Tax Liens Part Of Income Laws

Nothing in the pending sales tax law which is to come before the voters May 18, is more harsh as far as collection procedure is concerned, than now exists in the state income tax laws, Earl Fisher, tax commissioner, stated yesterday. Fisher said existing laws permit the commission to place a lien on personal or real property to secure a tax claim when the taxpayer does not pay and refuses to pay. "The clause in the proposed sales tax is lifted bodily from the existing income tax law," Fisher explained. He said that any time a lien was placed, it was subject to court review and to appeal, the same as any action in court.
