

CHANCELLOR TO QUIT JOB SOON

Decision is Wholly Voluntary
Board Members Insist;
Say All Harmony

Asked afterwards if he had any comment as to when a successor could be obtained or the retirement would take place, Marks said he could say nothing further than the statement. The time is entirely indefinite, he said and the board desires Dr. Kerr to carry on until a man may be obtained "broad enough in educational training and experience to comprehend in his understanding and his sympathies the entire scope of higher education in Oregon," as the board's statement concluded.

Tributes to Dr. Kerr's leadership in Oregon education were made by B. F. Irvine, board member, and associate of many years. He branded as outrageously unfair any intimation that the announced retirement is not entirely voluntary.

Dr. C. F. Boyer, recently appointed president of the University of Oregon, added a brief tribute by saying he had found Dr. Kerr fair and just in his dealings since Boyer's appointment, and that he felt it a privilege to have served under him in his initial venture in executive duties.

Almost Half Century Spent in Education
Chancellor Kerr added a word which he said was "off the record" in which he expressed appreciation for the support of the board and then called attention to the fact that within a few months he will have completed 49 years in college administrative work, of which 40 years has been as a college president, and that he feels that he has earned a rest.

Chancellor Kerr began his administrative career in the University of Utah and served as president of Brigham Young university and then of Utah State college before taking the presidency of Oregon State college in 1907.

He continued with that institution continuously until 1932, guiding its progress to the place where it was recognized as one of the three greatest land grant institutions in the nation.

With the reorganization of the system of higher education in 1932, Dr. Kerr was elected as the first chancellor of the system after the board had made a nationwide search for a suitable executive.

Dr. Kerr's administration has not been free from turmoil as elements last year in the system sought his replacement, ending in a "demand" by one dean that he resign. After investigating the situation the state board supported the chancellor.

Since the reorganization of the board with President Marks at its head, tranquil conditions have been restored. This promise of a stable policy convinced Dr. Kerr, according to his own statement, that he can now look forward to retirement within a reasonable time from what has admittedly been one of the most eventful educational careers in America.

The board then referred to the chancellor the task of working out the details of a plan whereby the board will collect and expend such fees in a manner which will conform to the legal requirements as interpreted by Attorney General Van Winkle.

The board also took steps to make possible the building of the normal training school project at La Grande, turned down by the PWA because of legal loan restrictions, by authorizing the transfer of the application to the federal emergency administration for public works.

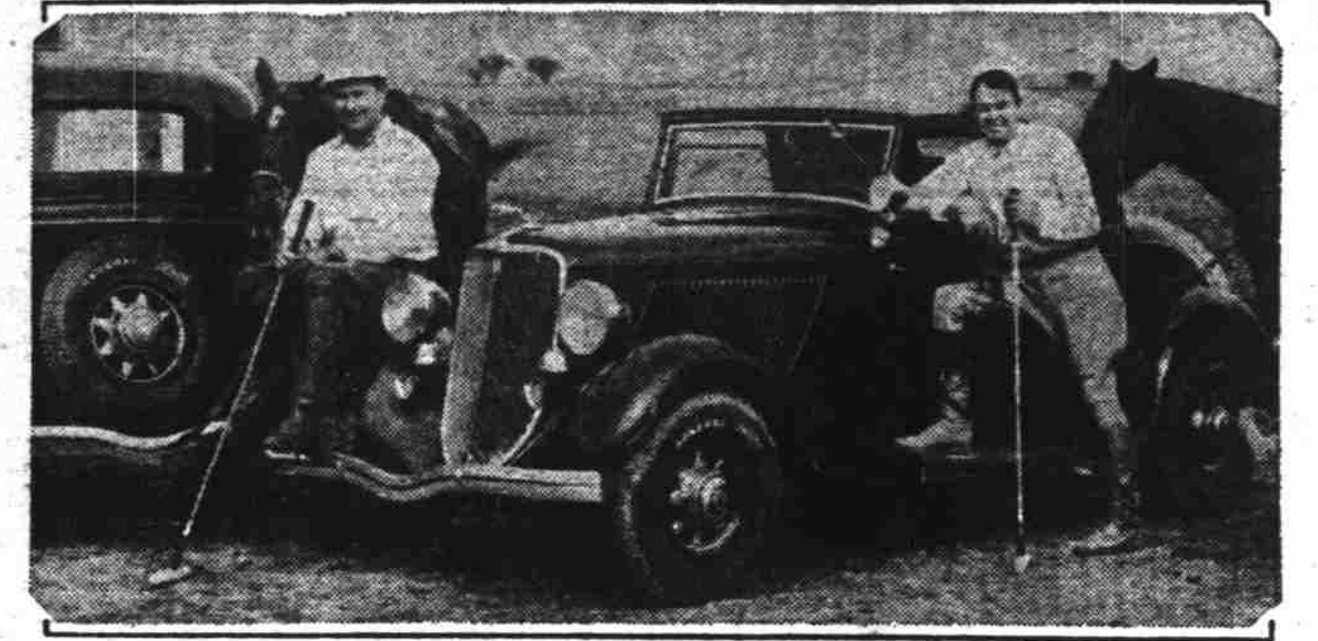

advise other competing companies of their proposals. He said this procedure under the code probably would have the effect of eliminating local competition. Holman declared that he, too, was much interested in the gasoline situation and recently had received a brief from the state of Washington in connection with its case against the oil companies. Stadelman said he could see no valid reason why the state of Oregon should pay more for gasoline than was being charged in other states.

Elinz said he would first get in touch with the Oregon distributors in an effort to obtain satisfactory bids. Other business of the board today included the purchase of five automobiles and readjustment of salaries in the state tax commission and the state utilities department. The salary of Carl Pease, an employee of the utility commission, was fixed at \$152.25 instead of \$123.50 a month, while the wage of R. J. Ford, an auditor, was readjusted from \$102.35 to \$152.25 a month.

Increases in the state tax commission salaries ranged from five to 15, and affected employees included in the lower brackets.

Another argument for keeping the corridor Polish is that four and a half times as much trade goes north and south of the area as through to or out from Germany. Further, Germany's attitude toward "inferior" Poles and unpleasant memories of the past would cause those peoples to rebel at return to the German flag, Ames feels.

SECOND HEART BALM CASE STARTS TODAY

Thirty-five thousand dollars of damage for alleged alienation of the affections of Mrs. Robert R. Laughlin by Perry H. Walbridge is sought by the former's husband in a heart balm suit to begin at 9 a. m. in circuit court today. This is the second affections case to come into court here this term. Laughlin claims that the alleged alienation commenced in January, 1933, when Walbridge made Mrs. Laughlin's acquaintance in Chehalis, Wash. He asserts that subsequently Walbridge continued to show his affection to Mrs. Laughlin who allegedly responded. The plaintiff says the relations of the two were intimate and illegal. The defendant has filed an answer to the complaint in which he denies all the charges.

Specific damages of \$10,000 are sought and punitive damages of \$25,000.

Walbridge is a local representative of an Oregon insurance company.

BARNETT TO FACE GRAND JURY HERE

88-Year-Old Father-in-Law Testifies to Alleged Assault, Battery

For alleged assault and battery upon his 88-year-old father-in-law, Robert Barnett was held to answer to the grand jury following preliminary hearing in justice court Monday afternoon.

F. W. Arnsmeier, the father-in-law and the chief state witness, was noticeably affected in recounting the episode which happened at his home the morning of April 7. He told that Mr. and Mrs. Barnett entered his room, apparently without cause, and that Barnett took hold of him, Arnsmeier, and lifted him high in the air at least twice, "jamming" him down and the last time letting him fall to the floor. Arnsmeier declared that Barnett struck him on his left hand also, and several witnesses including the county physician reported seeing a swelling upon the hand following the incident. The aged man quoted his son-in-law as promising worse "if you don't do different."

W. C. Winslow, attorney for Barnett, made several attempts to elicit admission of quarrels between Barnett and his wife, but these were denied both by Arnsmeier and a neighbor who was a witness.

Other state witnesses were George Edwards, and E. C. Charlton, city police officers; Mrs. B. W. Bunn, a neighbor to whose house Arnsmeier went, partly on hands and knees, he said, after the affair; and Dr. Verden E. Hockett, county physician who examined him at the Deaconess hospital. Defense offered no testimony.
