman."

The prosecution put on the stand Russell Gregory, an employee of the former American National bank, now the closed American Bank and Trust company, of Richmond, Va., who identified ledger sheets and deposit tickets of Cannon's accounts.
