FIELD OF WOMAN IN BUSINESS GROWING

The business woman is no longer content to merely do, but is adding to her realm in the business world thought and study to professional life. National and international Mrs. Winifred Herrick, president of the Salem Business and Professional Women's club told the Friday luncheon gathering of the Retail Credit association.

International study groups, research study for better working conditions for men and women, educational support and the student loan fund, constructive programs at the regular meetings and a live public relations committee to keep in contact with community affairs all serve to make the club of vital service to the business woman.

Mrs. Herrick related that the Salem club student loan fund has been designated as the Josephine Shade student loan fund, honoring the memory of one of the most beloved members of the club. The annual state convention is to be held in Portland in May and the national biennial in Seattle in 1935.

The Salem club was organized in October, 1919, the same year the national and state B. & P. W. movement started, with Dr. Mary Rowland first local president. Now Oregon has 21 local clubs, with a 1934 membership of 800, a decrease of 400 since the record pre-depression year.

A 10-year objective program adopted in 1921, gives as one of the aims fitting the movement for real leadership in scientific problems and economic implications.

80th Anniversary First Services at Episcopal Church to Be Observed

St. Paul's church (Episcopal) Sunday night at 7 o'clock, will celebrate the 80th anniversary of the first service of the Book of Common Prayer held in the building which is now the parish house, standing on Chemeketa street between Church and High.

This first church building of the Episcopal church in Salem was erected in 1854, and was consecrated on the second Sunday after Easter, April 22, 1855, by the Rt. Rev. Thomas Fielding Scott, D. D., missionary bishop of Oregon territory.

This building is said to be the oldest public building standing in Salem today. This mission was organized as a self-supporting parish in 1884. The present rector, the Rev. Geo. H. Swift, is the 17th rector of St. Paul's, the first being the Rev. St. Michael Backler who was here in 1855 at the time the church building was consecrated. The present church building was erected during the rectorship of the Rev. H. D. Chambers in 1922.

One member of the confirmation class of 1885 is still a regular communicant of St. Paul's, Miss Mary Chadwick, who lives on the corner of Center and Capitol, and works at the state house. The celebration Sunday night will begin at 7 o'clock with the confirmation of a class to be presented to Bishop Sumner by the rector. The anniversary sermon will follow. The Rt. Rev. Walter T. Sumner, D.D., bishop of the diocese of Oregon, the preacher. The St. Paul's choir, under the direction of the Hallelujah Chorus.

After benediction by the bishop, the congregation is invited to the reception which will follow immediately in the old and original church building, which has stood for 80 years, and is now the parish house.

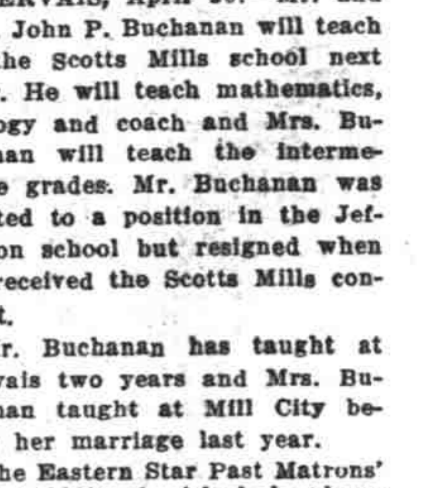
