MULTNOMAH VOTERS INCREASE BY 9833

The registration of Multnomah county for the primary election May 18 totals 155,930 as against 146,097 prior to the special election in 1933, according to figures received at the state department Thursday.

The democratic registration in Multnomah county increased from 48,068 at the 1933 election to 57,958 for the primary election of 1934. The republican registration decreased from 95,242 in 1933 to 96,135 this year.

The Multnomah county registration for the two years follows: 1934: Republicans 95,135, democrats 57,958, progressive 57, prohibition 118, socialist 368, miscellaneous 2194. Total 155,930.

1933: Republicans 95,242, democrats 48,068, progressive 59, prohibition 117, socialist 423, miscellaneous 2188. Total 146,097.

The total registration for Washington county also showed a substantial increase this year. The registration for this county follows: 1934: Republicans 4250, democrats 1663, miscellaneous 62. Total 5975.

1933: Republicans 5137, democrats 1417, miscellaneous 61. Total 5760.

Other registrations to follow: Wheeler (1934): republicans 1197, democrats 323, miscellaneous 7. Total 1527. (1933): republicans 1296, democrats 348, miscellaneous 10. Total 1654.

Malheur (1934): republicans 350, democrats 209, miscellaneous 133. Total 5777. (1933): republicans 3669, democrats 1979, miscellaneous 130. Total 5788.

DAMAGES SOUGHT AGAINST SHERIFF

Ten thousand dollars damages against Sheriff A. C. Burk and the United States Fidelity & Guaranty company, his bondsmen, are asked by Bertha C. Cady in a complaint filed yesterday in circuit court here. Plaintiff asks the damages for allegedly false imprisonment here for eight hours November 7.

She charges that she was wrongfully, unlawfully, forcibly and wickedly imprisoned in the county jail for approximately eight hours, that upon her detention she immediately demanded that she be taken before a magistrate and that her husband and her lawyer be notified that she might be released on bail. She charges the sheriff refused to permit her to communicate with her husband, family or lawyer.

The complaint is accompanied by a petition to Judge McMahon setting out the essential allegations of the complaint and an order from the court permitting the action to be filed.

Sheriff Burk yesterday said that the detention of the prisoner grew out of an action of ejectment against her husband. He said he went to the place where they resided and that the plaintiff resisted him. He declares the ejectment proceedings were taken on a court order.

REGISTRATION LESS IN SOME COUNTIES

The registration for Washington county for the primary election May 18 is 15,833, or approximately 3000 less than the registration prior to the special election in 1933. It was announced by the elections division of the state department Friday. The total registration prior to the 1933 election was 18,748.

Registration figures received here today follow: Washington county: 1934: republicans 10,644, democrats 4726, miscellaneous 465. Total 15,835. (1933): republicans 19,917, democrats 5098, miscellaneous 769. Total 18,748.

Lincoln county: 1934: republicans 3423, democrats 1848, miscellaneous 104. Total 5375. (1933): republicans 3265, democrats 1526, miscellaneous 99. Total 4890.

Josephine county: 1934: republicans 4236, democrats 2137, miscellaneous 191. Total 6564. (1933): republicans 4546, democrats 1954, miscellaneous 199. Total 6718.

Twenty-five of the 36 counties in Oregon have now filed their registration figures for the 1934 primary election.

SAN JOSE LYNCHING DESCRIBED BY RAHE

Observations of an eye-witness to the San Jose lynching of last winter were retold to the Salem Lions club at its meeting at the Gray Belle Thursday by Professor Herbert E. Rahe, head of the Willamette university speech department, who discussed the affair recently with a student who was in San Jose at the time of the crime.

"The lynchings were acting in a spirit of fun, out for a good time," Rahe said. He was told, "It wasn't a spirit of vengeance that led them on."

Rahe described physical atrocities inflicted upon the two men who were alleged to have abducted and slain Brooke Hart, San Jose youth, and pointed out that a prisoner who lay in the San Jose jail sentenced on a petty charge was mistakenly dragged out and taken within 150 feet of the tree used for the lynching before it was discovered he was not the man the mob wanted.

"The San Jose affair is a blot on the whole state of California," Rahe asserted. "And that instance of mistaken identity shows up one of the big evils of lynching—an innocent man may be murdered by the mob."

TEACHERS SUPPORT SALES TAX FRIENDS

"We intend to throw the support of this teachers' group to those who endorse teachers' tenure and the sales tax," is the declaration of Shannon Hogue, newly elected president of the Salem Teachers' association, in a message to members the past week.

"If this organization wishes to justify being called an organization, we must become a political unit. Politically 400 votes can be summoned within our own homes. Furthermore, every janitor and his family as well as any other employee connected in any way with the school system, means votes for school causes. If every teacher employed in this system influenced five voters outside of his immediate family, we could command 1500 votes," Hogue declared.

BUNCO BIRD-RABBIT GAME IS UNCOVERED

State police, after several days of investigations, have halted what appeared to be a confidence game directed at farmers in the Salem vicinity. Two men were involved. The two men, one giving the name of Dr. W. D. Cowan of Seattle and the other, W. L. Campbell of Snohomish, appeared at the home of Mrs. John Van Lydegraf, route 4, on April 17 and 18. On the latter date they obtained from her \$110 of \$250 she had agreed to pay them to set her up in the poultry or rabbit business.

A week later, April 23, she declared that she had been buncoed and reported her dealings with the men to the state police.

Upon being arrested Cowan and Campbell were interviewed by the state police and admitted that they had made false statements. Officers said their quiz revealed that the men had nothing to support their claims, although they declared that they had incorporated their business in Washington. Investigation revealed that the alleged corporation was not in existence at the present time.

No charges are to be filed against the pair provided they repay the local people they allegedly buncoed, police said. In addition to Mrs. Van Lydegraf those who took up the proposition included a Mr. Olsen and a Mrs. J. M. Sheg, both living on South 24th street, who each paid \$5.

Woman Succumbs to Burns; White Aided in Rescue

Funeral services will be held Monday at Oak Grove for Mrs. A. M. Harris who died from burns received when her home at Cloverleaf, on the Tillamook road east of Sheridan, was burned. Burial will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery here.

General George A. White and Colonel Joseph Schur both of this city were on a return trip to Salem from Clatsop camp when they saw the woman attempting to recover her belongings from the burning cottage. They stopped and after administering first aid brought Mrs. Harris to the hospital here. It is thought that a lamp by which she was reading may have exploded, Mrs. Harris

had taught the Cloverleaf school for four years. General White was solicited for Mrs. Harris' well-being after he had brought her here to the hospital suffering intense pains, and asked Oscar Chenoweth to look up her relatives to inform them of the happening.

Added gloom came into the picture when her daughter Greta was taken to a McMinnville hospital for an operation for appendicitis.

RAILWAYS PLANNING WAGE RESTORATION

The agreement was reached in amicable negotiations after the administration had given up hope of a friendly settlement.

It ended a month of claims and counter claims during which a committee composed of a dozen railroad managers and 21 representatives of labor unions had argued across a conference table.

This is what they worked out: The railroads will increase wages 2 1/2 per cent July 1; 2 1/2 per cent January 1, 1935; and 5 per cent April 1, 1935, thus putting them back to where they were in 1931.

The workers obtained an agreement for negotiations with individual carriers for ending part time work and furloughs, increasing employment and giving more money to the low paid workers.

The wage agreement runs for one year from July 1. Neither side may bring up the subject again until May 1, 1935, supplying the period of stabilization urged by the president.

McGahan for song leader and Junior Nelson for forensic manager.

This valuable animal has been placed in charge of E. H. Newman, horse handler at Molalla. Newman handled the well-known Bobby Sinkfield.
