

AGE MARINE PILOT KILLED IN PLUNGE

NORFOLK, Va., April 12.—(AP)—His plane caught in a sleeve target towed by another airplane, First Lieutenant David L. Cloud, Jr., crack marine corps pilot

whose squadron held the Schiff award for safe flying, plunged 3000 feet to his death into the Atlantic ocean about a half mile off Virginia beach today. Although two other pilots in the squadron engaged in gunnery practice saw Lieutenant Cloud's parachute open when he jumped from the falling machine, neither the body nor the machine had been recovered tonight. The sleeve target, a light fabric tube approximately 25 feet long

and three feet in diameter, was being towed by First Lieutenant Thomas G. Ennis, U. S. M. C. It was the target at which Cloud had been firing, together with First Lieutenants John Wehle and Edward A. Montgomery. Fellow officers saw Cloud, who was flying a single seater Boeing fighter, fly into the filmy target which caught on the upper wing. The plane swerved upward, then turned into a spin and headed for the water. The slight cotton rope by which the target was being towed snapped and Ennis' plane went free. As soon as he could extricate himself, Cloud was seen to jump free and his parachute to open satisfactorily. Wehle and Montgomery saw him land on the water, but in a few minutes both the pilot and the plane had disappeared.

Boy's Body Turning to Bone



All the resources of medical science appear to be impotent in the case of 7-year-old Benjamin Hendrick, inmate of Wilkes-Barre (Pa.) General Hospital, who is suffering from a rare disease that is slowly turning his entire body into bone. Physicians from all sections of the State have examined the boy, but none has been able to halt the ossification of his body, which is believed to have started from an infection transmitted through a rupture in the skin.

AGENCIES REPLACE TWO LIQUOR SHOPS

PORTLAND, April 12.—(AP)—Liquor agencies will replace two state liquor stores after this week, State Liquor Administrator George L. Sammis announced today. Because of small business volume the St. Johns and Oregon City stores are to close. This will leave the state with 21 liquor stores and 95 agencies. Sammis has returned from visiting liquor stores in Seattle and British Columbia. "Washington's stores are much more elaborate in their fixtures and are larger than our stores," he said. "They are doing more business, but I think it is due most of all to temperament of the people. Oregon's liquor prices are lower than any state except Washington. British Columbia charges 50 per cent more than we do."

BYRD OBSERVATIONS UNDER WAY, REPORT

LITTLE AMERICA, Antarctica, April 12.—(By Mackay Radio)—Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd has started his winter observations in his lonely outpost south of Little America, he advised by wireless today. Brief messages were received from him which described a blizzard on Sunday and told of his start on his work there, 123 miles from this main camp of the Byrd expedition. The sun quits this latitude in eight days, and the 55 men comprising the winter party here are using all available time to finish the major outside tasks which still remain. All of the expedition members, under the command of Dr. Thomas C. Poulter, are making Little America ready for the long months ahead. Food stores are being brought from the retreat camp and the seal carcasses from the Bay of Whales will be transferred here for the dogs.

Second Body in Tragedy of Car Plunge is Found

CHEHALIS, Wash., April 12.—(AP)—The body of Louise Swiggert, 19, one of three persons drowned Sunday when their car plunged from a bridge into the Cowlitz river, was recovered today about a mile below the Riffe bridge. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Swiggert of Mossy Rock. Funeral services for Juanita Riley, 18, whose body was recovered earlier in the week, were held in the community hall at Mossy Rock today. Search continued for the body of Walter Bowen, the third occupant of the car.

PEDAGOGIC BLUE LAW Attacked by Dr. Duff; Teacher Restriction is HELD TOO STRINGENT

NEW YORK, April 12.—(AP)—Denouncing what he termed the outmoded, puritanical traditions that require school teachers to be "goody-goodies," Dr. John Carr Duff of New York University urged today that they be allowed to smoke, drink, swear, or even chew tobacco if they feel like it. "I don't mean that they should be allowed to do these things in the classrooms, of course," he said, "but I do think the restrictions imposed on their private lives are entirely too stringent." To live up to present standards of conduct, he asserted in an interview, teachers must be either "sissies or hypocrites." "And in the villages and rural districts," he added, "they have to live up to a moral standard that would put a strain on a 2nd degree saint." Dr. Carr, chairman of the advisory committee of the tenth annual junior high school conference which will seek to evolve new code of morals on Saturday, cited a pledge required of all teachers in a North Carolina town as "typical." "I promise not to fall in love, to become engaged or secretly married," one paragraph reads. He quoted others: "I promise to abstain from all dancing, immodest dressing, and any other conduct unbecoming a teacher and a lady." "I promise not to go out with any young man except in so far as it may be necessary to stimulate Sunday school work."

Federal Produce Act Breach Not Proven, Verdict

SPOKANE, WASH., April 12.—(AP)—Charged with violation of the federal produce act, officials of Robert T. Cochran and Company, San Francisco, were acquitted in federal court here today. The jury was out only 10 minutes. The defendants — Lindsey

W. Cochran, Thomas Fletcher Cochran and Edward Broome — were charged with failing to account for proceeds of two cars of fruit owned by J. M. Sorenson of Wenatchee, and sold by the company on assignment. They pleaded they had merely postponed meeting their obligations when the company was under financial stress. The firm is bankrupt. Travel between Canton and Peking, China, is to be opened shortly.
