

MOEN SAYS GUILTY AND TO ASK PAROLE

Goss is Given Six Months;
Lynch Breaks Trust and
Sent to Prison

Trial of Homer Moen on a reckless driving charge is scheduled in Judge McMahon's court today, and will end the term's work.

Arist of criminal business was disposed of Monday, C. R. Moen, charged with involuntary manslaughter as result of an accident near Woodburn last December 6 in which Robert McBride, head of the Salem Navigation company, was fatally injured, changed his plea from not guilty to guilty. Moen will make application for parole Friday morning at 10 o'clock, and sentence will be pronounced at that time.

O. H. Goss, agitator arrested as result of a series of demonstrations on the courthouse lawn last summer, withdrew plea of not guilty through his attorney, Irvin Goodman of Portland, and pleaded guilty. Judge McMahon sentenced him to six months in the county jail. Inasmuch as Goss is now in the east, this formalities were taken to release his bondmen and further to release any possibility of further disturbance from him should he return to the coast.

George Lynch, paroled following sentence to two years in prison last January for uttering a forged instrument, had his parole revoked yesterday and was sent to the penitentiary. The action followed apprehension when he passed forged checks bearing name of J. Mitoma.

A fourth criminal matter coming before McMahon yesterday was dismissal of appeal in case of Marvin E. Bailey, charged jointly with William Norton of larceny of two tires, rim and tubes from T. N. Nevingham of near Woodburn. Bailey himself moved for the dismissal and will serve out the sentence meted after a jury in Judge Overton's court at Woodburn found him guilty. The sentence was six months in the county jail and \$100 fine.

Famous Hotel of Colony Days Yields to Progress

AURORA, April 30.—The old colony hotel at Aurora, built in the early 60's, most prominently located and best known landmark, is to be torn down. The deal is now being closed between the Fred Will estate and the Marion county court.

A bridge will be built this summer at Aurora on the newly designated Aurora-Beaverton highway and according to a late survey the road will cut directly through the famous hostelry, colony-built and colony-owned until after the death of the leader, Dr. William Kell, and the disbanding of the colony in 1881. Giesey then purchased and enlarged the hotel and excavated to make room for two business houses on a level with the street.

The reputation for hospitality and excellence of food had early made the hotel a popular eating place first for stage passengers and later for travelers on the O. and C. trains which stopped at the hotel. Since the death of Giesey the hotel has made many changes in management. A number of years it was successfully operated by Sam Miller, whose rooms were engaged weeks ahead by traveling salesmen.

For some years the hotel has been closed with the exception of a pool hall in the basement.

GAS RANGE AGENCY TAKEN BY NELSONS

Distribution agency for the Wedgwood line of gas range has been taken over by Nelson Brothers, according to an announcement Monday. The Portland Gas & Coke company relinquished the agency because of legal requirements. Nelson Brothers will have exclusive distribution in the Salem district.

It was also announced that E. J. Peterson, who has been associated with the Portland Gas & Coke company for 11 years and in Salem since the company entered this field in 1925, will be affiliated with Nelson Brothers.

Nelson Brothers has been a fast growing concern since establishing business here in 1913. The firm has been in its present location for about 17 years. The firm was originally started by two brothers, Adolph C. Nelson and Alex Nelson. The latter died some years ago and the firm has since carried on under the original name. At present it is engaged in the neon sign, plumbing, heating, refrigeration, paint and roofing business, with a payroll minimum of around \$2000 a month. Nearly all men employed by the firm are Salem home owners.
