

W. U. Interclass Meet is Slated Today

ENTRY LIST TO BE EXTENSIVE

Coach Sparks to Get Line on Season Prospects; Several Veterans

Willamette university's track and field season will open today with the annual interclass meet which, if it lives up to the standard set last year, will draw an entry list of more than 50 aspirants. Coach Leslie Sparks has announced that any student is eligible except the five who were on the 440 yards up will be open only to those who have been training.

Coach Sparks will know more about his team's prospects for this season after today's meet, but a fair number of veterans will be available, among them Cook in the mile, Barrett in the 800, Brown in the two-mile, Canaday and Carpenter in the hurdles, Lloyd in the broad jump, McKersrow and Connors in the weight events. Hawk, a sprinter who did not compete last year, will be in the high jump and hurdle, and others aside from the freshman contingent.

New men include Bob Vagt from Tillamook and Crossland from Union in the weight events, Bob Clark from Myrtle Point and Harry Mosher from Salem high in the sprints, William Gillespie from Tigard and Harry Mohr from Salem high in the 440, Bob Ross from Illinois in the hurdles and Alley in the jumps.

No intercollegiate meets have been scheduled so far for this month though there probably will be at least one. The Willamette team will meet Pacific here May 5, Linfield at McMinnville May 11, will enter a five-way meet at Forest Grove May 12 and participate in the Northwest conference meet at Walla Walla May 30.

CURT COMMENTS

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Opening of the baseball season in Salem will be postponed for a week or more because of the mountainous condition of the outer pasture at Olinger field, it was indicated Thursday when Willamette university's scheduled game with the Oregon Webfeet here Saturday was transferred to Eugene. Willamette's games with Oregon State next week will both be at Corvallis.

In addition to the general upheaval on the Olinger baseball diamond caused by the tennis court and other construction, considerable dirt from Capitol street has been dumped in the outfield to fill up some low places and has not yet been spread. We hear reports that ERA will have a crew of men out there next Monday to straighten things out.

The Bearcats will go to Eugene to play Oregon today in their first intercollegiate game. Coach Spec Keene announces that he plans to start Don Burch on the mound, but won't ask him to pitch a full game even if he goes pretty well. Rex Pemberton has been showing a lot of stuff this week and he will without doubt get a trial in one of the two games. Johnny Oravee may also do some chucking. The Bearcats are showing signs of developing considerable punch at bat, but it may not make much of a rattle until later in the season.

Hollis Huntington, Salem high coach, called off spring football Thursday because with the warm weather it was becoming highly unpopular, and issued a preliminary call for baseball; the turnout was not complete because of the short notice, but there were indications that Salem high will have a stronger ball team than it had last year. Nearly all of the 1933 players are back and the pitchers especially are expected to be considerably more effective than they were a year ago.

Practically all of the Willamette athletes will be busy this weekend. The golf team plays Linfield at McMinnville today and Oregon State here Saturday; the latter may be a close contest for Oregon State beat Columbia by virtually the same score that Willamette did. The tennis team plays Oregon State at Corvallis Saturday.

Salem high trackmen — all of them who are turning out except Papkov, sprinter who pulled a muscle in the interclass meet — will go to Chemawa today for a dual meet with the Indians, who defeated Salem last year. It's Friday the 13th, too. Salem high's schedule, with room for only one more dual meet May 5, follows:

AMATEUR MAT STARS TO VIE

Most of N. W. Champions to Defend Titles; Weight Lifting of Interest

A number of outstanding amateur wrestlers of the northwest, including most of the defending champions, will be in Salem Saturday to compete in the northwest Y. M. C. A. tournament which will be held in the Salem Y. gymnasium that afternoon and night. It was indicated when entry lists began to come in Thursday. Names of 30 grapplers from other cities were on file that night with many more to come in today.

Present champions are: 115 pounds, Robert Duncan of Salem; 125, Don Hendrie of Salem; Dick Biebedorf of Portland, 135; Louis Bollen of Portland, 145; Walter Seimann of Portland, 155; Cecil Fugitt of Longview, 165; Walter Ziebell of Everett, 175. Of these, Hendrie will not compete at the weight in which he holds the title and Biebedorf will not compete at all, having thrown his shoulder out in the A. A. U. meet in Portland recently.

Portland has filed names of 11 wrestlers, led by the imposing Ben Ell, heavyweight; Tacoma also has 11 and is expected to make a strong bid for the championship; Seattle has entered two and Boise four.

For the weight lifting championships which will also be contested Saturday night starting at 7 o'clock, Portland has entered two men, Boise two and Seattle one. The Multnomah club of Portland, which will furnish the weights, is also sending a two-man exhibition team, one of these men being a national champion.

The wrestling will start at 2:30 p. m. and all matches up to the finals will be run off before 6 o'clock, two mats being used if the entry list warrants. The finals will start immediately after the weight lifting. Finals will be 10-minute matches, preliminaries six-minute.

Frank Cross of Salem, a student at University of Oregon, will represent the Salem Y. in the weight lifting. He has been practicing ever since the close of the football season.

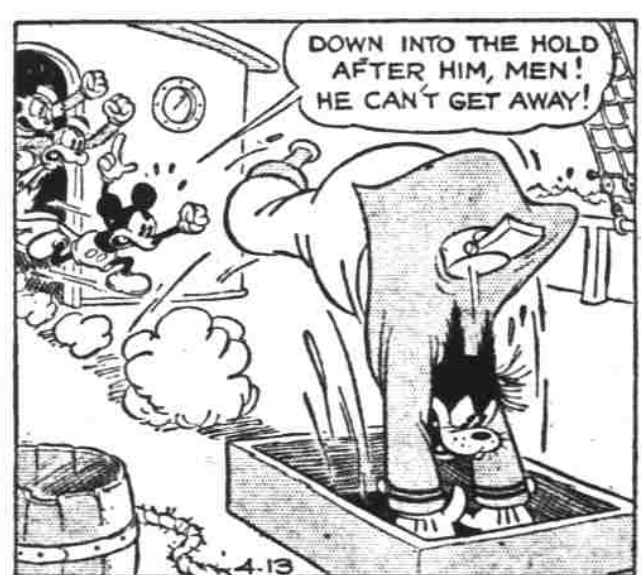

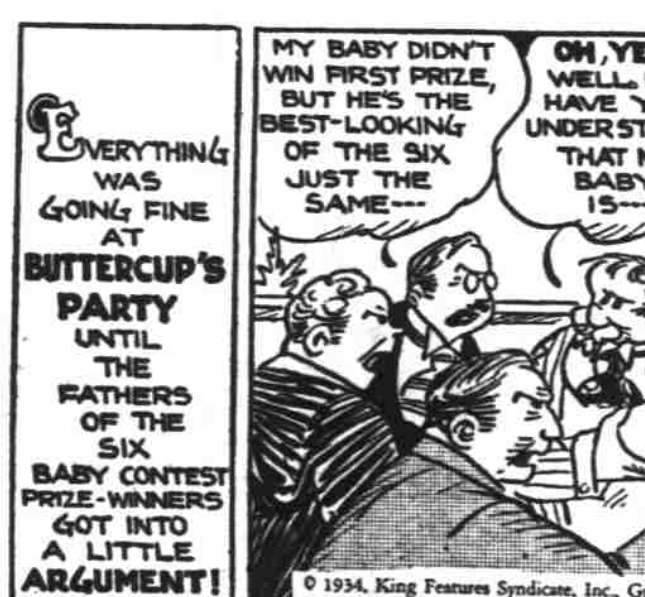
