

Milwaukie High Wins District Meet, Chemawa is Second

Bearcats Defeat Linfield 7-3; Burch Hero on Mound and at Bat

RED AND BLACK QUALIFIES TRIO

Hunter Breaks State Mark in High Hurdles; Eight Meet Records Fall

Milwaukie high school scored a decisive victory in the district track and field meet at Oregon City Saturday, piling up 48 points. Chemawa Indian school was second with 39 1/2. Gresham third with 24 1/2 and Salem fourth with 13 points in the meet which saw eight of the records set in Salem last year broken together with one school high school mark.

Silverton scored 10 points, West Linn 7 1/2, Hill Military academy 6 and Oregon City 5.

Salem placed three men in the state meet which will be held at Corvallis next Saturday; Saunders who took second place in the 220 yard dash, Coleman who was second in the 440 and Varnes who was second in the 880. Osland picked up another point for Salem by taking third in the broad jump and the relay team counted for one by taking third, despite a mixup in the first baton change which lost the local boys some time.

Hunter of Chemawa smashed the state record in the 120 high hurdles, being clocked in 15.8 seconds, one-tenth of a second under the old mark. Hunter also won the low hurdles. Arlee took first in the 100 yard dash in 10 flat for one of the new district records, and also won the 220 and took second in the broad jump. Spotted Eagle, winning the 880, will be Chemawa's third man in the state meet. The Chemawa relay team took first place and will also compete at Corvallis.

WHEN that colorful diamond veteran, Walter "Rabbit" Maranville, sustained a broken leg in an early exhibition game of the spring training campaign, the critics pronounced his baseball obituary.

The surgeons marvel at his miraculous recuperative powers, for the Rabbit is already rolling about in a wheel chair! He expects to be out on the coaching lines by the middle of June, and vows that he will be playing with the Braves again by July.

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Oregon Tops Husky Track Team, Upset

EUGENE, Ore., May 12.—(AP)—An unexpected show of strength in the sprints brought the University of Oregon track team a surprise 67 to 64 victory over the University of Washington track and field team in their annual dual meet here today.

Hobson, negro flash, captured both the 100 and 220 yard dashes for the Webfoots and Shoemaker of Oregon ran second in the century and third in the 220.

The northwest record for the javelin was eclipsed by Bob Parke of Oregon who sent the spear 207 feet for the only new record. The old record was 203 feet 6 inches.

Each team won seven firsts and one event resulted in a tie. Washington won the mile relay. In no events were there clean sweeps for either school.

While the sprints were comparatively slow, a good two mile race was won by Edmiston of Washington in 9:42. Wagner of Oregon ran a close second and Padlock of Oregon crossed the mark in third place to bring the Webfoots another needed point.

The meet was the feature of Oregon's annual junior weekend and marked the second consecutive track upset for the Webfoots over Washington. Last year Oregon was winner 69 to 62.

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WALKER CUP IS KEPT BY YANKS

U.S. Team Wins Six of Eight Singles Matches; Par Badly Shattered

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 12.—(AP)—Tearing into their opponents with a sudden succession of sub-par scores at the outset of the afternoon round of singles competition, the crack brigade of American amateur golfers today completed the crushing defeat of Great Britain, for their eighth successive Walker Cup triumph, before the homebirds had a chance to rally or put up any sort of defense.

Captain Francis Ouimet's light cavalry captured six out of the eight singles matches. The British scored only one victory and halved the remaining match.

The Americans had taken three of the four Scotch foursomes the day before and the final scores, on points, was 9 1/2 to 2 1/2 in favor of the United States.

Jack Westland of Chicago missed a short putt on the 36th green of the day's concluding match and thereby had to be satisfied with finishing all square with young Eric McMurrie, who took the last two holes.

Captain Ouimet had the honor of scoring the seventh and decisive point for the Americans when he downed Leonard Crawley, 5 and 4, but the British hero was the veteran T. A. "Tony" Torrance, who saved the home forces from thorough disaster by defeating Max Marston of Philadelphia, 4 and 3.

William Lawson Little, Jr., of San Francisco, the slugging San Francisco, alone was able to defy the weather with par golf during the morning round to take a commanding lead of six up against the veteran Cyril Tolley and he was one under par for 13 holes this afternoon, winning by the decisive margin of 6 and 5.

The other Walker cup "freshmen," Johnny Goodman of Omaha and Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati, rallied from shaky starts to score spectacular victories. The American open champion, after a weird 81 in the morning which nevertheless put him two up on the Hon. Michael Scott, settled down after lunch and quickly trimmed the 55-year-old British amateur titleholder by the day's biggest margin, 7 and 6. Fischer disposed handily of Eric Fiddian.

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
