Two Hearings Set — A hearing will be held in the state utilities department here today in connection with the proposal of the West Coast Power company to pay a service fee of approximately \$4610 to the Peoples Power & Light company of New York, a holding corporation. This item was disapproved by Charles M. Thomas, state utility commissioner, when the original budget of the West Coast Power company was submitted at his office several months ago. Another hearing scheduled for today involves the payment of \$1000 by the California Public Service company to the same holding company.

RECORD IN SIGHT FOR CHAMBER ROLL

Teams Report 72 Members On Campaign, With 28 More Expected

The Salem chamber of commerce likely will have 100 members, a record for some years past, when "mopping up" work is done on the membership campaign which officially ended yesterday. William Hamilton, general chairman for the drive, stated at the luncheon meeting yesterday. New members were introduced yesterday and in addition William P. Ellis, president of the chamber, spoke briefly on work of the organization.

Wallace Bonesteel's team, which placed second in the contest to secure 15 new members first, presented 15 new members at the luncheon meeting. Van Welder's team, first in this contest, presented nine new members. Each of these teams reported others not present. L. B. (Ted) Endicott's team introduced five new members; Carl Porter, representing Lelf Bergsvik's team, had five new members on hand; and Kenneth Brandon, another captain, also introduced five business men new to the chamber rolls. Walter Molloy's team offered two new members.

Seventy-two members had been signed up at the official termination of the campaign but others are in prospect. Ellis told the new members that much of the work done by the chamber is without publicity, as it is in this way only that general interests of the public may best be served. The chamber, he said, carries on work which is of interest to every citizen, but in which the businessman does not take sufficiently vital interest that individually he will take time to pay attention to such matters.

Working for Hop Warehouse Here
The chamber of commerce has contacted officials of the Southern Pacific railway in an effort to secure for Salem the large hop warehouse which the railroad company plans to construct in the Willamette valley, presumably in time to take care of the harvest this season. Leading hop growers of the city are joining with the chamber in urging erection of the building here, particularly inasmuch as all the buyers in the state, outside of Portland, have headquarters here.

Meier Pardons County Prisoner
Leo Ackerman of Silverton Monday was released from the Marion county jail on a conditional pardon issued by Governor Meier. Ackerman was received at the jail March 24 to serve a term of 90 days for vagrancy. Under the terms of the pardon he shall refrain from the use of intoxicating liquors.

ASK LEGAL OPINION IN TURNER DISPUTE

Dave O'Hara, in charge of the elections division of the state department, Monday sent a letter to Attorney General Van Winkle, requesting a legal interpretation of the corrupt practices act, with particular reference to those sections dealing with the publication of candidates' statements in the voters' pamphlet.

The request for an opinion was occasioned by a recent protest of John D. Goss of Marshfield, and William A. Delsell of Salem, in which they charged that R. R. Turner, their opponent for representative in congress from the first Oregon district, had violated the corrupt practice law by failing to serve them with a copy of his statement.

Delsell and Goss further alleged in their protest that the secretary of state should not have distributed the pamphlets until he had received a sheriff's return that the service had been made.
