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can be expected, if not to support Dunne, at least to be neutral in the campaign.

2. Dunne will be able to gather a sizeable amount of support both from left-wing and right-wing republicans. Such men as Willard Marks of Albany, a staunch republican, will line up with Dunne. So will the Meier-Hansen group. Dunne was against the sales tax, for the \$5 license fee, for the dairy bill and can be expected to be generously supported by the farm group which supported Sam Brown.

3. The Martin campaign failed to show the overwhelming support which seemed assured for it when the general first announced his candidacy months ago. Willis Mahoney wildcat and unknown as he was, made a sizeable dent in the general's strength. Just where these Mahoney votes will go is unknown. It is likely that they are not strong party votes and that Dunne will be fully able to gather Mahoney's strength as will Martin.

No one knows now what trends the lines of politics will take in the long months ahead between May and November. The general will have to come west. The entire state will want to have a look at him. Upstate voters are going to see if his teeth are sound. If the major-general background sticks out too strongly, if he knows enough about Oregon to talk intelligently of it, in short, if the ex-resident of the Army and Navy club in Washington, D. C. can really be made into a good resident of Salem, Oregon.

One of Martin's closest and strongest supporters said Wednesday that the nomination fight was the only thing worrying them; once Mahoney was out of the way, the rest was smooth sailing. The omens are not so assuring. Martin is by no means the perfect candidate, the New Deal may not be the prime issue in Oregon politics and the roly-poly senator from Multnomah county is the best political bet the republicans could have picked from their scattered field to do battle with the major-general.

Earl Snell's polarity, his innocuous platform, the loyalty and hard work of a host of his friends, swept him to victory.

J. M. Devers won the votes of a host of friends who admired him, who knew his honesty and industry, but Devers in a political campaign against Mott was as badly matched as Walter Cline against Bobby Jones. Mott had the veterans sewed up, was well thought of by the ultra-progressive group in republicanism and had a name and a campaigning experience which put Devers to shame.

The Waterloo of W. A. Delzell's campaign was his joint protest with John W. Goss of Marshfield of the statements made in the Voter's Pamphlet by R. R. Turner. Turner's name was lifted from back pages of newspapers through the district and for days given page one prominence. Thousands of voters who never would have read Turner's inflammatory statements against Delzell and Goss, viewed them and a percentage believed them. Instead of being second or third in the race, Turner became a contestant for first honors.

Delzell's plight politically is unfortunate for this is the second time he has lost his party's nomination; he failed to win over Harvey Starkweather because of overconfidence; he failed to win Friday because of a bad political stroke. He gambled the Salem postmastership against his chances to be nominated as congressman and having failed in the latter undertaking, he must now go back to a post with the internal revenue department. A hard-and-fast deal was made between Henry Crawford and Delzell, in which the former pledged financial and political support to Delzell, in return for which Delzell gave a quit claim deed on any chance he held for the Salem post-office. During the campaign Crawford filed his deed and Walter Pierce and James Farley have recorded it in Washington. So it's back to the mine for Delzell and a high-nony-nony for the Polk county schoolmaster who put Delzell and Goss to rout.

Turner has a chance for November but only a slender one up against a New Dealer in republican clothes and whether its veterans to aid, utilities to swat, new money to print or farmers to elevate, "Jim" Mott will double and redouble any bid Turner wants to scalp. Turner's only chance to scalp the incumbent is to make the people believe that Roosevelt's hands can be upheld by democratic cupbearers and that Mr. Mott, irrespective of his "progressive" views, is still branded with the dread taint of republicanism.

mah county) district, Walter B. Gleason, former democratic nominee for United States senator, won the congressional nomination, while Circuit Judge W. A. Ekwall led a large field of candidates for the republican nomination.

The democratic party polled about 75,000 votes for the governorship, while the republican voters cast more than 130,000 ballots. The total democratic registration, however, was only 156,504, compared with 285,501 for the republicans.

The republican nomination for secretary of state went to Earl Snell of Arlington by almost a two to one vote over Colonel Carle Abrams of Salem.

The democratic nomination for secretary of state went to Horace E. Walter of Corvallis. Walter, who declared business must replace bickering on the state board of control, had a substantial lead over Everett Logan of Multnomah county who was running second, and Joseph E. Shelton of Multnomah county in third place.

John L. Rand of Baker county pulled ahead with a strong margin to succeed himself as supreme court justice on the non-partisan ballot.
