

HOUSE BUILDING IS URGED BY CONGRESS

Costs are Still 20 per Cent Below 1928, Builders' Survey Reveals

Building costs in Salem are still about 20 per cent below the 1928 level, to which the federal government is seeking to bring prices of labor and materials, a survey just completed by the Oregon Building Congress revealed, it was announced yesterday by J. D. Kroeker, chairman of a committee named by the Salem chapter of the congress to investigate the status of these costs.

"In view of the present building prices in Salem . . . the Oregon Building Congress strongly recommends those intending to erect homes within the next few years to start their building at once in order to take advantage of the saving possible," a statement issued by the local chapter advises.

It continues:

"One great difference between present prices and those of 1928 lies in the labor item, which was then about one-third higher than at present. Brick were 33 per cent higher in 1928, and labor on brick work was at least 50 per cent higher. Plumbing fixtures were 25 per cent higher installed. Sheet metal work for flashings, valleys, ridges, gutters, roofs, etc., was from 12 to 40 per cent higher. The average difference in lumber, which constitutes a large part of the entire building, was 12 per cent higher in 1928 than it is at present, and mill work was 18 per cent higher.

"In automatic heating, including a furnace and oil burner for a six or seven-room house, the 1928 or normal price was 45 to 50 per cent above that at which it is available today.

"The committee of the Oregon Building Congress which has found these figures to be average in its careful survey of the building trades, estimates that the difference in total building cost was 25 per cent higher in the normal year of 1928. It has found also that it is almost impossible to rent homes in certain classes today and that there is a definite demand for more homes in Salem, which must be met before very long. In view of these facts the Salem chapter of the Oregon Building Congress believes it is doing the citizens of Salem a service in appraising them of its committee's findings in regard to building costs."

PART TIME SCHOOL OPEN TO VISITORS

Pupils to Be Seen at Work During Tuesday Open House Program

An invitation to every Salem person to attend the annual "open house" of the General Part Time Continuation school, Tuesday afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock, is being issued through the press by Violet Swanson, director. Work of students in this unusual educational institution will be exhibited in the classroom in the first floor wing of the Salem high school building.

No "Friday afternoon" program, this. The only extraordinary thing about the entire event is the fact that tea will be served and a goodly amount of time given to explaining the purpose and processes of the school, which serves young persons and adults who for some reason have found it impossible otherwise to complete public school work.

"A cross-section" is the term applied by Miss Swanson to the proposed exhibit in which will be included the work of each of her students, whether that work be poor or excellent. Much of it, she points out, will display genuine and rapid progress.

While space will not permit unusual arrangement of materials, the attractive classroom, with its enameled tables and chairs, its bright linoleum and softly tinted walls, will take on something of the aspect of a fair when handwork of students, including sewing, sketching and woodwork, is put on display. Included will be a display of the work done in the high school machine shops, where a number of the part time students are taking training.

Visitors will see students at work and will get an idea of the many types of individuals served and the problems these students and their teachers are facing in the process of education on a part time basis.

Not just to educators or to club committees does Miss Swanson issue her invitation, although these are included, but to every other person interested in seeing what is being attempted and accomplished in this comparatively recent addition to the public school system.

FINAL PAYMENTS ON CHERRY POOL

1933 crop Nets Growers in Association 3 1/2 lb. on Royal Annes

Willamette Cherry Growers Inc. yesterday mailed out their final settlement on the 1933 Royal Anne cherry pool. Growers in the Association have received three and one half cents net per pound for Royal Anne cherries handled by the Association.

Prices for the 1934 crop should be considerably higher than growers realized for the large crop produced on the Pacific Coast in 1933, according to Robert Shinn, association manager, who said Saturday:

"All cherry producing sections on the coast are very short this year, all districts reporting less than half a crop and many sections estimating as low as twenty-five per cent of last year's tonnage."

"California cherry growers in the Stockton and Lodi districts are being offered five cents per pound for Royal Annes by California packers. Prices in the California coast counties are

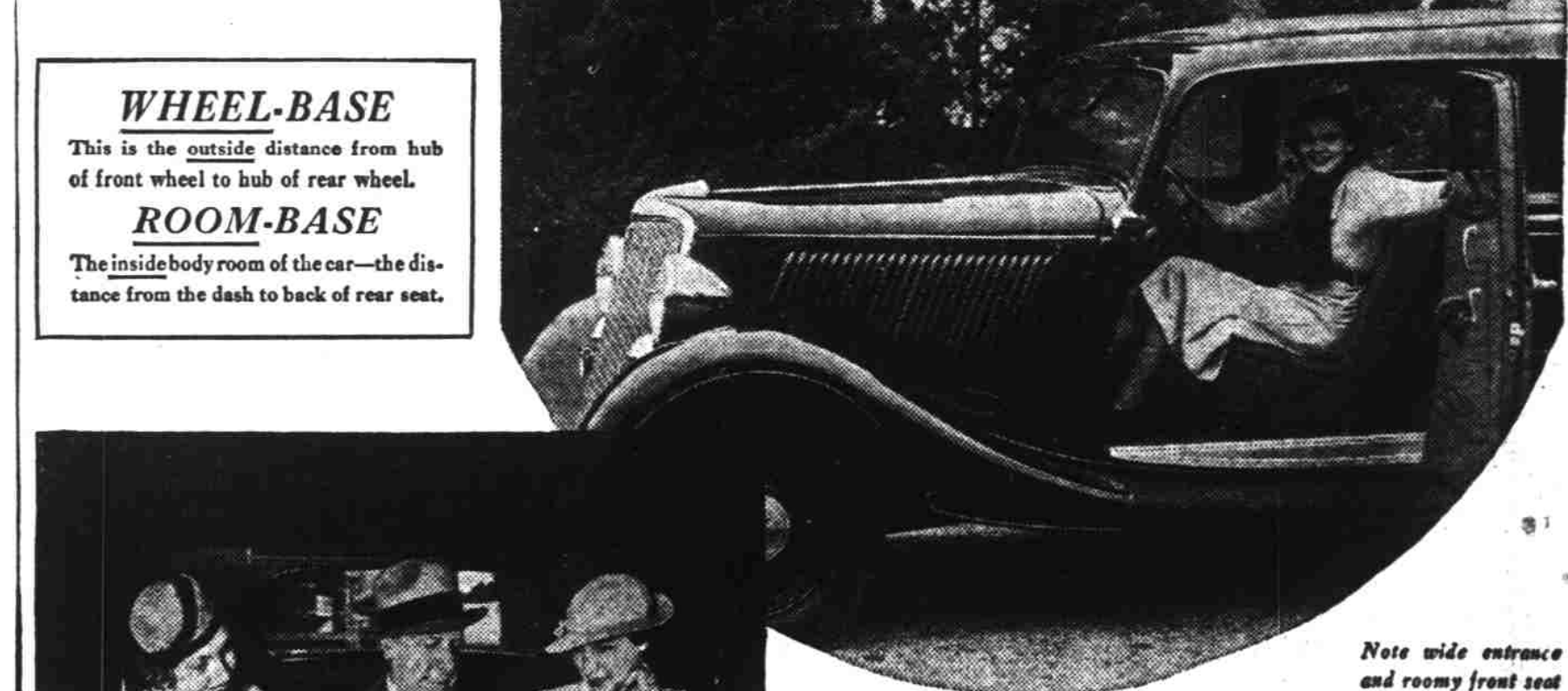
