Owners Have Say**

C. A. Gies, representing local auto camp owners, said Salem had 13 such auto parks privately owned and operated and with 140 cottages available was amply able to take care of all tourists.

O'Hara said Salem was now the only municipality on the coast to own and operate an auto park.

Paul Johnson, whose term expired this week as a member of the civil service commission of the city, was unanimously re-elected by the council to serve a three-year term.

Alderman V. E. Kuhn reported that he had received, as chairman of the street committee, four bids for furnishing asphalt to the city, all from oil concerns, who bid \$21 a ton, f.o.b. Willbridge, near Portland. The bids were left in the committee's hands.

The council approved a \$500 appropriation from the fire department fund to defray the charges and expenses for the trip of John Cunningham, engineer, to Washington, D. C. to negotiate with PWA regarding the loan-grant for the Salem municipal waterworks purchase and extension.

A somewhat trembling voice by Assistant Postmaster Arthur Glibbard, who has been associated more closely with Farrar than any other Salem postoffice employee, there was no less a tremor in the voice of the honored guest as he made his simple response.

Farrar, who also spent some time in Alaska, remarked that "A year and a half in Alaska convinces you that life anywhere but in the Willamette valley isn't worth while" and went on to explain that he and Mrs. Farrar will retain their home in Salem, as the gift of other postal employees might seem to indicate. Two fine golf clubs were presented to the retiring postmaster, an enthusiast of the game.

"Thank the public for me for the kindness they have shown in their dealings with the office during my term," he said to representatives of the press.

Crawford was greeted with a rising vote of welcome led by Postmaster Farrar. Briefly he proclaimed his lack of knowledge of postoffice methods and his intent to learn with the aid of other employees; he, too, complimented Farrar on his successful civil service career and tendered his good wishes.

Paul Miller, of the money order department, introduced the toastmaster following the presentation of a corsage to Mrs. Farrar by Joseph Benner, clerk, in behalf of the postal employees. Music was furnished by the Clough-Barrett quartet and the Haywire orchestra.

503 ARRESTED BY TROOPERS, APRIL

State troopers participated in 503 arrests for traffic violations during the month of April, with fines aggregating \$4463, according to a report issued Monday by Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police.

In twenty-six cases the arrests were for drunken driving. Forty-eight of the defendants were charged with reckless driving.

There were 182 arrests in the general law enforcement division of the state police department. Fines aggregated \$3123.03. Eight of these arrests were for larceny and four for forgery.

Arrests in the fish and game division numbered 106, with fines of \$3416. There were 16 acquittals.

The troopers conducted 324 investigations, of which number 105 were reported as cleared.

Twenty-four persons arrested by the state police were held for other law enforcement agencies.

Woodburn Burglar Paroled by Judge

A one-year state penitentiary sentence, followed by a bench parole to Sheriff A. C. Burk, was meted out to Charles M. Taylor Monday afternoon by Judge L. H. McMahan. Taylor, up on a burglary charge, waived indictment and pleaded guilty. He was involved in a burglary of the Graves sawery at Woodburn, February 10. The parole was given by the court on the recommendation of District Attorney W. T. Trindle.

LESS FEDERAL AID FOR ROADS, THREAT

Amendments to the Cartwright bill, appropriating \$100,000,000 for regular federal aid as proposed by President Roosevelt, and leaving \$300,000,000 to be appropriated by congress next year when contracts are being completed, would reduce Oregon's 1934 share of this amount to \$1,660,000, state highway department officials announced last night.

The announcement was made after a telegram had been received from Washington that such amendments had been introduced by Senator Hayden.

"There is a general understanding that the senate also will amend the Cartwright bill to provide for two additional years of federal aid," the telegram read.

In case the original \$100,000,000 of regular federal aid funds were appropriated the state of Oregon would receive \$8,000,000, officials declared.

The cherry fruit fly made its appearance in Rickreall and Amity orchards May 14, according to information received from Oregon State college experiment station here. Hence, cherry orchardists should get busy with spraying immediately, canners warn.

The spraying should not be heavy, because of the residue on the fruit. The spray recommended is: Lead arsenate, one-half pound; molasses, two quarts; water, ten gallons.

MARIS APPOINTED FOR RURAL RELIEF

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 21.—(P)—Paul V. Maris, director of extension work at Oregon State college, has been appointed regional rural relief work supervisor for western states.

Confirmation of the appointment offered him some weeks ago was received tonight from C. W. Warburton, federal director of extension.

Maris has been a member of Oregon's state relief committee for two years. He recently drew up a plan for rural relief in Oregon which was one of the first accepted by the federal relief administration.

Director Maris was to leave the extension service here July 1 to spend a year on sabbatical leave studying land utilization and economic preparatory to teaching those subjects at the state college here.

Maris' new appointment is effective May 24, but definite location of his headquarters will await more detailed instructions now on their way from Washington, he said tonight.

DANIEL S. ADAMS DIES HERE SUNDAY

**Funeral is Today; Accident
Death Toll Raised to
Two in Two Days**

The death of Daniel S. Adams, 92, of 255 West Washington street, in a hospital here Sunday brought to two lives the toll of traffic accidents here within two days. Adams' death was believed due to injuries and shock he suffered when he was said to have walked into the side of a car driven by M. L. Whitesell, route 3. Whitesell was arrested only for not having a driving license.

The other accident was Harry E. Beardsley, 61, of route 3, who died Saturday afternoon as the result of injuries received earlier in the day when a car in which he was riding, driven by Elbert Ellsworth Jones, 16, of route 3, was struck by a Southern Pacific freight train in West Salem. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday from the Terwilliger funeral home.

Adams was a civil war veteran, a member of Sedgewick post, G. A. R., of Salem. Surviving are the widow, Clara Thompson Adams; a daughter, Mrs. Grace E. Hall of Portland, and two sons, Newton Adams of Minot, Manitoba, and Norton Adams of Portland. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. today from the Terwilliger funeral home with Rev. J. R. Simonds officiating. The woman's Relief corps ritual will be given; burial will be in the G. A. R. circle, City View cemetery.

A man named Gilmer, a pedestrian, living at 332 North 19th street, was struck but not seriously injured by an automobile driven by Lloyd A. Lee, route 6, at 18th and Center streets, Lee reported to police.

Other weekend mishaps involved Mrs. Roy Sharp, 1032 Fir, and an unidentified motorist, at Center and Commercial; C. M. Palmer, 925 North 16th, and an unidentified Harrisburg motorist, at Summer and Market.

BULB CODE HEARING IS SET FOR JUNE 1

About 50 melon and tomato growers gathered in Salem Monday afternoon and discussed the proposed marketing agreement affecting the melon and tomato industry in the states of Oregon and Washington. Max Gehlar, state director of agriculture, presided at the hearing.

Salient features of the proposed agreement include selection of an administrative committee, fixing of minimum prices and a moderate stamp tax or agreement to defray the administration costs.

Gehlar said the code probably would be completed within the next 10 days.

Another code hearing, involving bulb growers in the state of Oregon, will be held in Salem June 1, Gehlar announced.

Salient features of this proposed code are:

Creation of a control board to be composed of members selected from various agricultural districts of the state.

To make it unlawful to sell bulbs at less than the minimum price to be established by the control board.

That the director of agriculture shall not license the sale of bulbs by any tax supported or tax exempt institution or organization and that members thereof shall not buy or handle bulbs in any way.

Registration of Voters Reopened

Registration books have been re-opened at the county clerk's office and yesterday saw a number of Marion county residents signing up in order to qualify for the general elections in November. The books will be kept open until 30 days before the fall vote.

A number of voters found to their regret at the primary balloting, that only registered voters could cast a ballot. Swearing in at the polls was prohibited by state law recently.

ed on raspberries, and inasmuch as the Gresham and Pullup pools, which set the market in the northwest, have not yet been sold, this price is still a question mark.

Week end rains did no damage to the strawberries coming into the market Monday; in fact, these berries are snapping out of the condition engendered by unfavorable weather and developing the genuine strawberry flavor. Canners say now, however, that the crop will be shorter than anticipated. If weather conditions continue as favorable as Sunday and Monday, quality from now on will be excellent.

Larger Potato Plantings Urged

Larger potato plantings for relief will likely be made here this season, with a probable 100 acres instead of the 40 planted last year, members of the county relief committee state. Ivan White, field relief administrator, recently suggested the need for increased acreage. Manner in which the relief plantings will be handled has not yet been determined. Last year 200 sacks of seed potatoes were distributed in small lots for home garden patches.

Sealey, secretary to Administrator Sammis, of Alfred Montgomery, in charge of the tax collection department, and of L. A. Witter, auditor. Governor Meier objected to the rate of pay of the latter and took issue with McMorran on his worth.

Following the meeting with the board, which was short, lasting only 15 minutes, the state board of control reconvened after noon adjournment at 2:15 p. m. Meier conferred in executive session with McMorran, Stadelman and George Neuner, liquor commission attorney, who accompanied McMorran here.

Relations between Meier and McMorran were obviously strained at the meeting.

The governor also had little or nothing to say to Holman. It had been reported that he might exhort Holman for referring to his maners as those of a "hog" in a recent talk here, but Meier kept silent.

The board authorized the purchase of a pump for the state game farm at Pendleton on a low bid of \$649. Fairbanks - Morris company submitted the low bid.

Approval also was given low bids for the purchase of seven automobiles to be used by various state departments.

ONE-ARM DRUMMER ELKS CIRCUS ACT

The traditional one armed paper hanger has nothing on Everett Conway, one armed trap drummer appearing with the West Coast circus next week. Although not billed on the program as one of the acts the one-armed drummer will interest circus goers at the armory as much as one of the headliners.

Conway lost his left arm at the age of four and learned rudimentary drumming from his grandfather who was drummer boy in the civil war.

When only 17, Conway was touring the country as one of the leading trap drummers and leaders of an orchestra, and has ever since ripped off his drum solos to the amazement of everyone who has heard him. Conway does many

things with his one hand that most people cannot do with two. He shoots a game of golf in the 30's and is an accomplished artist.

Conway and his recording band furnish the music at the Elks' indoor circus at the armory all of next week. The program presented nightly consists of 20 all-star circus acts from the different large tented circuses. There is free dancing after the regular circus performance.

quor within their boundaries must pay federal taxes.

A unanimous decision of the supreme court, handed down today by Justice Sutherland, declared the principle had been firmly established that "the instrumentalities, means and operations whereby the states exert the governmental powers belonging to them are exempt from taxation by the United States," but that "the immunity of the state from federal taxation is limited to those agencies which are of a governmental character."

"Whenever a state engages in a business of a private nature it exercises non-governmental functions," the opinion said, "and the business, though conducted by the state, is not immune from the exercise of the power of taxation which the constitution vests in the congress."

Honor to Jason Lee is Approved

WASHINGTON, May 21.—(P)—The Mott resolution requesting President Roosevelt to issue a proclamation calling upon the people of the United States to observe 1934 as a Jason Lee centennial in honor of Jason Lee's establishment of the first permanent settlement in Oregon was adopted today by the house.

It now goes to the senate.
