Contata Will be Given By Oratorio Group This Afternoon

SALEM is to be congratulated on the great array of talent which was brought to the fore during Music week. Children, young people and professional musicians joined forces gladly and gave their time and talents to make programs throughout the week some of the finest ever heard in this vicinity.

This afternoon as a stirring climax for the series of concerts will be "The Holy City" by Gail, presented by the Oratorio chorus under the direction of Loren D. Davidson in the armory at 3:15 o'clock.

The Oratorio chorus was organized in September, 1933. Loren Davidson, director and organizer, was aided in this undertaking by Rev. Hugh McCallum, E. D. Lindberg, and John Friesen. Each of these men, directors of local choirs, saw the need of such an organization, and at the first meeting which was held in October there were 56 present.

The first undertaking was Handel's "Messiah," which was presented before a capacity audience, in the Salem Armory last December. The success of this production was so great that members voted to continue as a permanent chorus, giving at least two musicals a year.

Recently the club so organized itself and petitioned for membership in the American Federation of Music clubs and, on April 4, the petition was granted.

The singers making up the chorus are from all walks of life, some with musical training and others without, but all gather for the joy of singing and the education gained. The sole aim of the chorus is to afford an opportunity for those individuals who are endeavoring to advance in the field of music.

At present there are 147 names on the rolls and each member purchases his own music, thus making the organization self-supporting.

When this group meets for work next fall all singers of the city and surrounding communities are cordially invited to participate.

The Woman's club is sponsoring a musical tea this afternoon at the Old People's home. Solos, duets and trio numbers will be given by members of the club assisted by Miss Alena Bremner, cellist.

Saturday afternoon Miss Frances Virginia Melton presented her four prize-winning music students in the Meier and Frank auditorium in Portland where all winners from the state played in recital as a feature of Music week. Miss Charlotte Hill, Miss Margaret Wonderlich and Miss Carolyn Brady, winners of first awards, and Miss Lois Burton, who placed second in her division, were the artists. All brought back to Salem silver cups from the state contest sponsored by the National Federation of Music clubs the last of April.

A call for tenors has been issued by Cameron Marshall, director, to take part in "Pirates of Penzance," which the Light Opera club of Willamette university will present May 25. Miss Dorothy Durkee, Miss Gwen Galaher, Miss Elizabeth Clement, Miss Helen Benner, Dick Smart, Burt Preston, Earle Potter, Ralph Barber and Ray Bowman are included in the cast. A chorus of 50 voices will assist, accompanied by a 20-piece orchestra.

Washington, D. C.—Whether the largest organization of women in the world will throw its force behind the passage of the Cope-land pure food and drugs bill (S. 250), will be decided when the General Federation of Women's Clubs, in council meeting at Hot Springs, Ark., May 21-25, votes on a resolution to endorse the general principle and purpose of this pending legislation. Study of the bill in its form before being amended (S. 2000) was recommended by the federation's board of directors at its annual meeting last January, and it has been discussed at many state federation conventions and club meetings since then.

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
