WOOL MARKET TREND CONTINUES BEARISH

BOSTON, April 20. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The wool market continues slow both in the east and west. So far as any trend is discernible, prices continue to favor the buyer. Best wools in the Roswell, N. M. sale this week at 75 to 78 cents, clean basis Boston, compared with earlier purchases at 83-85 cents.

"The manufacturing position is not changed materially. What business is done is largely in filling-in or specialty orders which require little wool. Yarns and tops are barely steady.

"The foreign markets are hardly as keen this week as last at the weekend.

"Mohair continues rather slow but stocks are light and prices are firm."

PORTLAND, April 20. (AP)—Strength was continued in the market for butter with a general cleanup of dealers' floor stock suggested locally. All along the coast steady to firmer and even higher prices were ruling for butter.

In California the weather has continued against production while in the Pacific northwest conditions are ideal.

Butterfat was held at the late advance here.

Market for eggs continued of rather good character with decreasing supplies and a demand in excess of offerings of quality goods. No change was suggested in the price for the day.

Demand for chickens was holding well and prices were generally up for the day. Broilers alone indicated some easiness and this was reflected mostly in small stuff.

Better quality and excellent weather were combinations that tended to uphold the price on good strawberries for the day.

Market for country killed meats was without general change for the day. Good lambs were selling well at the recently lower price and quality vealers were steady.
