Wis., killed, mistakenly, by the officers.

Carl C. Christensen, constable of Spider Lake, Wis., critically wounded.

John Hoffman of Mercer, wounded while riding with Bolesonau. John Morris, civilian conservation camp officer, shot three times, riding with Bolesonau.

J. C. Newman, federal agent, slightly wounded.

A tip telephoned to the Chicago bureau of investigation of the justice department had brought the government men swooping down upon the timberland retreat which the Dillinger mob had taken over by force Friday.

There were seven of his band, including Hamilton, escaped convict, Tom Carroll, St. Paul bank robber, Homer Van Meter, several others unidentified and three girls.

The federal men, reinforced with local officers, began surrounding the resort Sunday night. About 10 p. m., three men, having regaled themselves with beer, walked out of the Little Bohemia and stepped into their automobile. The waiting officers commanded them to halt. They failed to hear the order because, they said, the radio in their car was on.

Watchdogs began barking. The machine gun on the roof let loose a deadly blast. The officers fired back and in the cross fire Bolesonau, one of the trio who had stopped in for drinks, was killed; Morris wounded, and Hoffman hurt as he fled into the woods. He was captured and taken with the others to a hospital at Ironwood, Mich., 35 miles north.

At the first shot, Dillinger and the rest had dived through a rear window and raced away through the woods, leaving their girls behind them.

The fugitives split up in the darkness. One of them reached a nearby resort just ahead of a group of officers hurrying to a telephone to give the alarm.

Walking up to Alvin Turner, the roadhouse owner, he demanded: "Get me a car."

Turner had no time to reply before the light of a car showed up outside.

The gunner, unlimbering his machine gun, ran out and shouted: "Who's that?"

The federal officers identified themselves.

A stream of lead suddenly poured from the machine gun into the oncoming automobile. Baum was killed, Newman wounded, and Christensen fell desperately hurt with five bullet wounds in his body. The killer sped away.

In addition to Dillinger, Van Meter, Carroll and Hamilton, government agents named another of the gang as George "Baby Face" Nelson, and asserted he killed Baum.

Explaining the police trap, authorities said the loaded loads of government men were waiting at Rhineland, Wis., last night for the arrival of a fourth load of government men preparatory to swooping down on the resort where the gangsters were hiding.

They set out for Little Bohemia before the arrival of the St. Paul car, however, after learning Dillinger and his associates were making ready to leave the resort.

En route to the resort, it was said, two of the automobiles were delayed by motor trouble, giving the agents no time to perfect their plans after arrival.

HOLC Bonds to Help Banks Pay Deposit Claims

Judge L. G. Lewelling yesterday approved plans whereby the State Bank of Woodburn, in liquidation, may exchange 27 different first mortgages to an equal number of HOLC bonds. A. A. Schramm, state bank superintendent in applying for authority to make the transfers, said negotiations were under way for such refinancing. The borrowers will receive the advantage of 4 per cent interest while the bank's depositors will receive the advantage of an earlier liquidation of their deposit claims. The loans range from \$200 to \$2500 each and average about \$1000.

Mr. Schramm yesterday said that HOLC refinancing was being secured by debtors of a number of state banks he is liquidating and that such refinancing was going to speed up bank deposit liquidation.

Counties Enroll in Move to Get Cheap Gasoline

Douglas, Lane and a number of other Oregon counties have indicated that they will join with the state board of control in its campaign to force lower gasoline prices.

County Judge Hamilton of Douglas, in a letter received at the board of control offices yesterday, declared that the contract for gasoline there had expired and that the new price probably would be approximately 19½ cents per gallon. The contract price prevailing until April 15 was 13.4 cents per gallon delivered in Roseburg. Hamilton said the increase would be six cents per gallon.

Lane county officials telephoned the state purchasing department today asking whether the state could purchase a carload of gasoline for that county. The price to Lane county is now 18 cents per gallon.

Officials said they would confer with Attorney General Van Winkle to determine how the state could assist the counties in obtaining gasoline at lower prices. Gasoline for the counties would be purchased through state channels.

3 Pardons Given by Meier in Day; Long Terms End

Governor Meier yesterday issued a conditional pardon to John O. Wenberg, who was received at the state penitentiary here June 8, 1932, to serve a term of 15 years for assault and robbery, while armed with a dangerous weapon. He was received from Multnomah county. Wenberg will be turned over to the immigration officials for deportation.

Another pardon was issued to John P. Mahler of Deschutes county, who was received at the prison November 10, 1933, to serve five years for larceny.

A third pardon was issued to Same Nelson who was received at the penitentiary September 27, 1931, to serve a term of 10 years for robbery by force and violence, not armed with a dangerous weapon. Nelson was convicted in Union county.

DAIRY CONTROL IS ABANDONED, WORD

CORVALLIS, April 23. — (AP) — Certain phases of the proposed AAA dairy production surplus control plan might be applied regionally if requested, even though the program is abandoned nationally, William A. Schoenfeld, dean of agriculture at Oregon State college, said tonight.

At a recent regional conference in Portland, producers of Oregon, Washington and part of Idaho voted six to one in support of the proposed program, with slight modifications.

Tonight Dean Schoenfeld who presided over the Portland meeting, received word from agricultural adjustment officials that the national benefit payment play for production control will not be undertaken nationally now because of divided sentiment in the industry. Reports from 15 regional dairy conferences prompted the decision.

Decollete Isn't for Salem High Girl Graduates

Cotton is listed as the standard material; dresses shall be no shorter than ankle-length and shall have either high backs and covered shoulders or be worn with jackets. All dresses will be in pastel shades. Shoe qualifications are merely recorded as "suitable," with no color, height of heel or style mentioned.

Boys of the graduating class will wear dark coats, blue or black preferred, white flannel trousers and black, white or black and white shoes. White shirts and dark ties are the correct accompaniments of such attire, the notice states.

salary scale," Hansen yesterday wrote the governor, "Mr. Holman objected on the ground that the scale cut too deeply into his own salary."

A caustic review of State Treasurer Holman's political activities marks the conclusion of Hansen's letter to Meier. "In response to his own solicitations, as well as those of intimate friends, you appointed Mr. Holman state treasurer May 1, 1931," the letter reads. "Soon thereafter he sailed forth on a tour of the state, with trumpet in hand, to proclaim the achievements of your administration as his own."

"During the 1932 primary campaign, he made another political pilgrimage, and still another in the general election campaign of the same year—both in the interest of his candidacy for the state treasurership."

"After his election to the office, he gratefully rewarded you for the appointment and support given his candidacy by launching a vicious campaign against your administration."

Hansen's letter continues: "The purpose of Holman's campaign against you, was of course, to undermine your administration and to pave the way for Mr. Holman's own gubernatorial candidacy, and to this end he has never hesitated to stoop to misrepresentation and vilification."

"All of this time Mr. Holman was campaigning and playing politics, he was drawing, regularly, from the state, his salary as state treasurer."

"In view of the fact that Mr. Holman has had nearly two years in which to put into motion the necessary machinery for the standardization of state salaries, and in view of the further fact that his proposal now to do so, is manifestly only a political gesture to bolster up his political fortunes, I recommend that the whole matter be deferred until after the elections, and Mr. Holman is through running for office."

AMERICAN LOAN TO CHINA IS RUMORED

TOKYO, April 24. — (Tuesday) — (AP) — The more sensational vernacular newspapers this morning reported that the United States will grant a military loan of \$100,000,000 (Chinese) to Chiang Kai-Shek, head of the Chinese nationalist government.

The report was given as coming from Shanghai, and the newspaper "Nichi Nichi" asserted Nelson T. Johnson, American minister to China, was leaving Peking today for the purpose of negotiating the loan agreement.

"Yomiuri" gave prominence to a Moscow dispatch stating the soviet union is secretly building military air bases in Kamchatka, intending to make them available to the American air forces in event the United States becomes involved in any future far eastern conflict.

Rachel Callvert Funeral Held at Portland Friday

Mrs. Jessie Singleton returned to her home in Salem Sunday night from Seattle and Tacoma following the final services for her mother the late Mrs. Rachel Callvert, who died Wednesday at the home of a son in Portland.

Mrs. Callvert was 91 years old at the time of her death; she was an early graduate of the University of Iowa and was widely known as an educated and cultured woman.

Funeral services were held in Portland Friday and the body was taken to Tacoma for interment in the Tacoma cemetery beside the grave of her husband.

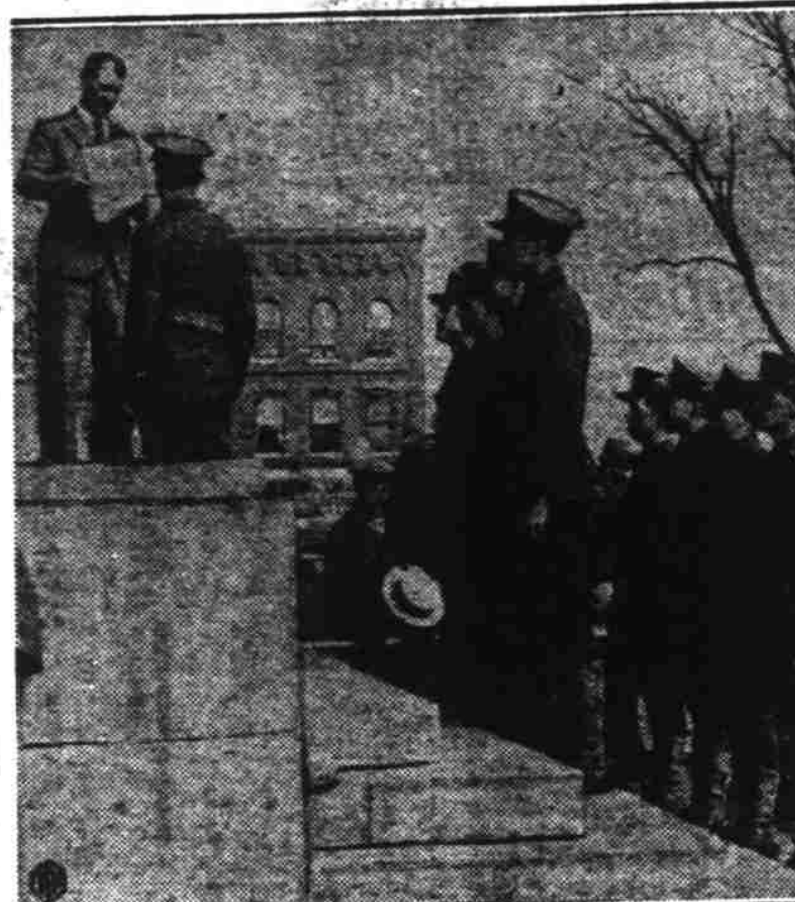

COURTROOM SCENE OF REVENGE SHOTS

CROCKETT, Wis., April 23. — (AP) — Ben Ellis today shot to death in a crowded courtroom a negro accused of slaying his uncle, J. M. Ellis, white merchant.

A jury was being selected to try the negro, Frank Brisby, for murder. Ellis, 24, rose in his seat, drew a pistol and fired one shot. Then he calmly lit a cigarette, handed the pistol to the sheriff and waited for the commotion to cease.

District Judge Ben F. Dent ordered the court room cleared. Friends crowded around Ellis and when his bond was fixed at \$2500 the sum was quickly posted and he was released.

The bullet which killed the negro narrowly missed State Senator Nat Patton, defense attorney, and several other lawyers.

Witnesses said the shot was fired at a range of about five feet. Ellis was seated on the front row of the court room. He gave no warning before he fired.
