Delzell and Goss Object to Turner's Statements in Voters' Pamphlet

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power interests, and now the father, William Delzell, enters the congressional race. It is not here indicated that the son's connection with the power interests might affect Mr. Delzell's legislative judgments. However, voters are so aroused against these selfish interests that they want no one connected with them, either directly or remotely.

"Both the influences and purposes back of Mr. Delzell's eleventh-hour entrance are speculative. Nor are they warranted, for William Delzell now has a good position as deputy water collector of interior revenue. Also he has been looked upon with favor for his consideration for appointment as postmaster in Salem. While dangle with these two, he now reaches for a third plum.

"Mr. Delzell ran for congress in 1930 and was defeated by William Hawley. He also ran in 1932 and was defeated in the primary by Harvey Starkweather. It would appear that he has had his fair chance at the office and that he should be fair and unselfish enough to give someone else a chance. The new deal calls for a new candidate."

Referring to Goss, Turner's statement continued: "It is an established fact that my opponent, John D. Goss of Marshfield, and his associates in partnership, received from the Mountain States Power company to 1934, payments amounting to \$7888.23. Part of this amount was received during the year 1933 for retainer and services. This was the year Mr. Goss served as senator in the state legislature, apparently attempting to serve both the power company and the people of Coos and Curry at one and the same time.

"That Mr. Goss served the power company well was indicated in his remuneration. No man can serve two masters."

Over One-Third Of State Taxes Already Paid In

Approximately \$1,132,801 of the total of \$2,975,837.92 of state taxes due the treasury department for the year 1934 already has been paid, according to figures released Thursday by Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer.

Payments included all first-quarter state taxes for this year with the exception of \$3761.82, due from Jefferson county. The total payments for the first quarter were \$740,197.66. Second quarter payments aggregated \$392,603.63.

State taxes for 1934 yet to be received by the state treasurer total \$1,843,036.63.

Under a new law enacted at the last special session of the state legislature taxes may be paid in four installments during the year.

Officials said this law had resulted in speeding up tax payments in all parts of the state.

West Salem Plant May Exceed Record
West Salem plant, which last year made a record pack of 125,000 cases, will handle a similar pack or better this year, with large pack of tomatoes from the West Stayton district, H. M. Schubert, who managed the Cleary and Hillman plant at Everett, Wash., last season, will be manager here this year. At Everett, R. P. Juhnicken will be manager.

There barreling of raspberries and strawberries is the big item. Producers' plant here, a cooperative, handles the harvest of its own members only, and will follow the same lines as packed last year. Pears are one of the heavy commodities, and so far this season, indications look to an excellent crop.

Whether marketing agreements will curtail the quantity of pears each grower may send through canneries has not yet been definitely announced.

Glenn Lengren, manager of the Starr Fruit plant here, stated yesterday that a normal pack will be made of all berries, including gooseberries, and prunes, with cold pack of Marshalls. Percy Blundell, superintendent at Oregon Packing company, says definite plans for the season's pack have not yet come through from company headquarters.

Considerable repair work is being done at this cannery in preparation for the season. All plants are winding up overhauling and renovation prior to starting on the new crops.

Baker, Kelley and company, who last year added a walnut deal to their barreling operations, have not completed plans for the season's industry, pending word on marketing agreements, Charles H. Kane, resident manager, said yesterday.

3272 POLICE CASES HANDLED VIA RADIO

KGZR, the Salem police radio station, was used to broadcast 3272 calls and dispatch officers on 3272 cases during the first year of operation, which ended Wednesday, Donald Poudjade, day operator, announced yesterday. The lowest number of cases handled by radio during a full month was 222 and the highest 385. Calls jumped from 1022 the first month to a peak of 2513 last month.

Along with the steadily increasing use to which the station was put, Poudjade's report pointed to the increasing speed with which radio cases were handled. Average time per case the first month was 10.5 minutes and last month, 7.2 minutes. For the 12-month period the time per case averaged 8.3 minutes.

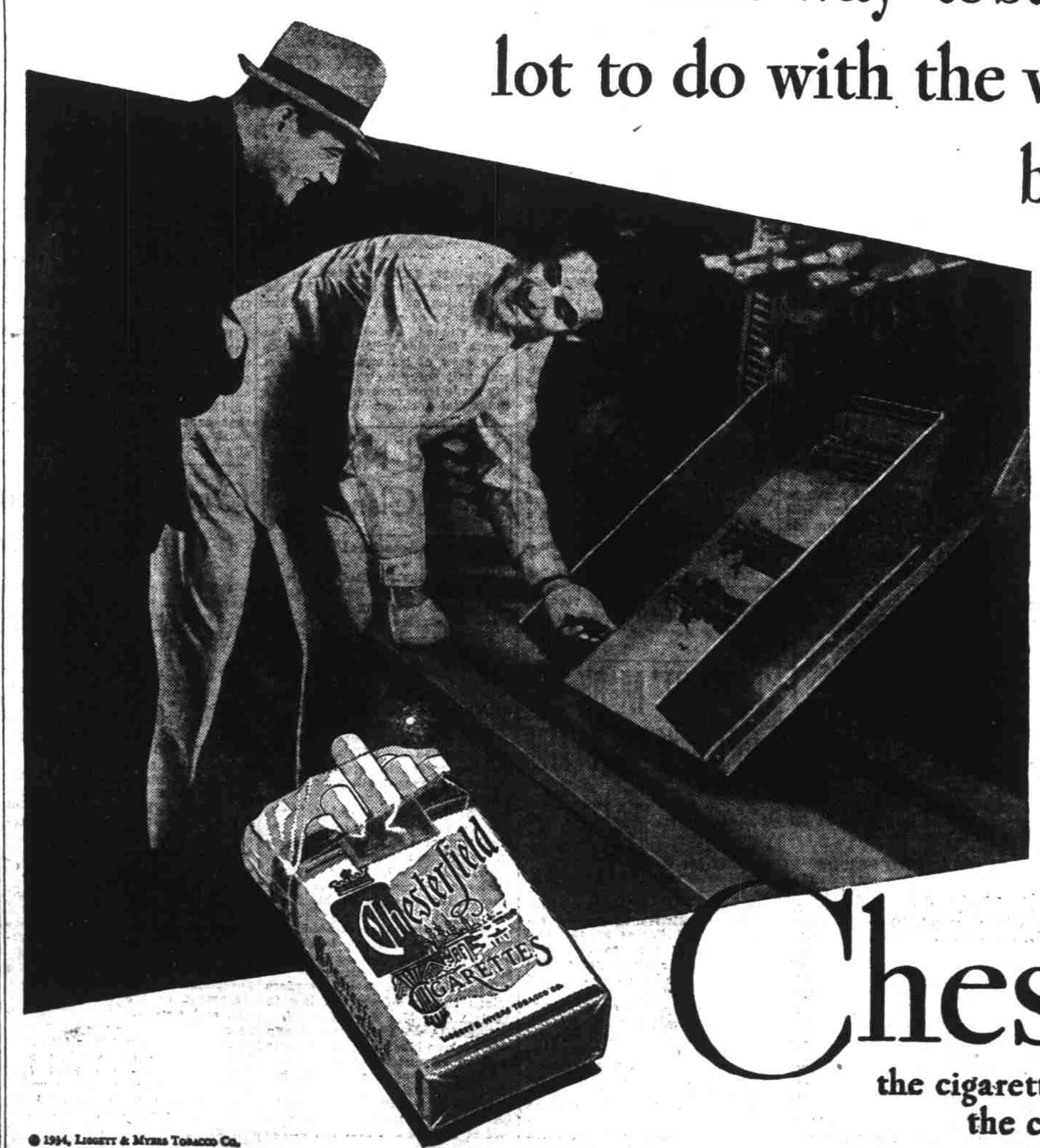
