The hand-picked of Martin have been noticeably affrighted since the Klamath Falls whirlwind threatened to blow over their applicant, but the midnight guesses last night were that Martin was still strong and the ardent Mahoneyites and the scared Martinites held him to be.

Charles Abrams is ahead in Marion county in a spirited contest of state's race and will probably take a commanding lead in the valley counties. Earl Snell is coming out of eastern Oregon with a sizeable lead there. The race will be determined in Portland. Joe Shelton appears to be in the lead for the democratic nomination as secretary of state.

Stegmann-Ferry Contest Spirited
Marion county has its own speculative races. Judge John Stegmann is in a spirited contest with Martin F. Ferry for the republican nomination for county judge. Stegmann appears to have the edge. Between S. B. Mills and P. L. Frazier a determined contest has been waged for the democratic nomination for county judge with Frazier having the pole.

The county commissionership and the republican campaigns for nomination for the legislature are a free-for-all and no one will know very definitely how the tide has run until the counting boards have finished.

Telephone Firm Will Fight Code For Telegraphy

WASHINGTON, May 17. (AP)—The American Telephone & Telegraph company and several of its biggest clients joined today in protesting to NRA against any code interference with the concern's telegraph business.

C. P. Cooper, vice-president of the company, questioned NRA's right to prescribe a code for telegraphic communication, said the plan drawn up for restriction and regulation would defeat its own labor-aiding purpose, and defended in detail the vast network of privately leased telegraphic circuits created by the telephone company.

Japanese Threat May Not Prevent Help for Chinese

GENEVA, May 17. (AP)—Western aid to China, in the face of expected Japanese objections, was forecast today as a committee of the League of Nations approved reconstruction plans submitted by Dr. Ludwig Rjachman.

The committee, on which the United States is represented, was unanimous in its action, and Dr. Rjachman was instructed to proceed with consultations and negotiations for carrying out the plans, which include road building and other public improvements.

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FAVOR INSURANCE FOR BIG DEPOSITS

WASHINGTON, May 17.—President Roosevelt was said by house members today to have indicated a willingness to agree on the insurance of bank deposits up to \$5000 instead of \$2500 as present law provides.

That increase, it was reported by members who have conferred with him, would be interpretable as a clear sign that neither the president nor congress intends to abandon federal bank deposit insurance.

A temporary plan guaranteeing deposits up to \$2500 went into effect last January 1. A permanent plan would go into effect on July 1, 1934, without additional legislation. The permanent plan would insure 100 per cent deposits up to \$10,000, 75 per cent from \$10,000 to \$50,000 and 50 per cent over \$50,000.

Because there has not been time for a satisfactory recheck of the soundness of banks, or for the necessary reorganization of some, Mr. Roosevelt insists that inauguration of the permanent proposal be postponed until July 1, 1935.
