CORVALLIS, Ore., April 20.—(AP)—The Willamette university Bearcats went on a hitting rampage and defeated the Oregon State college baseball team 15 to 10 in a loosely played game here today.

Each team collected the same number of hits as runs, but the Beavers booted eight times to four for Willamette.

In the fourth inning Willamette batted around to score five runs on three hits and in the sixth inning scored six runs while the Beavers were fumbling hard-hit balls.

Dwight Aden of Willamette and Weber, starting pitcher for the Beavers, hit home runs.

Willamette was leading 15 to 4 before the Beavers rallied to close the gap. However the Beaver rally never approached threatening proportions.

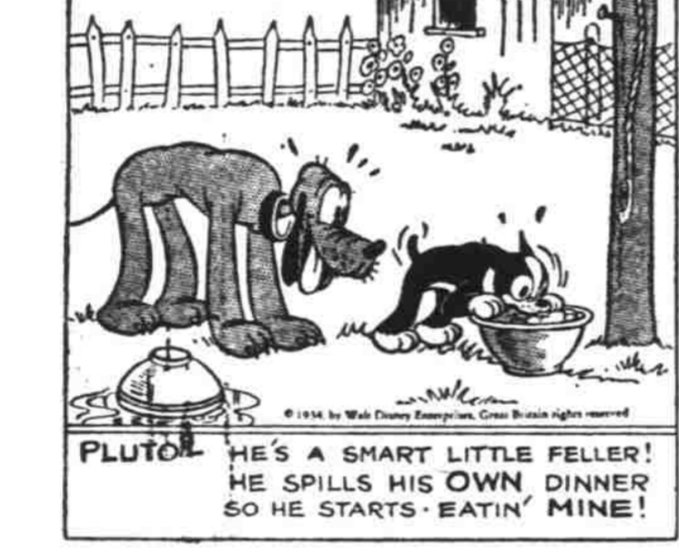

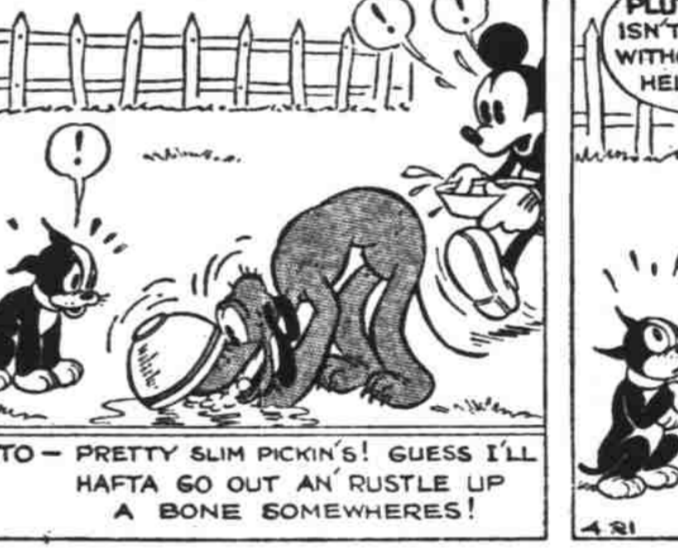
