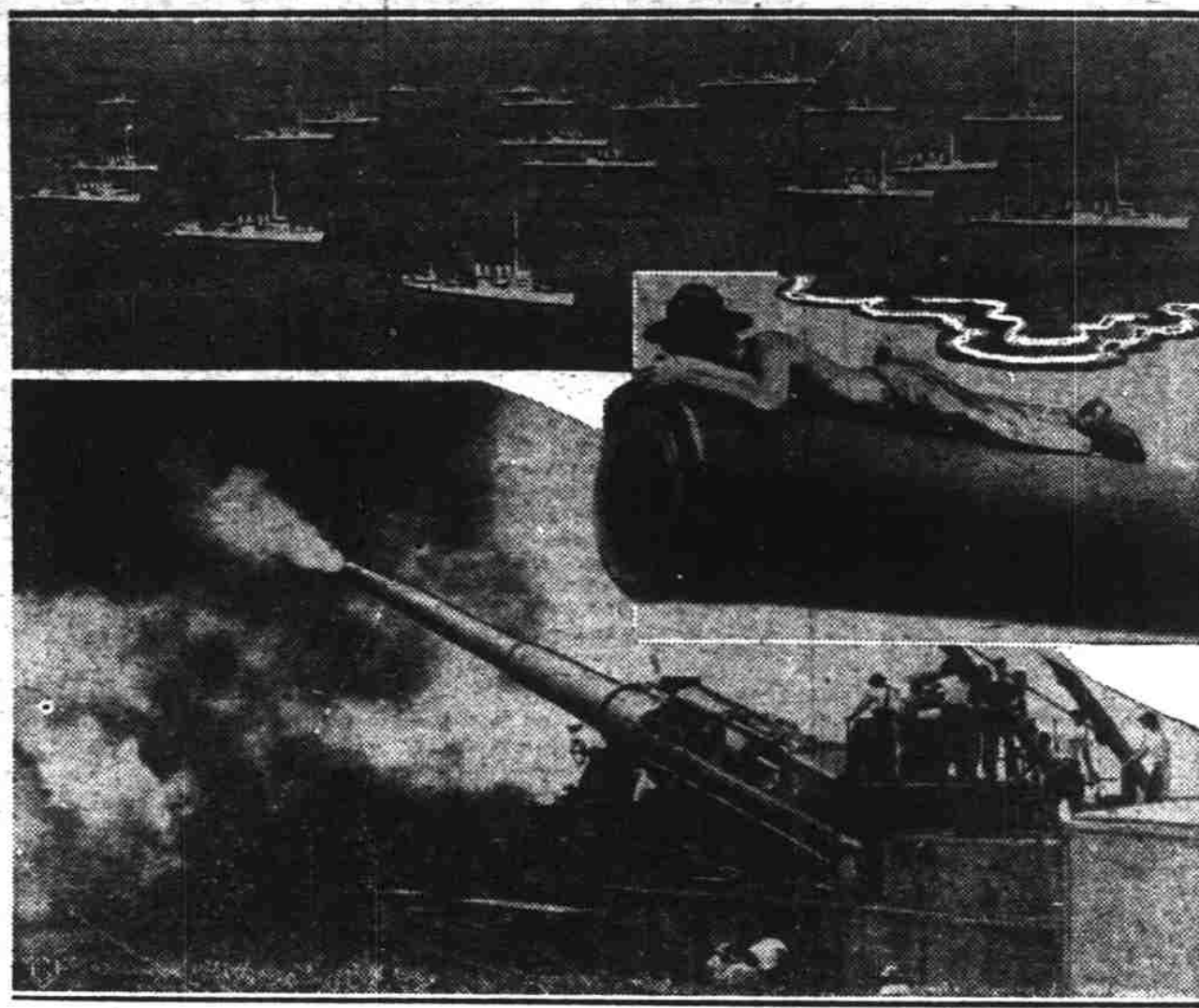
IMPROVE HOUSES

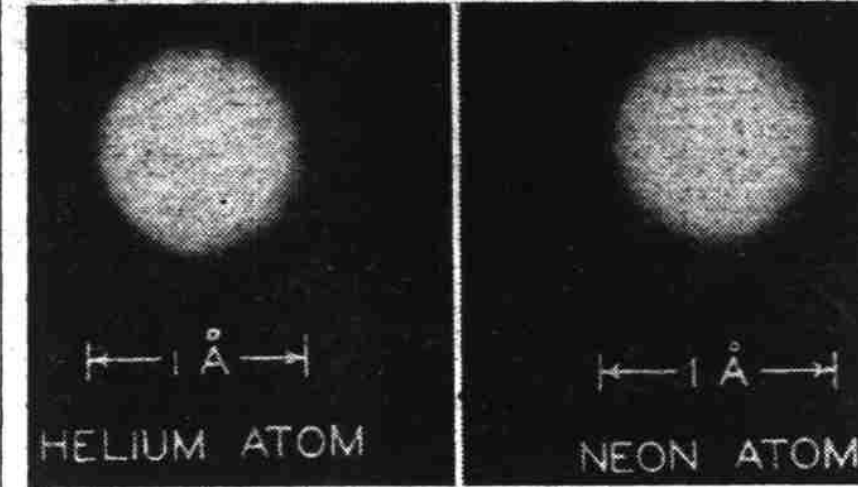
