Industry is in Dire Straits, Statements Reveal; to Seek Price Accord

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which several were from Portland, said they realized fully the seriousness of the present situation, and that nothing short of a code of marketing agreement would save the industry from insolvency and bankruptcy.

Objection was raised to the proposed code by the dairy lunches, which alleged that their business should not be classified as a restaurant. Attorneys for this group urged that the dairy lunches be excluded from any code or marketing agreement that may be adopted. It was argued that these dairy lunches serve only dairy products and light lunches, and that their patrons would not patronize restaurants even though the dairy lunches were not in operation. Other opposition was voiced by some restaurant owners who contended that they had the right to fix their prices without the interference or dictation of a control board.

A number of restaurant operators declared that even though price fixing was included in the code it should be placed in the hands of the restaurant industry. There also was some objection to the provision prohibiting the establishment of new restaurants unless they were approved by the administration board. Another group contended that the proposed code would be unworkable.

Gehlar, in replying to criticisms of some of the restaurant owners, suggested that the industry clean house within its own ranks. He said such procedure would have a tendency to eliminate a large number of lower class restaurants now in operation.

The matter of labor and serving inferior products also entered prominently into the discussions.

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million dollars can be saved if these recommendations are carried out and that the present proposition of mortgaging the city's taxable property for two million, five hundred thousand dollars will only be a start as far as creation of debts and issuance of bonds are concerned. It is the opinion of many residents of Salem who have had experience in these matters that the proposed two million five hundred thousand dollar issue will not complete the present proposed Santiam project, and if the experience of many other localities with similar enterprises may be taken as a criterion, we should not be surprised if this amount is finally doubled.

Section 2 of the water amendment to the city charter provides: "That said common council shall, each year at the time of making the annual tax levy for city purposes, make a special levy in a sum sufficient to pay the interest due on the outstanding bonds of this issue, and to retire the principal thereof as it matures; provided however that such levy shall not be made when and if the income on hand derived from such water plant, applicable thereto, shall be sufficient to pay such interest due on such outstanding bonds of this issue, and to retire the principal thereof as it matures."

This provision of the charter provides ample reason why all taxpayers should take a vital interest in this whole matter.

The present injunction suit is filed not for the purpose of delay, but for the purpose of requiring the city to proceed in accordance with the charter amendment passed by the people. The bond attorneys passing on the bonds for Ladd & Bush, bankers, refuse to give an unqualified opinion as to their legality. This opinion was qualified in certain particulars. It is hoped that this suit will close up these matters in question.

The real desire of the Taxpayers' league is to put men to work and give the city an adequate water or plant and pure water, and we do not believe in the construction of a competitive water system which would bring on a rate war, and the league does not want to see Salem plunged into debt to the point where its credit will be impaired, as the credit of many other Oregon cities now is impaired.

see," Goss declared this afternoon. Delzell and Goss previously had informed attaches of the state department that they probably would file suit in either the circuit or supreme courts to enjoin the secretary of state from distributing the pamphlets. Records of the state department show that 30,000 of the pamphlets already have been placed in the mails. Delzell left for Portland late Friday afternoon while Goss remained in Salem. Goss said he desired to confer with an attorney.

Turner Friday reiterated his assertion of Thursday that he would refuse to recede from the position that his campaign statement was not a violation of the corrupt practices law. He said he was doubly certain of his position since it was reported that two members of the attorney general's staff had held that the secretary of state had not violated the corrupt practices law and that there was no provision in the act making it incumbent upon Turner to file a copy of his statement upon his opponents.

Scenic Trail Linking Park, Falls Talked

SILVERTON, April 27.—A plan to connect the Silverton municipal park with the Silver Falls state park by scenic trail along Silver creek is being suggested by J. D. Drake, who was influential in creating a state park of the Silver Falls area, and by Alf O. Nelson, head of the Home-seekers agency of Silverton. The Silver Creek canyon is noted for its exceptional natural beauty. The plan offered by Drake and Nelson is for the state park commission to acquire the necessary land on both sides of the creek to preserve the natural beauty along the entire route between the two parks. This is a distance of about 10 miles. The men have gone over the entire area with a view of determining what lands are necessary. They are urging land owners along this route not to allow their land to pass into the hands of speculators and by all means preserve ornamental trees and natural beauty along the route.

Ochoco Bonds to Be Refinanced is Stricklin's View

Approximately \$1,179,500 of the \$1,333,500 of bonds of the Ochoco irrigation district have been deposited with the state reclamation commission in connection with its application for a loan from the Reconstruction Finance corporation for reorganization purposes.

This was announced by C. E. Stricklin, secretary of the commission, after \$140,000 of these bonds were received at his office Friday. Stricklin said that the loan had been approved by the Reconstruction Finance corporation, at 20 cents on the dollar, based on the face value of the bonds.

The Ochoco district is located in Crook county and contains approximately 8500 acres. The area recently was reduced from 21,000 acres.
