

INDUSTRY HURT BY STRIKE NOW

Two Plants Close Down and Others May; Portland Chamber Active

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terials are becoming low and that shutdowns are imminent unless shipments come through.

Eastern Oregon and eastern Washington points report that wheat shipments to tidewater docks have been suspended.

Two vessels arrived here today and four sailed. One of the arrivals and three of the departures were tank steamers whose crews handle the simple duties of connecting discharging hose lines.

The steamer Peter Kerr left Longview with a partial cargo for Shanghai. The Norwegian motorship Romulus arrived for a cargo of steel rail and lumber for Japan.

Governor Meier last night sent a telegram to President Roosevelt urging him to use his influence to promote arbitration of the longshoremen's strike and the movement of perishable and other urgently needed commodities pending outcome of the negotiations. "The longshoremen's strike in Portland and other Oregon harbors is working a great hardship on industry and agriculture at this critical time and is aggravating unemployment," Governor Meier's telegram read. "Cargoes of fruit spray and other seasonal requirements are held up with resulting serious detriment to farmers and fruitgrowers."

"I earnestly urge you to use your best efforts to promote arbitration and to secure the movement of perishable and other urgently needed commodities pending the outcome of negotiations. Have conferred by telephone with Dr. Grady, chairman of the Pacific coast arbitration board and with Senator Wagner of the federal labor board, who said that President Ryan of the Longshoremen's International was proceeding by airplane to San Francisco.

"Have worked earnestly to secure arbitration locally but believe federal cooperation is essential to secure necessary statewide action. Am confident your influence would be extremely valuable in meeting this serious situation. "Anything you can do will be deeply appreciated and will be of the utmost value in opening the way for continued recovery on the coast."

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in. The former was last night reported to have a supply sufficient for a two weeks run and the latter for a week or more.

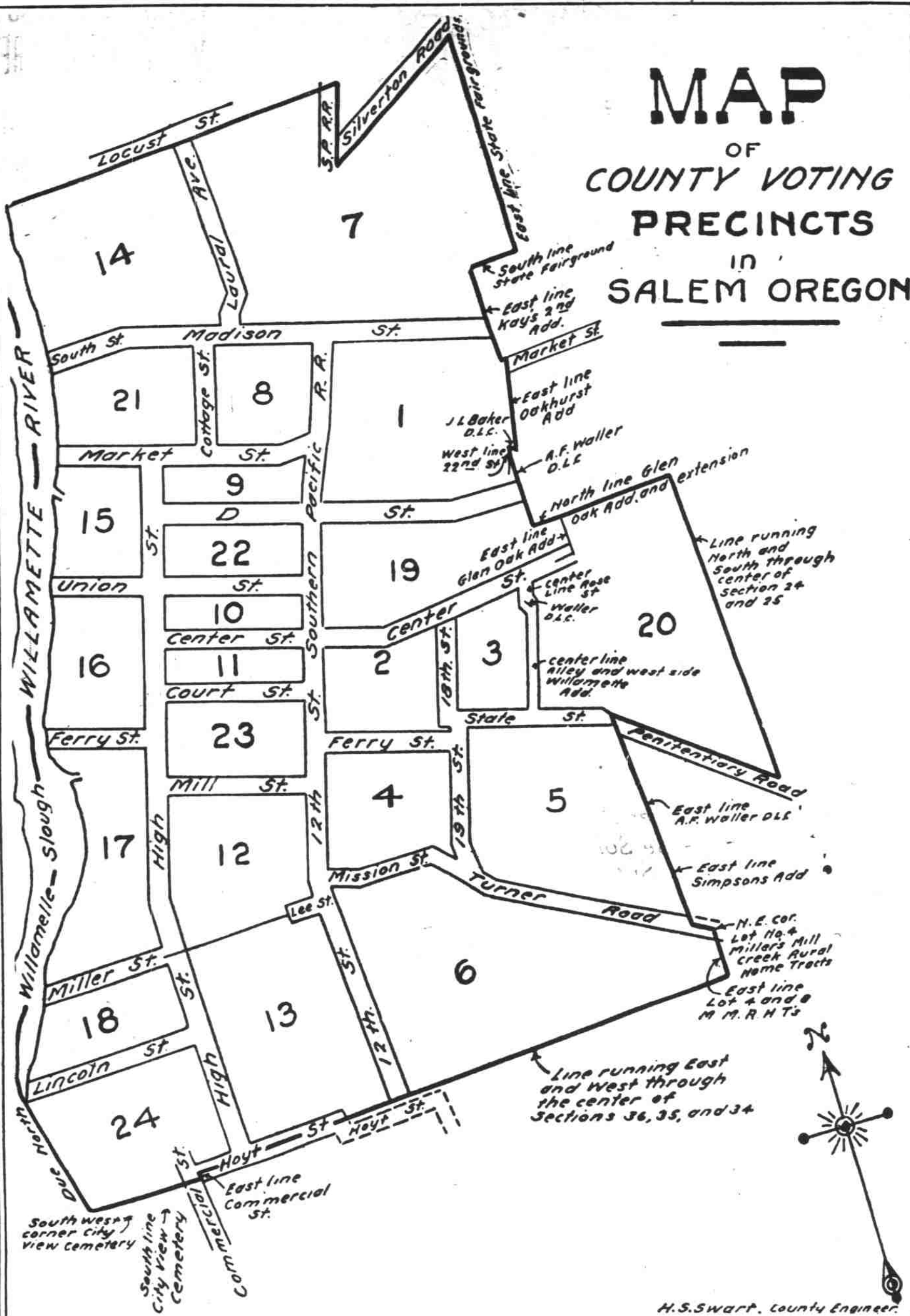
"We could get sugar by direct rail shipments if we had to," said Cecil B. Spencer, Hunt Brothers manager, "but that, of course, would be more expensive."

Holman Lambasts Governor And His 'Subsidized Paper' In Address Before Kiwanis

Speaking earnestly but informally Ratus Holman, state treasurer and candidate for governor opened up on his political enemies with scathing condemnation in an address before the Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday noon. He flayed the Oregonian as the subsidized press and unimpaired his machine gun on Governor Julius L. Meier, whom he helped to elect, and Henry Hansen. He reviewed his own career of 14 years in public office and referred to his opposition as persecution. He charged the governor with lack of ordinary courtesy in handling calls for meetings of the board of control.

A summary of his speech follows: As commissioner of Multnomah county I put through the Columbia river bridge which was intru-

over to the people without costing the taxpayers a cent. I found the county hospital in a frame building in South Portland. With the help of Dr. McKenzie I got the donation of 20 acres of land for a medical center and built the county hospital there. It was built within the estimates and without bonds and interest. I organized the forces that built the Columbia river highway.

"I see the same opportunities in Salem. There was a deplorable condition in the blind school. As a result of my efforts three now have sight.

"I don't know why I stir up such bitter animosities. I read my Bible. Every man who has sincerely tried to serve, is by some trick of fate persecuted and even crucified. 1900 years ago a man taught the people 'Love your neighbors' and he was crucified by the rabble led by the special privilege crowd.

"As treasurer I have hired a man to take my place in my factory at more than I get from the state. I pay all my own expenses. Why am I put forth as a peculiar person?

"I broke with Governor Meier and his budget commissioner when they insisted on the discharge of very capable persons from my department whom Tom Kay had employed and I retained. They tried to have me transfer state funds to banks the governor was interested in which later failed.

"I speak frankly. I have only one motive: because the Lord has been good to me and there's a chance for me to do some good I am in public life.

"There is a barrier between me and the people—the means of communication, the newspapers. There is such a thing as a subsidized press and a proscribed editor; and a crooked and corrupt politician. I am a politician but I know I am not crooked or corrupt. An editor knows if his

paper is subsidized; if the shoe fits he can put it on. Explicitly I have in mind the Oregonian when I refer to the subsidized press and a proscribed editor."

Here Mr. Holman held up a special advertising section of Meier and Frank in the Oregonian. "If you think that doesn't affect the way the editor writes you are simpler than I think you are. I have seen Governor Meier stop the presses and take an item right out of the front page because he didn't like it. They have attributed quoted matter to me which I never made. I gave a signed statement on request after Hoover's Des Moines speech but what they published was something else."

"I fought the newspaper graft of publishing delinquent tax lists. It is doing good things that brings about persecution. "In the list of the men given salary boosts of up to 50 per cent was the son of Paul Kelly, the editor of the Oregonian. I suppose the commission hunted all over the state and found he was the best man for the job. Na-

poleson said the victory was on the side of the heaviest artillery. I am the support of the Oregonian is on the side of the longest pocketbook.

"As state treasurer I have handled \$20,000,000 of your money without loss of a dollar in failed banks. I have had no vacation. I am not advised in advance of meetings of the board of control. I got a call from a clerk five minutes before a meeting. I have gone to the governor's office and waited in the ante-room like a book agent while the governor discussed weighty state business with Henry Hansen. That man's got the breeding of a hog."

"Now about this meeting of the board of control which the papers say I missed. I was invited to speak at the forum of the Portland chamber of commerce at noon. I asked if the meeting could not be advanced from 11 to 10, but was told it was impossible. I found the governor was in his office with Mr. Stadelman and at 10:15 went in with the clerks to go over the business. The governor would not admit the all the business on the docket and had my votes recorded."

"It isn't necessary to levy any more taxes. You spend enough money to run the government, pay the teachers good wages; if we applied modern methods instead of sticking to those 150 years old."

first. When he agreed to the guilty plea the three were taken immediately before Judge Fricks. "It is the opinion of the court," said Judge Fricks, "it was the intention of the state legislature that the death penalty or straight life sentence should apply only in cases where the kidnappers used violence beyond that necessary in carrying out their plans."

He said no such violence had been shown in the kidnapping and holding of Gettle and that the prisoners could later apply for parole.

Kirk, who was described by officers as the "brains" of the kidnap plot, Kerrigan and Williams said nothing when the sentence was passed and their faces were expressionless.

Meanwhile Joan Burk, 21, of Jersey City, N. J., and Loretta Woody, 23, a native of Twin Falls, Idaho, who were taken in custody with the three men, were held in jail on suspicion of kidnapping. District Attorney Flitts said he had not yet decided what action would be taken in their cases.

1 teaspoon salt
